ANSWER: Using a sealer on the brick is good practice to preserve them against deterioration. Alto, "weep holes" are a good idea to prevent rot of the sill. These may be drilled through the brick at the sill line, squared off with a cold chiest. Air admitted through these holes will help dry up the sampened wood.


