The hazard of this disease butchering, unless safeguards are exercised. Rats should be exter-minated because they play an important part in the spread of in fection among swine. Prolonged refrigeration, as carried out un der federal supervision, destroys trichina larvae. Thorough cooking and the use of meat which bears the stamp of federal inspection are safeguards against trichinosis








Heart disease patients should re bed, according to two Boston specialists, Drs. Samuel A. Levine and Bernard Lown.

The doctors, associated with the eter Bent Brigham Hospital and Harvard Medical School, reported n the Journal of the American dical Association that armchair omotes rapid recovery from acucoronary thrombosis.

Strict bedrest is injurious to patients with congestive heart faile, they said.

They based their conclusions or study of 81 persons suffering om acute coronary thrombosis Eight of the patients, or 9.9 per ent, died. But the doctors sai the deaths could not be attributed to any complications arising from the armchair therapy.
