Stalin stood serect throughout the military parade and the mass civilian demonstration that followed. He waved his arms as the cheers of some 100200 spectators echoed in Red Square. In Belgrade, the anti-Kremlin Communists of Marshal of Yugosolavia paraded through the streets in a show of military power. Some 200,000 spectators watched the parade and had a first look at some of the new military equipment sent by the United States to bolster Yugoslavia against the pressure of Russia and its satellites.
