Thanks to the American Waterworks Association, here are some approved suggestions relative to an important matter—the conserving of water.

With the current situation as it is, perhaps it would be well to check over the AWA's list of do's and don'ts.

Open faucets any more than necessary to obtain the amount of water you actually need at the moment.

Flush toilets unnecessarily—this is a major use of water, and to employ toilets as waste receptacles for contents of ash trays or such debris is wasteful.

Wash dishes under streams of running water.

Leave water running while you shave. At three gallons a minute, you use thirty gallons of water when the tap is open ten minutes.

Run water to get it hot enough for heating the baby's bottle—or such purposes. Heat it on the stove.

Rinse out milk or soft drink bottles during the emergency. They have to be sterilized before they're used again, anyway.

Keep the water running in your chairside bowl if you're a dentist.

Drench your household plants. Give them enough moisture to live, but not a flood.

Serve drinking water as a routine at meals, but put it on the table only when it's desired and requested.

Over rinse if you're a photographer.

## Spindle Rites Held In Ranger This Afternoon

Funeral services for Thomas J. Spindle, 46-year-old Ranger resident, were held at the First Methodist Church in Ranger this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The Rev. D. M. Duke, pastor of the Nazarene Church, officiated during the rites. He was assisted by the Rev. Garland Lavender, pastor of the Ranger church.

Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery with Killingsworth Funeral Home, Ranger, in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Spindle, who resided at Eastland Hill, Rt. 2, Ranger, died in a Ranger hospital early Tuesday morning, following a very brief illness.

He had been a resident of Ranger for 25 years and prior to his death he had been an agent for the American National Insurance Company. Previously he had been in the grocery business in Dublin for 7 years.

Mr. Spindle, born at Snyder on Jan. 17, 1896, was united in marriage with Miss Lillian Hancey of Ranger on June 11, 1928. He was a member of the First Methodist Church of Ranger.

Survivors include the widow; two sons, Richard Lee Spindle and Oran Randall Spindle, of the home address; one daughter, Joyce Ann Spindle, also of the home address; three sisters, Mrs. Jess Moran of Ranger, Mrs. H. J. Keener of Houston and Mrs. J. I. Fox of Houston; one brother, M. L. Spindle of Eastland; and his mother, Mrs. Luna E. Spindle of Ranger.

Pallbearers at the funeral were A. S. Williams and W. R. Rainwater of Ranger, R. W. Grider of Cisco, G. L. Casstevens of Stephenville, R. W. Holder of Eastland, and J. C. Patterson of Abilene.

## STATE WENT REPUBLICAN BACK IN 1928, BUT COUNTY GAVE AL SMITH MAJORITY

The big 804 question in Texas and Eastland County today—Will Texas, will Eastland County, go "Eisenhower" in next Tuesday's general election?

A check back into the archives at the Eastland County courthouse at Eastland reveals the already widely known fact that Texas did go Republican in a presidential election.

That was back in 1928—24 years ago—when Lone Star voters chose to deliver the state's electoral votes to Republican nominee Herbert Hoover. The issue that year which caused the normally Democratic ballot to support the GOP's standard bearer was religion—Democrat Alfred E. Smith of New York was a Catholic.

Despite the fact that the state went Republican in the 1928 presidential election, Eastland County remained Democratic, although by a small majority, county records show. Total vote of the county's combined precincts was about 6,500 and candidates Hoover and Smith polled a few more than 3,000 ballots each. The margin for Smith was very slim, but he did carry Eastland County.

Triennially and semi-annually, Eastland County, along with Texas as a whole, votes free-free on a Democratic ticket.

For instance, in the last presidential election—1948—Eastland County gave President Harry Truman 5,121 votes while Alvin Thomas E. Dewey, the GOP candidate, polled 3,749 for lower 1,177.

According to county officials, today the vote was more than 3,000 voters in Eastland County who are eligible to cast ballots in Tuesday's general election.

And county politicians estimate that the area—having unusually pleasant weather, which might seriously hamper transportation of many voters in remote rural sections of Eastland County—will vote practically its full strength.

## Dr. Ed Blackwell Of Gorman, Will Be Buried Today

Dr. Ed Blackwell, 62, of Gorman, passed away Tuesday evening at 11 o'clock from a heart ailment that he had been suffering for many months. Funeral services will be conducted from the Methodist Church in Gorman at 3 o'clock this (Wednesday) afternoon, with Rev. J. L. Ray, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in Gorman cemetery.

Dr. Blackwell had been a resident of Gorman since 1918, and was well and favorably known, because of connection with the hospital there. He was very active in Methodist Church circles and has served in many capacities, including trustee.

He became ill early this year and spent several weeks in a hospital in Fort Worth, but returned to his home in Gorman early in May. While he has been rather inactive for months, his condition was probably more grave than many thought.

He was preceded in death by his wife in 1951.

Survivors include his father and Edward Ferriss, four brothers, Dr. Almas Blackwell of Stamford, Albers of Lubbock, Arthur of Oklahoma City, and Dr. G. C. Blackwell of Gorman. Also one sister, Mrs. Bell Harrison.

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# Campaign Sizzles In Texas

Three speeches by Vice President Alben Barkley highlighted the Texas political scene Wednesday following major addresses Tuesday night by Sen. Tom Connally and the man who will succeed him in the Senate, Attorney General Price Daniel.

Connally told an Abilene audience: "If you want real economy in the armed forces, you'd better not give the job of president to a general."

Daniel, a supporter of Dwight D. Eisenhower, said in a state-wide broadcast: "The national Democratic party of your forefathers and my forefathers does not exist any more... All that is left is the name."

At the same time, Jesse Jones' newspaper, the Houston Chronicle, reported the former Cabinet member had given money to both parties, not merely to the Democratic campaign fund.

Stevenson's campaign. That was taken to mean the Houston financier supported Stevenson.

The Chronicle reported, however, that Jones gave to both parties.

Jones has not announced which candidate he supports.

Barkley was due to land in Dallas at 1 p.m. for a short talk at Love Field. He was due to speak in Tyler at 3:30 p.m. and make a major address at 8 p.m. in Austin.

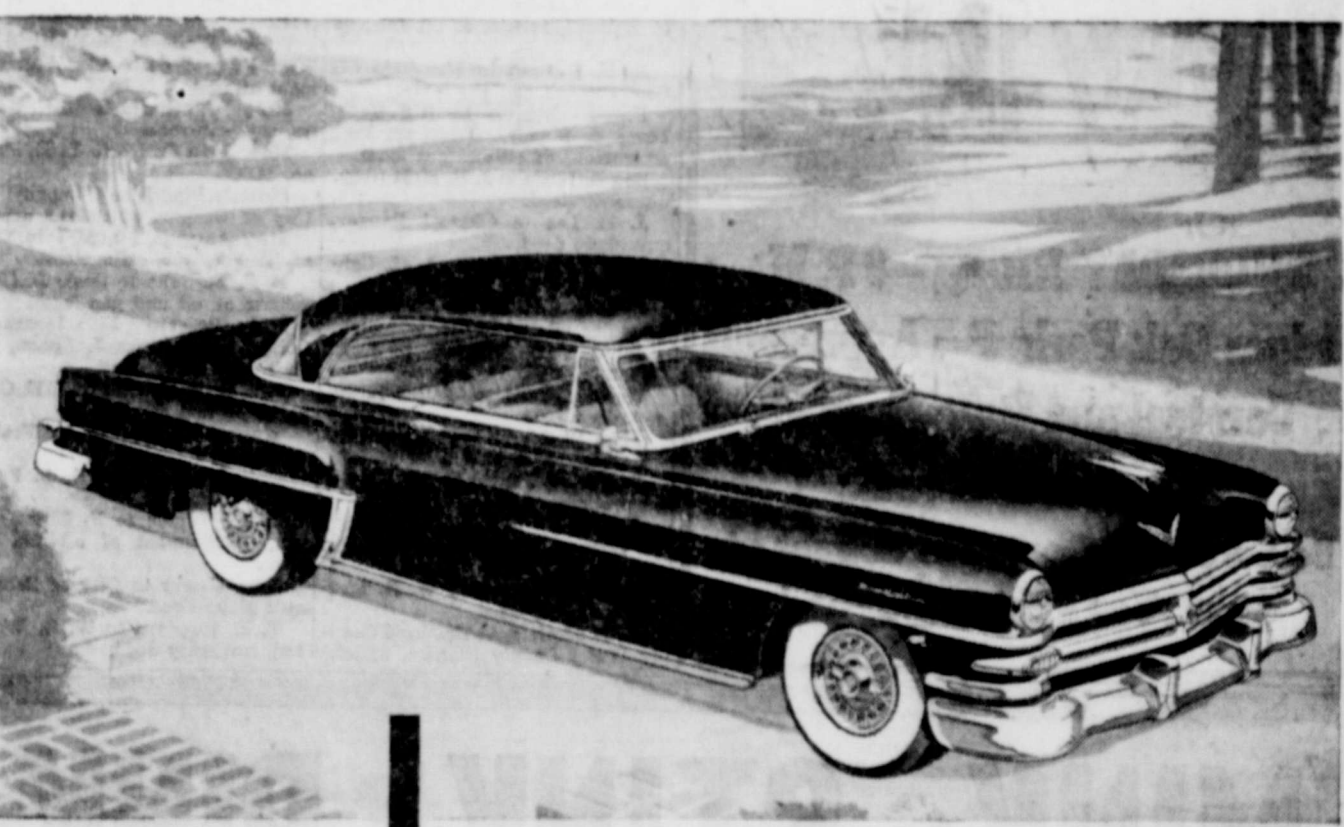

Judge Grissom is chairman of the Committee on Uniformity of Rules of Appeal, a member of the committee to amend the election laws; on the Administrative Districts Committee; and on the Committee for Revision of Probate Laws.

The meeting of the Civil Judicial Council was held in Austin on Thursday, just prior to the meeting of the Judges' Association, on Friday and Saturday.

Judge and Mrs. Grissom joined Friday by Associate Justice and Mrs. Milburn S. Long and Associate Justice and Mrs. Cecil C. Collins. The Judges' Convention is held annually and is composed of District Judges throughout the state together with Appellate judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the Supreme Court of Texas.

The Texas Civil Judicial Council was created by the Legislature of Texas, and is a group of six members whose duty is reporting annually to the Supreme Court, the Governor of Texas, and the Legislature. Their purpose is primarily to simplify and improve the administration of justice in Texas, and one of the present efforts of the Council is to simplify and make uniform the rules on appeal cases from the trial court to the Appellate Courts of Texas.

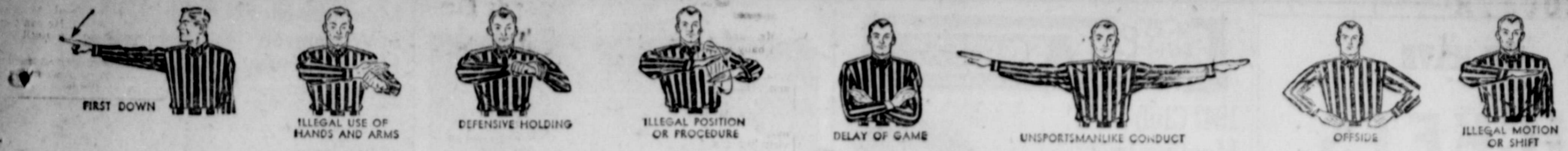

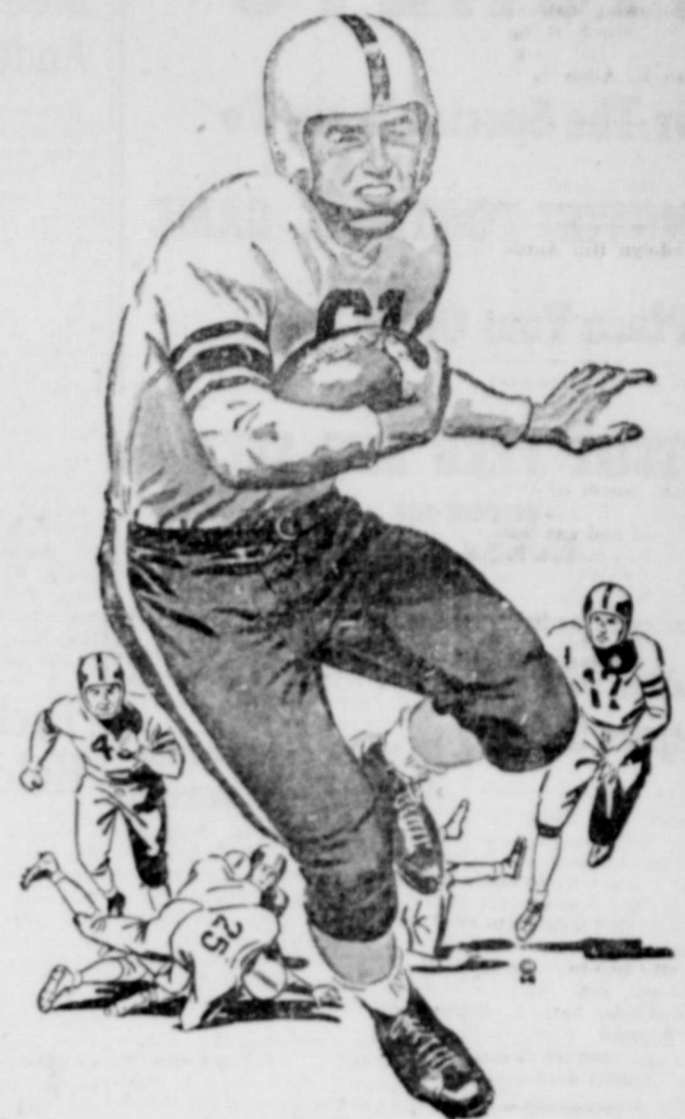
