QUESTION: I have been getting water in the cellar of my new home through the joint where the wall and cellar floor meet. What can I do to correct this fault?

—R. C. P., Mortes, Pa.

ANSWER: There are two methods used to cute this defect. First one is to cut out a groove along the joint with a cold chisel and harmore, to a depth of about 2 inches. Fill the groove with waterproof cement. The second method is forming a cove about 2 inches up the wall, using waterproof cement. Where the wall or floor have been painted, the first method is best, as a bond between new coment and a painted surface is carely successful. You can obtain the waterproofing liquid to mix with cement from building supply dealers.





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
