Short Course AAA Work

LUBBOCK, August 2—The National Program of Agriculture and how it will affect this territory will be the theme of a one-day short course at the Texas Technological college, Thursday, August 9. Dr. Bradford Knapp, president, has announced.

I. W. Duggan and Maurice R. Cooper, with the cotton section of the Agricultural Adjustment administration, Washington, D. C., and Peter Molyneux, editor of The Texas Weekly, will be among the principal speakers.

Congressman Marvin Jones, Amarillo, and others have been invited. The short course, an added feature of the Tech summer school, is being actively promoted by the Texas Extension Service officials of this section.

Farmers, bankers, merchants, teachers and others are invited to attend.

"This is a great opportunity for business men and farmers to get a vision of the government's plans for agriculture for the future, with particular effect this program will have on farming, upon banking and upon business in general in this section," Dr. Knapp said.

Water Leads Representatives Race; Big Lead

With only one box unaccounted for—that being Fieldton in Lamb county—there was some doubt Wednesday as to whether A. B. Tarwater, incumbent representative from that district, would have to enter the runoff.

Official returns, complete except for the one box mentioned in which there are about 120 votes, show Tarwater with 8168 votes, Halcomb with 4848, Hick Halcomb with 3372. Tarwater lacks 37 votes to carry a majority over his two opponents.

He carried Lamb county but it is a little doubtful if he could forge a lead of 120 votes unaccounted for.

Official canvases of the votes in the respective counties only will determine whether he will have enough to escape a runoff. This canvass will be made Saturday.

Three Runoffs In County Races

Only three run-offs will be necessitated in Castro county following Saturday's primary.

The Sheriff's race is now a two-way affair between Garland Brown, who led Saturday, and Bill Burnam. Between now and August 25, the two will drive to get the votes polled for them. Melroy and Snider, will have the center spot of attention.

Of no less interest will be the race for County and District Clerk between the incumbent Frank Cone and Glenn Hickman, present tax assessor. The Assessor's office has been combined with that of Sheriff and Tax Collector.

In Precinct No. 4, Andrew Acker and L. O. Norman will run off the Commissioner's race. In a three-way race, Norman received 83, Acker 81, and Beck 79. Only four votes separate the top man from the low man.

Joiner Defeats Chas. Clements

The News was unable to get complete and accurate returns on the race for District Judge, but it was a certainty that Judge R. C. Joiner had defeated the incumbent, Judge Chas. Clements.

From available returns, Judge Joiner had a big lead in Hale and Swisher and Bailey counties. Judge Clements had majorities in Lamb and Castro counties.

The margin of difference in the total vote was said to be about 500 votes, with the advantage in favor of Judge Joiner.

Eight Constitutional Amendments Being Printed This Week

In this issue of The Castro county News will be found the eight proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on in November.

The text of these amendments may be obtained by reading them— which, if one is to judge by past experience, few will do.

At a later date the News will attempt to analyze the amendments and what they propose to do.

Of late years Texans have confronted the problem of voting from six to nine amendments to the Constitution each year.

Up until a few years ago no amendment to the Constitution could be voted, the trend being to defeat all proposed changes in the basic law.

Of recent years that sentiment has been reversed and practically all proposed amendments have been adopted.

An antiquated constitution is the reason assigned for submission of such a large number of amendments. The present Texas Constitution was adopted in 1876.

Efforts of State leaders to have the Legislature call a Constitutional Convention have been unsuccessful for years. Yet the same session which ignores this plea will at the same time submit a number of amendments to the electorate.

All County Commissioners who stood for re-election in Castro County were re-elected Saturday.

In precinct 1, John Lilley defeated two opponents, Barber Eubanks and H. G. Connally. Lilley received 263 votes to 96 for Eubanks and 90 for Connally. It was a clear majority.

In Precinct No. 2 H. M. Horton received 193 votes to 146 for Sid Sheffy and 38 for O. C. Axtell.

In Precinct No. 3, L. A. Ricketts defeated Fred Duck Boswell, 208 to 157.

In precinct No. 4 there were only four votes difference between the top man and the low man in a three-way race. L. O. Norman led the ticket with 83, Anrew Acker was second with 80 and L. E. Beck finished third with 79.

Syl Birkenfeld was elected without opposition to this office in No. 1.

In Precinct No. 4, H. C. (Atticus) Webb was elected when 9 voters wrote his name on the ballot.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 1. Taxation To Be Equal and Uniform As To Real Estate and To Be Equal and Uniform As To All Reasonable Classifications of Property; And Occupation and Income Taxes; Exemptions; Limitations Upon Counties, Cities, Etc.

"Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State, whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall

be ascertained as may be provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of all property other than real property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. The Legislature may impose a poll tax. It may also impose occupation taxes, both upon natural persons and upon corporations other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of both natural persons and corporations other than municipal, except that persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits shall never be required to pay an occupation tax; provided that Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in the State, shall be exempt from taxation, and provided further that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town for any year on persons or corporations pursuing any profession or business, shall not exceed one-half of the tax levied by the State for the same period of such profession or business."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election, all voters favoring said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations, shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax and exempting from mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax, and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family, and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."
