Stalin Reviews Military Might

MOSCOW, May 1 (UP)—Soviet Premier Josef Stalin has reviewed Russia's military and air might at a May Day parade in Moscow's Red Square. Stalin stood erect throughout the military parade and the mass civilian demonstration that followed. He waved his arms as the cheers of some 100,000 spectators echoed in Red Square. In Belgrade, the anti-Kremlin Communists of Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia paraded through the streets in a show of military power. Some 200,000 spectators watched the parade and had a first look at some of the new military equipment sent by the United States to bolster Yugoslavia against the pressure of Russia and its satellites.

SLATON, May 1 (UP)—A Wilmington, Calif., family feel permanently indebted today to the residents of Slaton. It all started because of a tragic accident to Mr. and Mrs. Lester E. Brown's son, 14-year-old Norman Brown.

Norman was hitch-hiking to Jonesboro, Ark., from California to visit his uncle when he fell under a string of boxcars in the Slaton switchyards. Injuries to his left arm and leg forced Slaton doctors to amputate the limbs.

When Mr. and Mrs. Brown came to be with their son, they found that Slaton residents had taken turns sitting with the boy to keep him from getting lonely. And the parents were also given the key to a house two blocks from the hospital and a Slaton real estate man turned over one of his cars for the family to use.

Deferment Policy On Navy Reserves

NEW ORLEANS, La., May 1—Deferment policy for Naval Reservists who are high school or undergraduate college students was announced today by Eighth Naval District headquarters.

The policy, which applies to the entire Naval Reserve program, is as follows:

High school students will not knowingly be ordered to active duty. In the event they receive orders, such orders will be cancelled, and orders will be cancelled upon receipt of certification of attendance on school letterhead, signed by a school official.

Members of the Naval Reserve who are full-time undergraduate students actually attending college at the time of receiving orders to active service may be deferred until completion of the current term.

Upon submission of requests for further delay, those who are successfully pursuing their studies may be delayed until completion of the academic year in which they received initial orders. Deferrals beyond this point generally conform to standards established by the Selective Service System.

There are no "blanket" deferrals. Each request for delay in reporting for active duty is decided upon the basis of facts presented and merits of the case.

U. S. Bans All Travel To Iron Curtain Nations

WASHINGTON, May 1 (UP)—The United States has banned travel of American citizens to all Iron Curtain countries unless they have specific approval of the State Department.

The State Department says it is taking new steps "to warn American citizens of the risks of travel in Iron Curtain countries."

It says it will stamp all passports invalid for travel in those countries unless passports are specifically endorsed by the State Department.

Shivers Takes Cut At Loyals

HOUSTON, May 1 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers said he believes it is time for the people to "do more demanding" for better government. At the same time, Shivers, who spoke in Houston at a chamber of commerce meeting, urged people to participate in Saturday's precinct conventions.

The governor also took a cut at the state's "Loyal Democrats" who are working for a pledged, instructed delegation to the national convention in opposition to Shivers.

Full Scale Meet On Truce Today

FANMUNJOM, Korea, May 1 (UP)—Today should tell whether an early armistice is possible in Korea.

A full-scale meeting of truce delegations begins at Fanmunjom at 8 p.m. (C.S.T.) The Communists have asked for the meeting probably because they have an answer to the latest Allied truce proposal.

Terms of the proposal have not been disclosed. But it covers the deadlocked issues, the right to build airfields during a truce, Russia's membership on a term of "Neutral" truce inspectors, and prisoner exchange.

A report from Washington says the U-N proposal would let the Reds question war prisoners who don't want to go back home.

The Reds would be allowed to check, just to prove to themselves there are such men. The Allies say there are about 100,000 in fact, some reports have said the Reds, under the U-N proposal, would get back about three out of five prisoners.

And here is a report on air warfare during the month of April. Allied planes shot down 44 Communist planes. Our own losses were 35 planes destroyed, mostly by ground fire.

First Air Jet Transport To Begin Friday

LONDON, May 1 (UP)—The world's first jet transport passenger service begins tomorrow, when the British "Comet"—a four jet plane carrying 36 passengers, takes off from London for Johannesburg, South Africa. The distance, 6,725 miles. The scheduled flying time, 18 hours and 40 minutes, eight and one half hours less than standard flying time, even though the jet's route is 1000 miles longer than the usual trip.

Texas Agriculture Chief Wants Cotton Ceiling Up

AUSTIN, May 1 (UP)—Texas Agricultural Commissioner John C. White said the "cotton industry is demoralized" because of price ceilings set by the federal government on raw cotton. He says it is time for the government to end the confusion and set up a program which will be in line with the economic "realities of the situation."

White says he has written Price Stabilization Chief Ellis Arnall urging that the ceiling price of raw cotton be lifted, or that the government "at least provide support for the industry with a 100 per cent parity." White says he will make a trip to Washington for a conference with Arnall.

Pre-fabricated Bunker Appears In Korea

WITH THIRD DIVISION IN KOREA (UP)—The prefabricated bunker has made its debut on the Korean front.

Manufactured to specifications and assembled in the form of a kit for shipment to front-line positions, the new twist is expected to save hundreds of hours of back-breaking toil in filling sandbags.

All the infantrymen have to worry about is having a hole, dug to given directions, when the kit arrives. The pieces are fitted together and given finishing touches.

Government Will Try To End Steel Strikes

League Women Voters Study U. S. Politics

CINCINNATI, May 1 (UP)—The league of women voters has decided that the most important issue facing the country is an international, not a domestic, one.

One-thousand delegates to the league's annual national convention in Cincinnati decided yesterday that "the security of the United States" depends upon the building of a peaceful world.

The league members tonight will attend a forum in which five presidential candidates and a stand-in for Gen. Eisenhower will speak.

Slated to appear are Democratic hopefuls Estes Kefauver, Robert Kerr, and Averell Harriman. Republican aspirants will be Harold Stassen and Paul Hoffman, who will speak for Gen. Eisenhower.

Rain And Hail Hit Most Texas

Parts of Western Oklahoma and northern Texas have been threatened by tornadoes the past 24 hours brought about by a violent squall line which hit hard then moved out of the area.

Some minor damage has been reported from wind and hail but there are no reports of injuries. A Texas-Oklahoma circle about 50 miles in diameter was alerted for storms from mid-afternoon yesterday until early evening. And residents of Woodward, Oklahoma, which was hit by a tornado in 1947, say they saw as many as five funnel shaped clouds near the town yesterday.

Residents in a circle from Andorke and El Reno, Oklahoma through Hennessey, Munday and Paducah, Texas were alerted for storms.

Rains continued through north and west Texas yesterday, and the forecast calls for widely-scattered showers over all of central Texas which had more than one and one-quarter inches. Mineral Wells, Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Abilene, Del Rio, San Angelo, Waco, Austin and Junction.

Rent Controls Effective In Hidalgo County

The Office of Rent Stabilization has announced that immediate rent controls will go into effect in Hidalgo County, Texas.

Making the announcement in Washington, the Rent Stabilization Office said rents may be higher than the levels of January 1st, 1952 and any rents that have been increased since then must be rolled back to January 1st levels.

The order has been issued principally because of a heavy influx of defense workers employed by the Aluminum corporation of America.

Missouri Appoints Board To Study 4 State Highway

Impartiality In WSB Is Sought

IMPARTIALITY SOUGHT

WASHINGTON—The nature of decisions by the so-called public members of the Wage Stabilization Board shows clearly, says the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, that these members are far from impartial in differences arising between management and labor.

A striking instance, says the Chamber, is in the recent steel decision, where the public members went along with the members representing labor, and actually surprised the CIO by the lavishness of wage and fringe grants.

The Chamber sees much of the difficulty in the appointment as public members of men who have been arbitrators in other labor cases and as such have been subject to union pressures. Sometimes such members may be looking forward to arbitration as a paid profession and therefore are influenced. Current decisions could make them unpopular with union leadership. The unions, the Chamber adds, maintain effective blacklists of arbitrators whose decisions they don't like. The arbitrator who wants to continue in that work as a way of making a living, says the Chamber, must stay on the good side of the unions.

May Day Red Riots Erupt Berlin-Tokyo

May Day demonstrations have erupted into violence in Tokyo and Berlin. Three-hundred thugs and Communist-led Japanese demonstrators injured scores of Americans in street riots. One policeman and one roofer have been killed and at least 30 other police were injured. Two other rioters are reported dead and some 300 injured. In Berlin, 10,000 shouting Communist youths crossed the boundary into West Berlin and clashed with police in a battle of clubs and fire hoses, stones and fists. West Berlin police arrested 21 members of the mob.

LINCOLN, Neb., May 1 (UP)—The well-dressed young co-ed at Nebraska University is a bit short of lingerie today.

It happened in Lincoln, Neb., last night. About 400 male students got into a water fight, and when that simmered down, they marched on the sorority houses and the women's dormitories.

The students made for bureau and trunks and began ransacking and emerging with their trophies on high.

Sinclair Workers Here On Strike

Seven employees of the Sinclair Pipeline Company of Ranger are out on strike in connection with work stoppages on the coast in the refineries, according to A. N. Powell of the Sinclair office.

Powell stated that these men were members of the pipeline and maintenance crew working out of Ranger, and that no plant personnel were involved.

Powell also stated that as far as he knew there were no shut-downs of pump stations in this area from the strike. Supervisory personnel are keeping the plants running in the event of strike by the usual operating workers.

Jack Ross Named Secretary State

AUSTIN, May 1 (UP)—Jack Ross, 46-year-old former district attorney of Hidalgo County, is the new Secretary of State for Texas. He succeeds John Ben Sheppard who resigned to campaign for the post of attorney general.

Governor Allan Shivers made the appointment yesterday when Sheppard's resignation became effective. And Sheppard officially filed for attorney general yesterday.

Strikes Continue After Mills Fall To Federal Hands

The administration is getting ready for an effort to end the nationwide strike of steelworkers.

Commerce Secretary Charles Sawyer, the nominal head of the steel industry under the government seizure, is expected to try a back-to-work appeal, along with a call for immediately resumption of wage talks between union and industry.

If the appeal doesn't work, Justice Department lawyers say they'll go to court and get an injunction, ordering the steelworkers back to the mills.

It's the opinion of labor union circles that an injunction is the only thing steel union president Philip Murray will listen to.

The Commerce Secretary had promised a "statement on the situation" at a news conference this morning. But, after meeting with President Truman, he postponed the conference. It's now set for 11 a.m. CST.

MILLS IDLE

But getting the mills back in operation is only one problem in the complicated steel dispute. There still is the matter of wages for the workers. The industry is worried that the government, now that it has control of the mills again, may grant pay raises.

WAGE RAISE OPOSED

And steel company lawyers have asked an appellate court to forbid a government-imposed wage increase. Original plans called for Sawyer to put a 17 1/2 cent wage increase into effect this week. The court is holding hearings on the request.

Under persistent questioning by some of the judges, acting attorney-general Philip Perlman promised that "nothing will be done" on the wage question until tomorrow afternoon. That's the deadline set by the court for the government to appeal its case to the supreme court.

The government had asked for the time to appeal to the high court on the ruling of Judge David Pine that government seizure of the industry was illegal and unconstitutional.

SOUTHWEST MILLS CLOSED

Most of the Southwest's steel mills have completed "orderly shutdowns" as the industry was returned temporarily to the control of the government. A nationwide strike by United Steelworkers (CIO) spread rapidly into the southwestern area after a federal court nullified President Truman's seizure of the industry. He effects hang on today, even though the United States Circuit Court of Appeals has put the strike-bound mills back in possession of the government.

Alphonse Certenberg, staff representative for the Texas-Oklahoma district of the union, said last night that all steel mills in the two-state area are "being picketed or soon will be." But the steel walkout was not called off immediately despite the court decision and Certenberg said "there are no negotiation meetings scheduled" in this area.

20,000 IDLED IN TEXAS

Meanwhile, refineries continue to shut down because of the nationwide united oilworkers strike. The Phillips Petroleum Company's butadiene plant at Borger is shutting down even though 3000 AFL employees of the firm reached a new wage agreement last night. Some 350 CIO employees of the plant are among the 30,000 oilworkers in the Southwest who are striking.

A coalition of 22 unions called the nationwide strike after twice postponing it at government request. And an estimated 20,000 oilworkers have struck at Texas refineries.

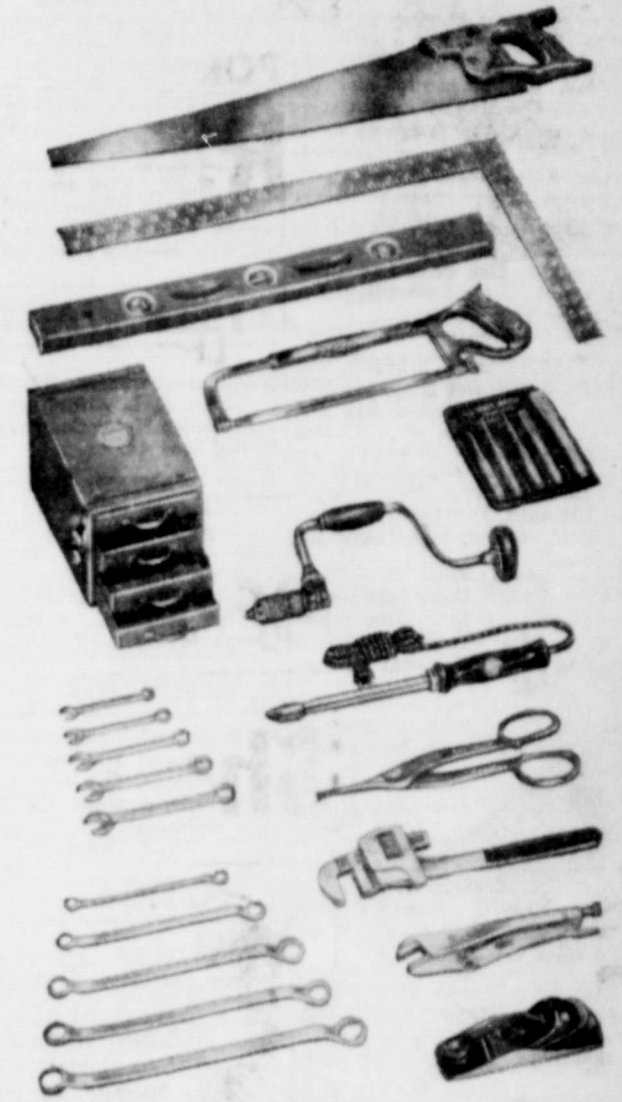

USCC Advances Ideas On How To Cut Budget

WASHINGTON — Thirty-one years ago Congress established the Budget Bureau and the General Accounting Office to supply means of curbing federal spending. That year the treasury paid out a little more than \$5 billion and had left over a surplus of \$509 million. The next year spending fell to \$3.3 billion and there was a \$736 million surplus.

It looked like a great idea, says the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, which is spearheading a national drive to cut government costs. But, adds the Chamber, later Congressional laxity defeated the high purpose of an earlier economy-minded Congress.

For the coming fiscal year the President's budget proposes an \$85.4 billion outgo, and against tax collections of an estimated \$71 billion, which would increase the national debt by \$15.4 billion. That, says the Chamber, threatens the soundness of the national economy, a basic weapon in the struggle for world freedom.

The Chamber proposes reducing the budget to \$71 billion to bring it in balance with expected revenues. It has pointed out 10 directions in which that saving could be made, the largest items of which are in foreign aid and in military spending. The Chamber recommends the spending for foreign aid of existing unspent funds before making additional appropriations for that purpose. It sees evidences of large waste in military spending.

In addition to proposing specific cuts in spending, the Chamber would tighten up budgetary controls. To that end, it offers these recommendations:

Return to a single package appropriation bill.

Strengthen the Appropriations Committee staff.

Create a joint Congressional Budget Committee.

Adopt a schedule to eliminate last-minute appropriation log-jams.

Require committee estimates of the 5-year cost of all projects, as well as 5-year estimates in the annual budget estimates.

Require a record vote on all appropriations.

Strengthen the General Accounting Office.

Retain the Joint Committee on Reduction of Non-Essential Expenditures.

Have Congress re-examine annually earlier authorizations and appropriations, and also re-examine grants-in-aid, subsidies and commitments which might be discontinued or returned to the states.

PROPER RECORDS GUARD SPOUSE'S SEPARATE PROPERTY

Texas is generally aware that we have what is known as the "community property" system in this state, but many do not understand the significance and implications of this fact.

Most of the property acquired by a husband and wife, or either of them, during their marriage belongs to them jointly and is referred to as "community property." In fact, the law presumes that all property acquired during their marriage by gift or inheritance unless the contrary is clearly proved.

Not included in this category is property owned by either husband and wife before marriage, and that which is acquired by either of the latter by gift or inheritance. Such items are regarded as the separate property of the individual spouse.

May the husband and wife divide their community property so that each will thereafter own one-half of it as his or her own separate property until the passage of a recent constitutional amendment, such action was not permitted by our laws. Now, existing community property may be so divided under certain circumstances. However, an agreement by the husband and wife that future earnings or income will be separate property is invalid.

In contrast, it has always been possible to convert separate property into community property. This is usually done unintentionally when separate property is

will, since community property passes in one way and separate property in another. Or, one of the parties may lose his right to what was once "separate" property to whomsoever he chooses.

Other consequences include the possibility that the separate property of one spouse may become subject to the debts of the community or of the other spouse. Or, if a divorce should occur, one of the parties may lose part of his separate estate during division of the couple's various properties.

The distinction between separate and community property is important for many reasons, and married persons owning separate property should normally exercise care to prevent its being commingled with the community estate. Lawyers say that separate bank accounts and proper records will help keep matters straight.

Early Control Cotton Insects Prove Profitable

COLLEGE STATION, May—Records prove that early season control of certain cotton insects is both effective and profitable. Allen C. Gunter, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says early season control insures early fruiting in areas where thrips, aphids or cotton lice, fleashoppers and boll weevils, alone or in combination, causes damage every year.

In addition to the early fruiting, he says it insures earlier maturity of the crop and better grade; reduces boll weevil hazards; makes possible earlier harvesting; earlier destruction of the stalks and under favorable conditions yields will be increased.

The early season control program will be more effective if carried out on a community or county-wide basis, however the individual farmer can expect considerable benefit if he carries out a good program, says Gunter.

The first application of the insecticides should normally be made when the cotton plant is in the four-leaf stage. However in some cases, earlier applications may be necessary to control thrips. Gunter points out that from two to four applications of the insecticides are usually needed but this will depend upon the infestations and weather conditions. Regarding the number of applications, he says the last one should be made before blooming time or 30 days before bollworms usually appear. This is very important and the final results of the control program may well hinge on the stopping time. This period of time is needed to allow the population of beneficial insects to build up as a protection against bollworms.

Since the time for ending early season control varies with different sections of the state, the state, the specialist suggests that farmers consult their local county agent for more information on this very important item.

Cotton farmers should remember that boll weevils emerging from winter hibernation begin feeding on the young cotton plants soon after it is up. Later they start laying eggs in the squares. If they can be controlled before the eggs are deposited, their numbers will be reduced and later control will be easier and less expensive, says Gunter.
