and dysentery. The spread of polio, for instance, has been blamed on weeds, tir, bananas, miik, atomic rediation and many other other items All of these are theories and have no basis fact. Facts in disease are rrived at in the laboratory, the sick room and the environment of the patient. Facts are necessary and must be the guidepost for the

ontrol of disease Dr. Cox is authorized by law to ccept gifts and contributions for public health. The first gift to aid in research on the part played y flies and cockroaches in the pread of polio is two monkeys from Bellaire. Others will be needed to complete the study. Any con-

bution will be appreciated. Education work is dysentery and diarrhea-which kills far more children than polio-is being hampered by lack of personnel to do the work. Cox said Texas has six times more drysentery and diarthen the rational average. There were 1099 infants under one year of age who died of this cause in 951.

"When we get rid of these wo filth borne diseases, we will have done the best thing in the world to get rid of polio," he as "But it takes resources erted.

To keep linoleum bright and shiny, Miss Bell points out that mop or soft brush is better than broom. Oil mops should never e used because they leave an oily coating that catches dirt. To, oil discolors linoleum. Alkaline oap abrasive cleaning compounds end to soften scratch and rougher he surface of linoleum.

It is a good idea to remove surface spots immediately, especially grease. The specialist sugests to clean linoleum ase a amp mop with a solution of warm water and mild soap. This removes dirt, grease and old wax. Then ase clear water for rinsing.



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

Wooten Resigns As Constable Cisco Precinct


