## COURT HOLDS NEW RATES AFFORD COMPANY RELIEF

Judge George L. Davenport, of the 81st District Court, of Eastland, has denied the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company the rate increase that it sought in Ranger, through a temporary injunction that would set aside telephone rates set by city commission in November, 1948, and also a new rate set in April of 1952.

The judge in his order stated that the new rates of April 1952 afforded a substantial increase over the old rates. And that the telephone company should wait a sufficient time to determine whether or not they will make money on the new rates. If they do not make money on the new rates, then the court ruled, that they should seek adjustment of the new rates before the Ranger City Commission before coming again to the court for relief.

## Texas Cancer Crusade Will Be Extended

KELTYS, Texas—The Texas Cancer Crusade of the American Cancer Society has been extended in some areas, Ernest L. Kurth, state chairman, announced.

The Kelty's lumberman and industrialist explained that the education and fund-raising program usually held in April could not be organized, and completed entirely during that month.

"Some areas delayed their Crusade to allow other campaigns to conclude," he explained. "Other communities felt that local conditions called for a short delay in their Crusade, so that it could be widespread to reach the greatest number of people. To insure its success, we therefore extended the state wide Crusade."

The Texas Cancer Crusade has two aims, he said.

"One is to reach as many Texans as possible with the life-saving message about cancer. We know that many needless deaths can be prevented. From 3000 to 4000 such deaths probably could be prevented in Texas this year, if people know the truth about cancer and receive prompt, adequate treatment for it when it first appears."

"We want to use leaflets, movie films, speeches, exhibits and person-to-person contact to tell people how they may save their own lives from cancer."

## A&M Conducting Special Camp During Summer

COLLEGE STATION, April—(Sp.)—Going to College? Know what you want to major in—and do you know the why's and where-fors of a college education?

Texas A. and M. College is now answering those questions to high school graduates who plan to enter college this fall.

It is a new venture in education and in its two years of operation has proved successful.

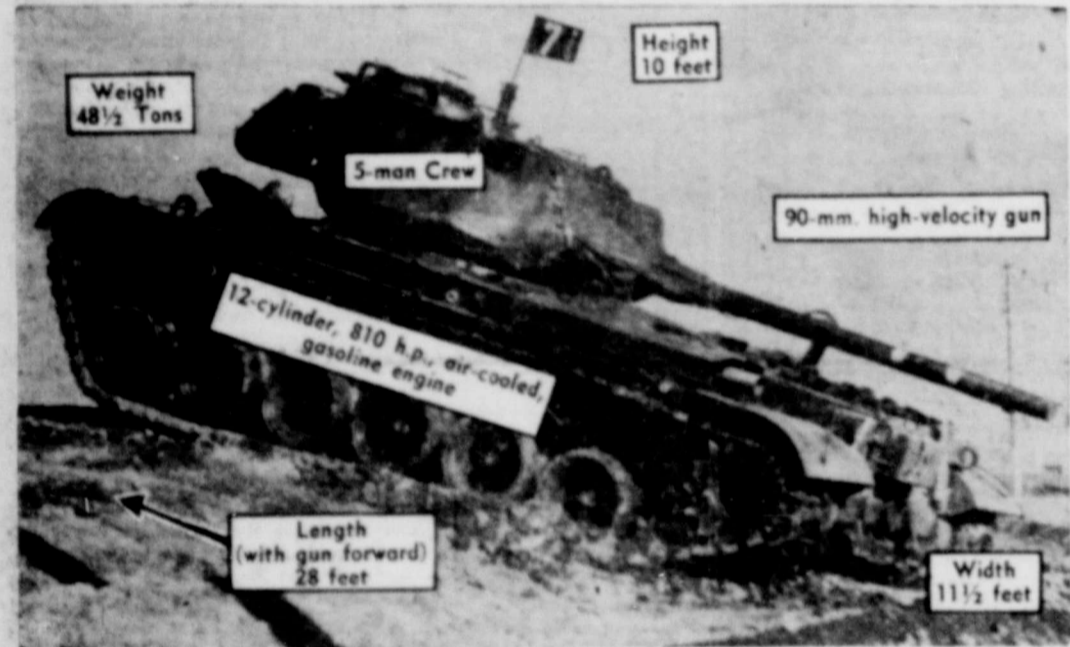

## Miss Hagaman, Mr. McGrath To Wed May 17

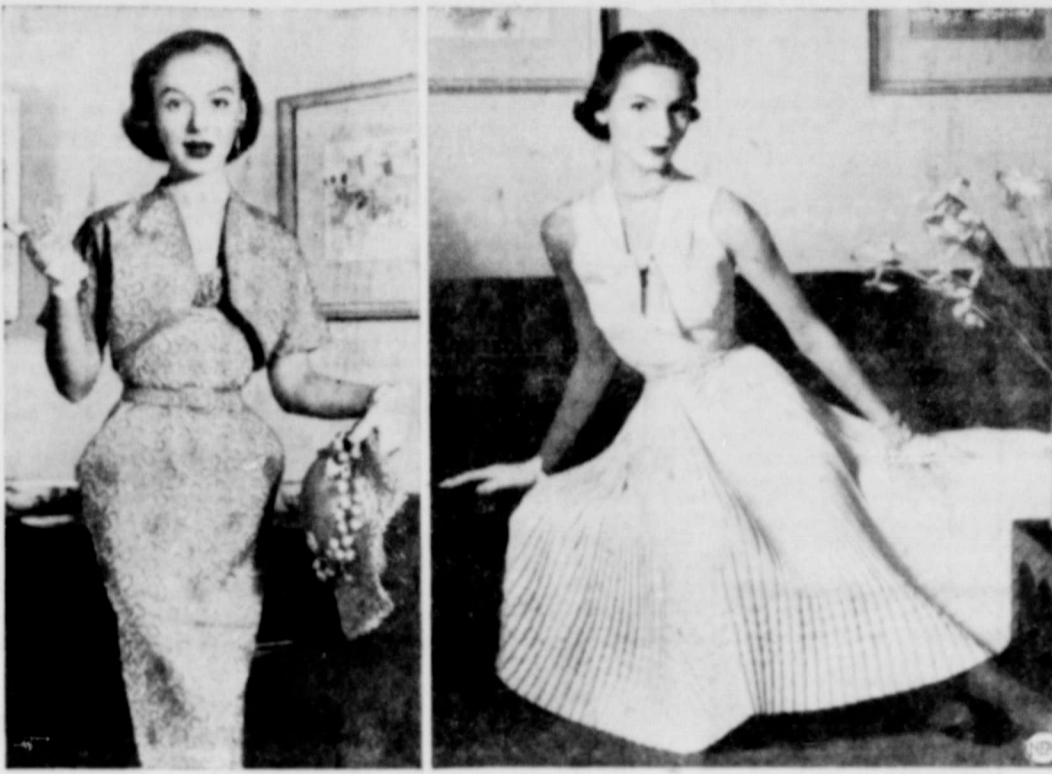

## Washable Wardrobe New Fabrics Need Special Handling



NEW YORK (NEA) — Finding out just how a fabric will act in the tub and on the ironing board is an important part of stretching the wardrobe dollar in this year of high living costs.

Among the fabrics least understood by the most women, rayon and acetate rank high. Few women realize that the two take a totally different handling and that when the two yarns are used in combination the procedure for acetate is the right one to use.

Rayon, for instance, can take heat without melting and therefore can be ironed with a hot iron.

Similarly, it can be safely washed in hot water.

But acetate, which women tend to confuse with rayon, will "fuse" if a hot iron descends upon it. This means that acetate gets a warm—never a hot—iron. And it follows that acetate must be handled with care in washing. Water must be lukewarm and the soap mild.

Acetate dries faster than rayon but it is also less absorbent, which means that rayon is somewhat more comfortable to wear. The

two fabrics are equally and wholly moth-resistant and neither one deteriorates with age. Both retain their whiteness without need for bleaching.

Acetate is the fabric (left) used by Filrod for a dress with bolero jacket that slips off for dressy occasions. Trapunto work in an all-over pattern is used for surface interest.

Carolyn Schauer uses rayon and acetate in combination (right) for this flowing crepe with sweeping, pleated skirt. Done in a light weight, it's a fashion rightly designed for wear through spring and into summer.

## Jet Airliner Completes London To Africa Trip

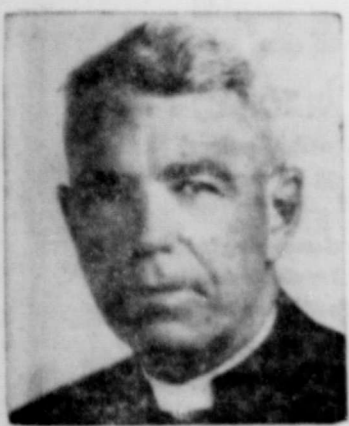
