Coch Stubby Warden's Ranger Bulldogs aren't trying on the state Class A football championship crown just yet, but it would be a good idea for the Interscholastic League to start getting the measurements. The Wardenmen still have some rough games in front of them before they can claim the title, but things look better from this section of the state than they have in a score of years, and Ranger is a town that always turns out a championship eleven.

We aren't the only ones beating the drums for the Dogs. The Williamson System jumped Ranger from fourth in the state rating to first, replacing Wink, the defending champion. The Dogs percentage rating soared to 84.6.

And Ranger can start keeping a sharp eye on Albany. It appears that the two teams are a near cinch to meet in the bi-district play-offs. Albany almost wrapped up the District 8-A title Friday night when their two closest opponents, Haskell and Throckmorton, fought to a scoreless tie. Haskell could still win the crown but it doesn't appear likely. Albany spanked Throckmorton 33-6, thus making them the top heavy favorite in the district.

Ranger will be the favorite in the bi-district clash—Albany is ranked eighth in the state—but the local eleven will have to overcome the bi-district hex that has for so long stymied the Dogs. This could be the year.

Getting back from the land of could be, we find that Ranger will be the scene of two good games this week-end. Ranger High takes on Cross Plains Friday night, and then, on Saturday, Ranger Junior College meets powerful Arlington State in the Rangers' annual Homecoming game. We can't promise good ball games either night, but we have an idea that both may prove to be exciting.

Here is the way we have things figured out. We see one team that figures they have an easy win coming, another that sees an opportunity to knock off the king-pin of the district, another keyed up by Homecoming activities and another mad about the outcome of last year's game.

In order they are Ranger High, Cross Plains, Ranger JC and Arlington State. Of the two games the Junior College clash should be the best. Last year under-rated RJC fought Arlington State to a tie and the Rebels haven't forgotten it. Arlington will be keyed high for the game, but will meet a good Ranger eleven and may have their hands full. We would like to pick an upset, but we fear that came last year. Our prediction, Arlington 20, Ranger JC 7, in a rough Pioneer Conference clash.

As for the Bulldogs, it would do them good to find things a little rough this week-end. The Dogs have had things to ease in all of their district games and may be getting the "press notice fever." It would be a miracle if Cross Plains did upset the Ranger team, and we don't believe they can. We do predict a rugged first quarter for the Wardenmen before they rise to the occasion to win 41-6.

Going quickly around District 7-A. It will be Bangs over Rising Star, 19-0; Eastland over Santa Anna, 6-0, in the top game of the week; and Dublin drubbing Wylie, 33-0. The Cats are mad and Wylie's hurt bad.

In the two other Pioneer Conference tilts we will pick San Angelo over Tarleton State in a close one, 14-6; and Blinn over Schreiner, 13-0.

State Road Funds Tabbed For County

The State Highway Commission has earmarked a portion of the funds derived from appropriations made by the last session of the Texas Legislature for work on two Eastland county farm to market roads. The work is "subject to the availability of funds and the condition that Eastland county will furnish all required right-of-way free of cost to the state.

The following roads are designated as farm to market roads: From end of Farm to Market Road 569 at Nimrod, south to State Highway 26, 1.9 mile south of Pioneer, a distance of approximately 15.2 miles.

From Farm to Market Road 1027 at Chuckley, east to Comanche county line, a distance of approximately 0.2 mile.

D. C. Greer, state highway engineer, said "upon acceptance of these conditions, the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with construction and to assume the roads for maintenance."

Ratliff, Gaston Dixon and R. V. Galloway.

Getting into the act the Royal Neighbors will serve turkey dinner to hungry homecoming crowds. The game will be dedicated to the late Dr. Grover C. Boswell, former president of the college.

Probably the highlight of the festival will be the crowning of the queen. This will be done at halftime at the grid game.

While the RJC band is forming a heart on the field, a car carrying the Homecoming Queen will enter the south end of the field and will go around the field followed by cars bearing the duchesses. Cars will stop on the fifty yard line on the west side of the field, where the escorts for the Queen and the Duchesses will be waiting. They are Johnny Wilson, president of the student body, and Franklin Foster, one of the Rangers and the husband of Cora Lee Foster, the Homecoming Queen. They will escort Mrs. Foster to the center of the heart made by the band. The Rangers co-captains, Charles Blanton and Lee Otis Clayborn, will be escorts of the Duchesses who are Letty Frasier and Beverley Crawley. When the Queen reaches the center of the heart she will be crowned by Dr. Price Ashton, president of the college.

The parade will be held on Main Street at 4:30 p.m.

Top-Rated Dogs After Eighth Win of Season

The state's number one ranked Class A grid power swung into action this week—against Cross Plains in a game that has all the appearances of being in the bag for Coach O. C. (Stubby) Warden's Ranger Bulldogs. The tilt is a District 7-A game and will get underway at 7 p.m. at Bulldog Stadium Friday night.

Coach Warden hasn't let up on his charges as he tries to keep the Dogs unblemished district record. With only two games remaining on tap the Dogs can cinch at least a tie for the district crown with a win tonight. Actually the Dogs have already won the crown for all practical reasons, but Cross Plains and De Leon are still gunning for Ranger.

Ranger shot to the top in the state rankings this week after their impressive victory over well-regarded Dublin last week. The win was the sixth victory of the year in district play for the Wardenmen and the seventh in eight starts to date. The Dogs dropped a heartbreaker to Mineral Wells, 13-14, after outplaying the AA eleven

all over the field. Since then no one has come within 20 points of the Rangers as the Dogs crushed Wylie, Eastland, Bangs, Rising Star, Santa Anna and Dublin in succession.

The Dogs are in top shape for the game and spirit among the student body is at an all time high. Two pep rallies have been scheduled, one Thursday night and one Friday morning. The Thursday night rally will be held downtown.

While the Cross Plains Buffaloes will have to find a way to stop Ranger's fleet backs, the Dogs can concentrate on two of the Buffs. Quarterback Homer Robinson is their good chunker and Kenneth Becker, a 152 pound left half, is the top ground gainer for Cross Plains.

The usual starting line-up will probably get the nod from Coach Warden. If it does the line-up will read like this:

In the line, at left end, Coach Warden will most likely have 185-pound Tommy Hinds. At left tackle it will be Jimmy Wheeler, 190; at left guard, Gary Patterson, 170; at center, John Rush, 163; at right guard, Bobby Justice, 170; at right tackle, Eddie James, 210, and at right end, Chico Mendoza.

In the backfield it will be Scott Ferney, 163, at quarterback; Billy Browning, 143, at left half; Charles Massinger, 145, right half; and Jim Littlefield, 150, fullback. Warden will probably use Benny Robinson as a defensive back. Other defensive players who will start if Ranger kicks off are tackle Jim Nail and end Dan Mitchell.

Other dogs who will probably see action include Johnny Graves, tackle, 200; Tommy Young, guard, 170; Jim Hagaman, center, 160; Tommy Sutton, guard, 165; Jerry Cantrell, end, 165; Johnny Swiney, quarterback, 120; Archie Robinson, tackle, 180; Paul Hinds, back, 115; Cruz Vasquez, guard, 140; and Ben Cruise, guard, 115.

Texas turkey growers this year cut production about 11 per cent when the opening of the season found huge supplies of turkey meat in storage and prospects not too favorable for a prosperous year.

RANGERS ARE UNDERDOGS BUT COULD UPSET MIGHTY REBELS

Ranger Junior College's Rangers meet powerful Arlington State College at Bulldog Stadium Saturday night in the highlight of the 1953 Ranger JC Homecoming Day activities.

The tilt, which is the feature game of the week in the Pioneer Junior College Conference, will watch the conference's leading ground gainers against the top passing team of the league.

Arlington has piled up 1,628 yards rushing this season to lead the five team conference on the ground, but Ranger has the best passing record with a total yardage of 616 yards through the air.

Arlington is the conference's net offensive leader with a combined rushing and passing total of 2,196 yards in seven games.

Ranger has the leading pass receiver in the conference, but ASC has the passer with the best record in Quarterback Sam Howard. He has completed 22 passes out of 68 attempts for a total gain of 345 yards. John Wilson, Ranger end, has 18 catches for 245 yards.

The game will probably see lots of scoring. Arlington's Fred Cook leads the scoring race with five touchdowns and 30 points.

Last week Arlington State overwhelmed San Angelo 28-7 while the Rangers had an off week in preparation for this week's tilt. Arlington is the defending conference champion and they will remember that the only blemish on their conference record last season came when the Rangers forced them to come from behind to gain a 13-13 tie in a game played in Arlington.

The Rebels have an impressive record this season, with only a loss to Kilgore JC to blot an otherwise perfect record. That game was a non-conference affair, of course, and didn't actually hurt the Rebels.

Ranger has a 500 average for the season in both conference and non-conference play. The Rangers hold wins over Allen Academy, Tarleton State and the Midwestern B team and a tie with Navarro. They have lost three games, to Wharton, Cisco and San Angelo. No team has been able to score more than 20 points against Coach Dick Henderson's charges, however. Also giving the Rangers hope is the fact that they have won their last two starts.

Arlington holds wins over Wharton, Texas Lutheran, Navarro, Del Mar, Schreiner and San Angelo.

The Rebels are coached by Claude "Chen" Gilstrap, head coach, Tom Tinker, backfield coach, and Burrely Beardon, line coach.

The Rebel backfield is somewhat fearsome to most opponents. They have Charles Marshall at fullback, who was all-conference fullback in 1951 and halfbacks Ken Vavra, leading conference scorer in 1952, and Bernie Cook, who was all-conference last season. Then their quarterback, Sam Howard, led the conference in passing last season.

In other Pioneer Conference games, San Angelo meets Tarleton State at Stephenville and Schreiner plays Blinn at Brenham.

Probable starters for Ranger are, from end to end, John Wilson, 180 pounds, at the left end; spot; George Scott, 215 pounder at left tackle; Joe Angel, 190, left guard; Jim Bob Roberts, 180, at center; Allen Gibbs, 185 pounds, right guard; Dalton Bleeker, 207 pounds, right tackle; and Ray Gilstrap, 185 pound, right end.

In the backfield Coach Henderson will most likely start Jimmy

Cole, 155 pounds, at quarterback; Sonny Blanton, 170 pounds, left half; Floyd Gibbs, 160 pounds, right half; and Thomas Hudson, 195 pounds, fullback.

Journalism, Speech Clinic Set At ACC

Principles and techniques of speech and news reporting and editing will be emphasized Saturday, Nov. 7, for an estimated 350 West Texas high school speech and journalism students in clinics on the Abilene Christian College campus.

The event is the annual Student Activities Conference, sponsored jointly by the University Interscholastic League of Austin, high schools of Central West Texas and ACC. Invitations have been mailed to the 184 schools in the Interscholastic League region which extends over a wide area of West Texas.

The clinics will begin simultaneously at 9:15 a. m. and will end by 12:30 p. m. Speech students will assemble in Sewell Auditorium for up to three separate sections—debate, declamation and extemporaneous speaking, and drama.

The young journalists will hear a keynote address and then settle down to a series of speeches chronologically tracing the news process from getting the facts to making up the paper. Three workshop sessions will conclude the program.

Speakers and consultants for the speech clinic include Don Williams, University of Texas debate director; Bruce Roach, UIL speech director; Bill Clark, acting head of the Department of Speech at McMurry College; and Mrs. Lucy Haynes of Merkel High School.

On the journalism program are William J. Harding, UIL journalism director; his assistant, Miss Joyce Jackson; Dick Tarpley, news editor of The Abilene Reporter-News; Eugene Schooley, journalism professor at Hardin-Simmons University; and Preston Clark, Jr., assistant professor of journalism at McMurry College.

(Continued from Page 1)

Texas is producing a good quality turkey this year as growers found that, despite relatively high feed prices, the feed-turkey cost ratio was still favorable.

Added evidence was visible in the state this year that the farm flock is disappearing from the scene as a major factor in turkey production in the state.

Turkey operations are now mostly on a commercial scale with growers using all latest information to the best advantage, putting to use new developments in nutrition and sanitation which promote a more efficient production operation.

The turkey industry's action in reducing flocks to conform with surplus supplies has been lauded by agricultural observers and has been held up this year as a model for other commodity groups faced with a surplus situation but with production still at a high level.

Texas had about 3.5 million turkeys this year, about 11 per cent fewer than last year.

The national flock reduction also amounted to around 11 per cent with production for the year estimated at 55 million birds.

George P. McCarthy, vice president and director of research for Universal Mills in Fort Worth, a state, points to the great progress made in the state in recent years.

"We've gone into the turkey business on a commercial scale and are doing a much more efficient job of production," he said.

Turkeys get more personal attention when they make up the bulk of a farmer's operation and by close observation better control if disease has been possible, making possible a greater overall return from the turkey operation.

Turkey is growing in favor as a year-around dish and much promotion has been done to make people realize that turkey is good all year long, not just at the holiday season.

But the holidays bring the big turkey market and that's what Texas producers are cashing in on now.

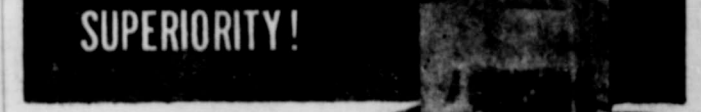

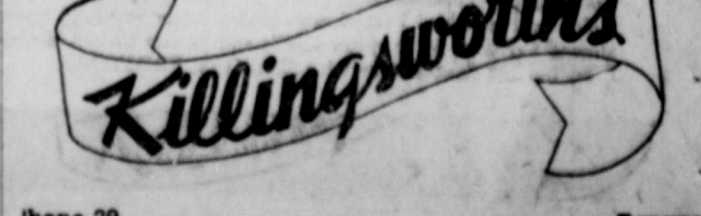
