# Area Highway Deaths Drop, Report Says

Only one-fourth as many persons died on highways in the 13-county area of the Abilene District of the State Highway Patrol in the first two months of 1953 than did in the same period of last year, the Department of Public Safety announced today.

In 1952, it was reported, only one person was killed in an automobile accident in February and three in January as compared to four in February and two in January of 1952.

There were no traffic fatalities in Eastland County during the first two months of 1953, but deaths occurred in Fisher, Jones, Shackelford and Taylor Counties.

Area and state law enforcement officers were continuing a vigilant lookout Saturday for a hijacker who robbed a Dallas motorist of about \$40 in cash and took the Dallasite's vehicle at gunpoint two miles east of Ranger Hill on U. S. Highway 80 around dawn Friday.

Ranger Police Chief W. G. Pounds said late Friday that a "John Doe" warrant had been issued for the arrest of the hijacker on a charge of armed robbery. A description of the man was broadcast to all law enforcement agencies—city, county and state—from Ranger police headquarters over the local radio unit.

W. W. Blocker of Dallas, driving a black 1947 Plymouth sedan, was enroute to Abilene when he stopped at the traffic circle west of Fort Worth and picked up a hijacker who told the Dallasite he was headed for Abilene.

About two miles east of Ranger Hill, the hijacker, described as "well-dressed," pulled a revolver, jammed it into Blocker's side and ordered him to pull off the highway. After taking the Dallas man's billfold which, in addition to \$40, included all of his personal identification papers, driver's license, social security card, etc., the assailant ordered Blocker to get out of the car and then roared away westward.

The missing car was registered in the name of Blocker's wife, Mrs. Margaret Blocker, 4555 Potomac, Dallas.

Blocker walked two miles to the Ranger Hill Cafe and a waitress called the Ranger Police Department.

Police Chief Pounds said the armed robbery and car theft occurred about 5 a.m. Friday.

Early Saturday there were no further reports regarding the wanted fugitive.

The man sought by officers is described as about 5 feet 9 inches tall, dark complexioned with dark hair. He was wearing a navy blue serge suit and a white shirt but no hat.

## Defendants Found Guilty In 91st Court

Several convictions in jury trials in the 91st District Court at Eastland were reported today in a summary issued by County Attorney J. M. Nuesse.

The grand jury, in session Monday and Tuesday at Eastland, has been recessed until Monday, March 30.

Coe Owen Garrett, tried on a plea of not guilty to charges of driving while under the influence of intoxicants, was found guilty Monday and his punishment was affixed at a fine of \$100 and ten days in jail. His driver's license was suspended for a period of six months. His attorney gave notice of appeal.

Doyle Gilmore of Cisco was tried in the same court Wednesday on a plea of not guilty to charges of possessing whiskey for the purpose of sale. He was convicted and assessed a fine of \$400 and sentenced to serve 60 days in jail. Defense attorneys gave notice of appeal.

The case of the State of Texas vs. Mae King was re-affirmed on March 11 by the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin, Mr. Nuesse reported. The King case was tried last September 17, before a jury in the 91st District Court, and the defendant was found guilty of selling beer in a dry area and her punishment was affixed at a fine of \$500 and six months in jail.

Other recent court activities include the conviction of Charlie Matthew Bush, Abilene, on charges of driving while intoxicated. He was fined \$100 and costs. A. J. Byrd, Eastland, was convicted on a similar offense and was fined \$50 and costs. Driver's license of both defendants were suspended for six months.

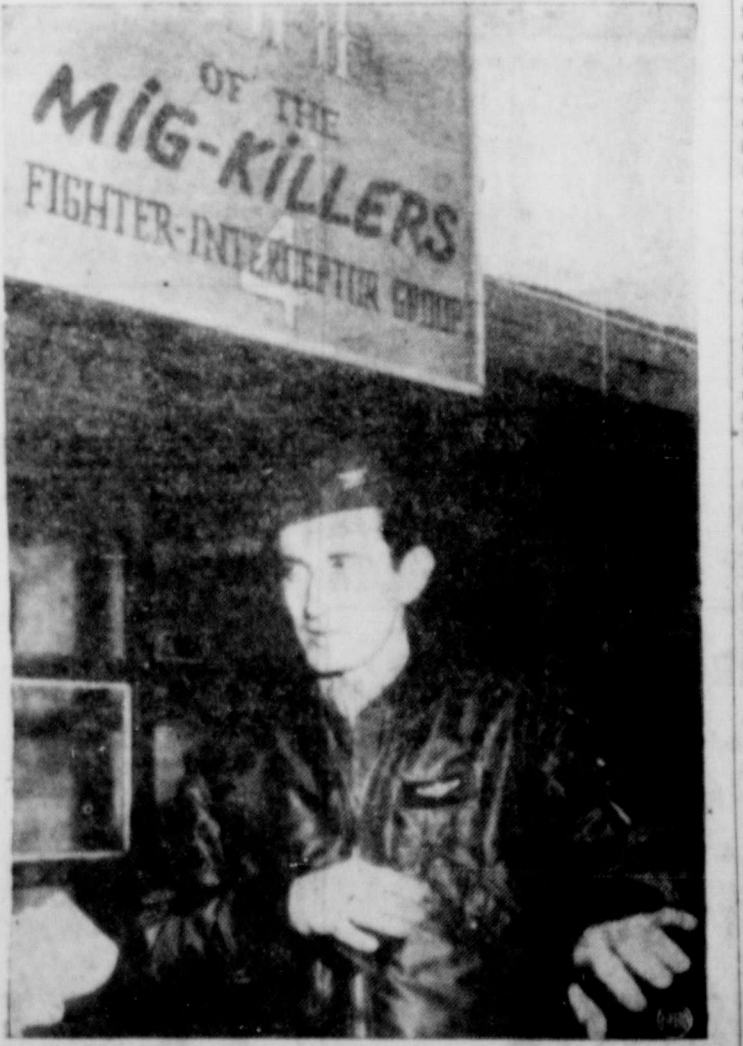

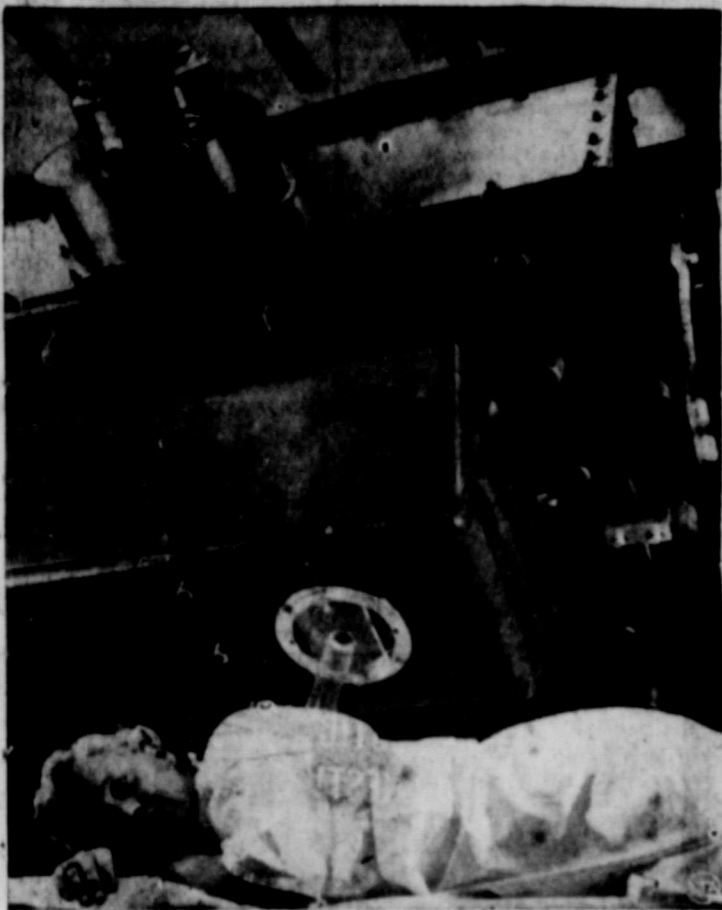

It has been brought to the at-

tention of the American Legion, of which the Dulin-Daniels Post No. 70 in Eastland, is a part, that an injustice is being done to their friends and buddies. 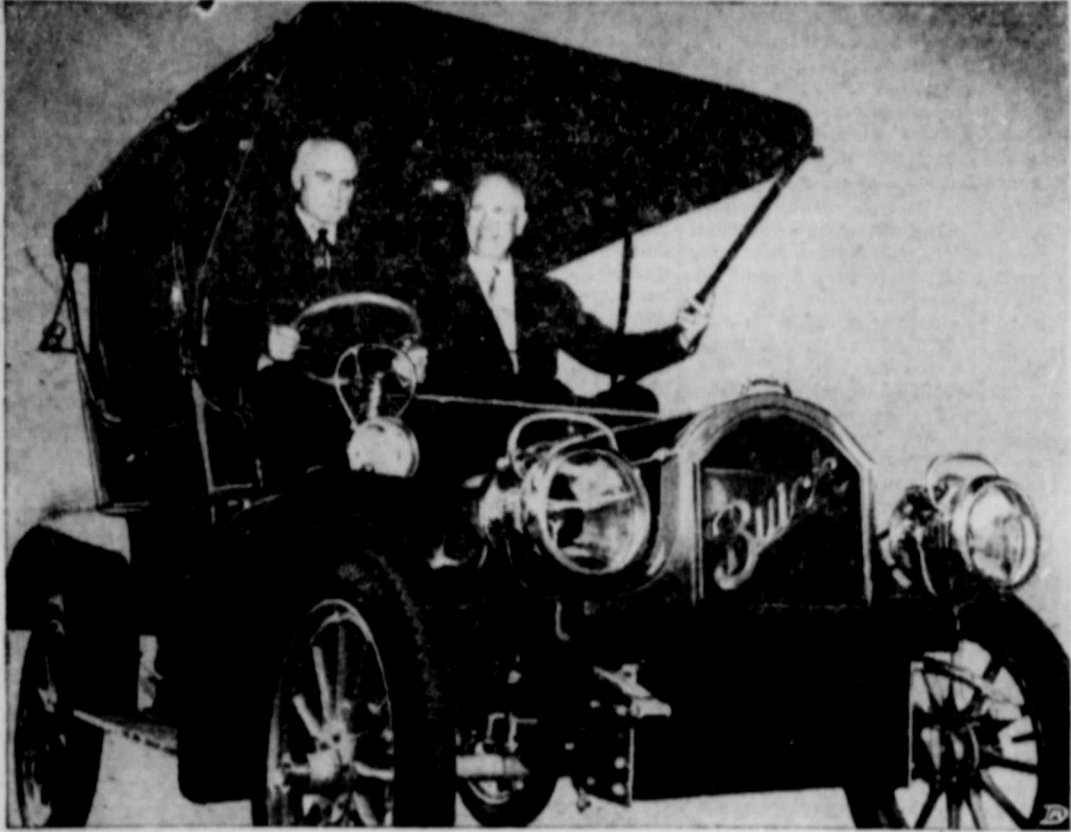

### REFLECTIONS FROM LIFE

Usually there are two sides to everything. We have the right and wrong, black and white, good and bad always two contrasts until we begin dealing in personalities, and here we find three. Many arguments might be ended if contending parties would only realize this truth, and the world would be a lot happier. After a heated discussion you will hear that "there are two sides to every question." This statement is two-thirds correct, for there are really three sides — your side, my side and the right side, but we find all too many people interested in "their side" rather than the "right" side. When contending parties are willing to accept the "right side" squabbling usually ceases.

America is described as a Christian nation, yet we have teeming millions of people who are Christian in name only. They do not love God, and have never felt any desire to serve Him. All they want is perfect freedom as they enjoy a life of sin. They have no desire to have their names appear on the Lamb's Book of God, just hope that in some miraculous way God will neglect to enter their name on the list of the damned. This type person never realizes the comforting power of God until

the cold sweat of death begins settling on their brow, and they go into a kind of tail-spin as they plead for mercy. We wouldn't care to say this type cannot be saved, but we would sure hate to risk it. When we know that they have sinned all the days of their life, that they have never taken time out to consider God and His promises, we can't imagine "conversion"—they are simply scared. The above is only one man's opinion, and we hope we are wrong.

The coldest statement we have ever heard, or maybe read, came from the mouth of our president when a statement acknowledging Stalin's death was sent to the "powers that be" in Russia. It merely mentioned that as a kind of forced state duty America would admit that Stalin is dead. No love, no sympathy, no condolence—just "dry ice." He spoke his own feeling and the feeling of America, and he spoke the truth. No kidding. To have done otherwise would have been treason, and Eisenhower will never be guilty of this.

Why should he have spilled the "milk of human kindness" on Russia, when it was neither deserved or expected? Concerning Russian people, who are not guilty of crime, he was prayerfully sympathetic. Not because of their loss of Stalin, but rather a prayer for an improved future well being.

People and nations are responsible themselves, when they become degenerate. People around them have nothing to do with it. Russia has never cared to be considered as a nation among nations, but rather has discouraged such a

thing. They remain behind the iron curtain as a matter of choice—they erected it. Their deeds are evil, and they have no desire to display them. This is the reason they are despised by those about them. They have nothing in common with any other nation—not even their satellites.

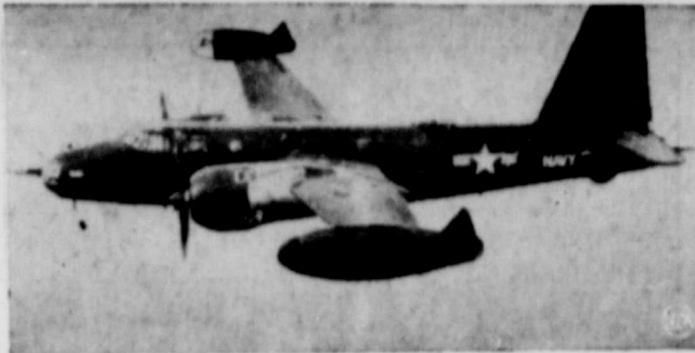
Russia is not a building nation, but rather a wrecking nation. Her sole aim seems to be that of erasing the name of God from all mankind everywhere. They offer nothing better, just dispute God's word.

Stalin's funeral was the coldest thing we can imagine. Just one infidel eulogizing another. Cold, meaningless, sordid, were his words. God was not recognized and if he had the benefit of prayers they came from the silent followers of God, and were not asked or even appreciated. He lived and died quite satisfied with Carl Marx philosophy. "A man lives and he dies—that's all."

Not very comforting, to say the least.

He never did anything to make the world better—just left a trail of blood and brutality, which will be forgotten just as soon as another atheist can be sworn in as a successor.

That Russia is headed for a fall is sure. Revelation tells us about this, but we are not quite sure that there is a living man who has completely mastered this "revelation." Many think they do and to hear them talk you would imagine St. John Divine was on their payroll at the time it was written. We once thought we understood the Book of Revelation, but know

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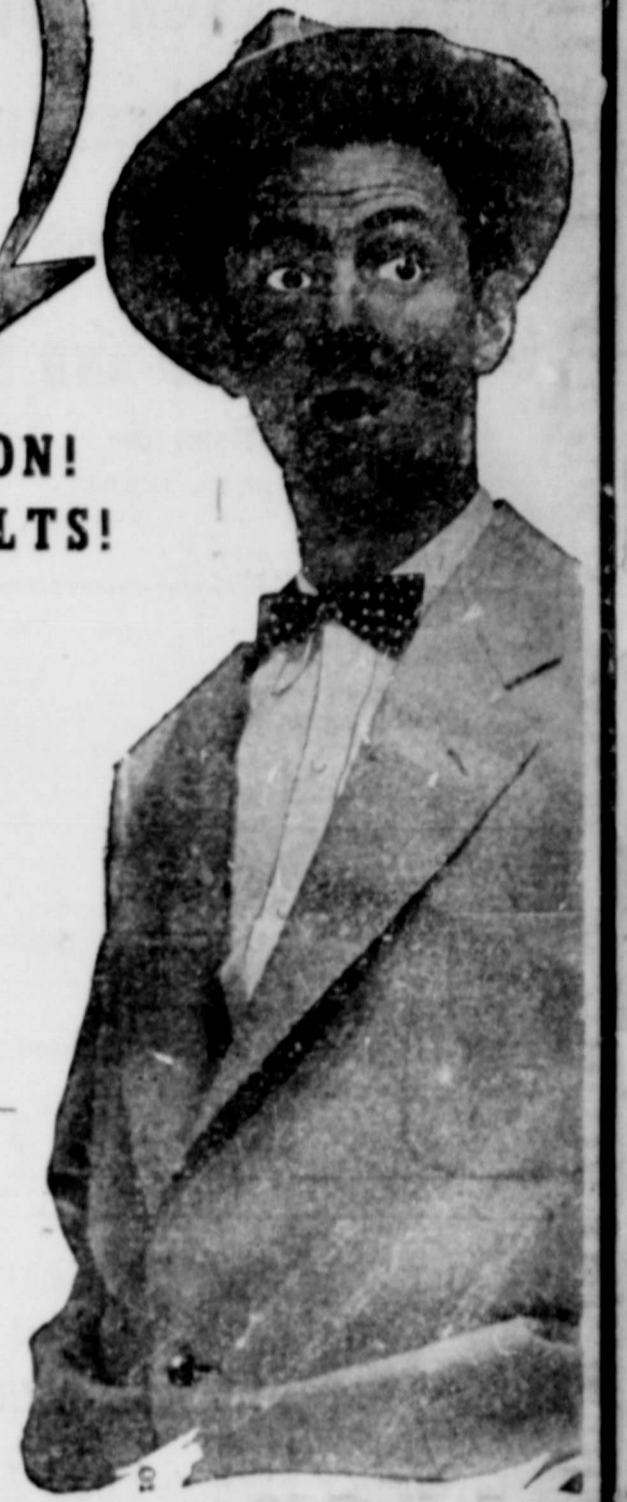

ite—E. P. Hubble of the University of California, R. A. Alpher and R. C. Hermer of Johns Hopkins university, and B. J. Bok and P. L. Whipple of Harvard university—there was a time when there were no matter in the universe, only blazing energy.

"The cosmic time of these scientists declares that the universe was born in the space of a few minutes by an act of creation. How like Genesis 1:3, 'And God said let there be light!'"

"The widely acclaimed expanding universe of Doctor Hubble and associates suggests that there was a time when all the stars were packed into a much smaller space. The temperature of such a system would be so terrific that no matter could exist. The astrophysicist pictures the universe at this stage as made up only of closely packed neutrons. No matter, only blazing energy. And the evening and the morning were the first day."

The Second Day of Creation

"Then the universe began to expand. The driving force behind the liberated energy was so terrific that within a matter of minutes the outmost neutrons had traveled billions of miles. This rapid expansion caused a drop in temperature. Conditions were now ripe for the creation of matter, or the firmament, as the account in Genesis is interpreted.

"The lower temperature resulted in the slowing down of the speeding neutrons. The slower moving neutrons give off part of their

energy in the form of electrons, or units of negative electricity. When these newly-formed electrons grouped themselves around the parent neutrons there was born the first atom. Neutrons and electrons constitute two essential units of matter as demonstrated in countless experiments the last 50 years in smashing atoms.

"From atoms the chemist builds molecules. Atoms and molecules constitute the traditional units of matter. 'And the evening and the morning were the second day.'

The Third and our Day of Creation

"Following the creation of energy and matter on the first two days of creation week the author of Genesis recounts the formation of the earth on the third day and the appearance of the sun and moon on the fourth day. How could the earth be formed before the sun? Science has formulated a theory only within the last decade to account for such a strange event.

"From spectrum analysis it is known that the sun, like other stars, is composed mostly of the gas, helium. The planets, on the other hand are made up of many heavy elements. From the earliest days of radioactivity it has been known that helium nuclei, or alphaparticles, constitute essential units in the heart of these heavy elements. Elements which do not explode spontaneously like radium can be shown to contain helium nuclei also when placed in such modern atom-smashing machines as a cyclotron or a nuclear pile.

"It remained for two mathematicians of Cambridge university, Fred Hoyle and R. A. Lyttleton, to propose a theory based on present-day knowledge of nuclear chemistry, to account for the formation of the heavy elements. They visualize the origin of the heavy elements as taking place in stars with temperature several hundred times that of the sun. The formation of iron, uranium, and other heavy elements under these conditions from the gas helium resulted in the absorption of fantastic amounts of energy. There followed a sharp drop in the temperature of the super-hot star. This resulted in its collapse. The release of so much gravitational energy resulted in a stupendous explosion with the scattering of a large gaseous cloud over a vast area of the

heavens. The concluding act of the drama postulates that a part of the gaseous cloud of heavy elements came within the gravitational attraction of our sun, where they were swept up to form the earth and the other eight planets of our solar system.

"This theory of Hoyle and Lyttleton has received wide acclaim. It is the first scientific account of creation which explains how the planets may have been formed entirely independent from the sun, and even before it came into existence, just as recorded in the Biblical account.

"Science has changed its story of creation many times since Copernicus' day. The discovery of new instruments and new techniques for probing the physical universe, and the formulation of new theories to interpret the new data will continue to alter the picture of the cosmos. Through the eyes of science man marvels at the ceaseless change of all things.

"On the other hand, one stands in awe too at the timeless, incomparable description of the creation story in the Biblical Record. The cataclysmic events of the first four days of creation never stood out in sharper focus than they do today through the interpretation of the nuclear scientist."

(Continued From Page 1) doubles as a turkey broiler house. The mortality loss of the chicks has been less than 3 per cent Arthur said.

The New Hampshire reds are a quick feathering, fast maturing

bird and is one of the new strains of chicks that are bred to make fast gains on a small amount of feed.

Arthur, who is associated with his brother in the processing business in Eastland, believes that a good quality broiler can be produced in this area as fast and as cheaply as they can be in east Texas or in Arkansas. He invites those who may be interested in the broiler business to come by in the next several days and see his birds. About one-fourth of them will go to the processing plant on March 16.
