

Grapefruit Gives You A Great Lift



Florida is a nice place to go when it starts getting cool, but even if a can't go south, you can enjoy Florida's big juicy grapefruit now being shipped to almost every section of the country.

Here are four ways to serve vitamin C-rich grapefruit halves—ail of them a little different. Everyone will love grapefruit if you make it easy to get the succulent fruit out of the shell. To properly prepare it, cut the fruit in half; remove core. Cut around each section, loosening fruit from membrane. Do not cut around entire outer edge of fruit. Here's how to do the four variations shown:

Broiled Grapefruit: Sprinkle grapefruit half with 1 tablespoon sugar and a dash of cinnamon, mace or nutmeg, if desired; dot with 1 teaspoon butter. Place grapefruit on broiler rack 3 inches from heat. Broil slowly 15 to 20 minutes or until grapefruit is slightly brown and heated through. Grapefruit may also be baked in a moderately hot oven (400°F.) 15 to 20 minutes. Serve hot.

Grapefruit With Grape Garnish: Slice seedless grapes in half. Arrange 7 or 8 halves in center of grapeifuit to represent bunch of grapes as shown above.

Grapefruit With Cranberry Garnish: Cut slice of cranberry jelly with amall star shaped cookie cutter. Place cranberry star in center of grapefruit half.

Grapefruit Salad Bowl: Follow directions for preparing grapefruit halves. Remove sections from half; reserve. Cut out membrane remaining in shell to make "Salad Bowl." Combine grapefruit sections with diced celery and chicken, shrimp or tuna. Moisten with mayonnaise. Refall shells with salad and garnish with watercress.

Loan Sharks In **Texas Under Fire**

To evade the constitutional limtation on interest, Texas lean sharks resort to devious methods, the most used scheme at present being "credit insurance", declares E. C. Fritz, Dallas attorney, who has made a stuly of the loan shark evil as a member of the anti-usury emmittee of the State Junior Bar

Association. Credit insurance is somewhat involved and intricate but the practical result is that the borrower pays approximately 140 per cent nterest. Here is the way it works: A man has urgent need for \$25. He gives a note to be paid in three months in weekly install-ments. He is charged 24 cents as interest (10 per cent) plus a "ser gets the \$25, he is told:

"Something might happen to accident, serious illness, eve death, so you must take ou health, accident and life insurance

to protect us against loss."

The premium on the insurance is \$7.96, which makes the total cost of the \$25 loan \$34.20. The insurance company receives 15 per cent of the premium; the loan company, as "agent" is allowed a

even with this: So far from desiring to help a borrower work out financial problems, the con pany wants to keep him in debt So if he misses a weekly install receive a phone call, "Come down and renew."

Most of what he has already paid has been applied to the insurand the interest but suppose h has paid sufficient to reduce the \$34.20 face amount of the note to \$20. He signs a new note for the original amount (\$34.20) and recives \$5 in cash.
