## THREE CARS DAMAGED, TWO FINED, LEE HORN INJURED

An Eastland County deputy sheriff was hospitalized, two men were fined in county court, three cars slightly damaged and Highway 80 was charged with another freak accident this week.

The strange but true accident occurred Sunday night at about 7:30 one mile east of Eastland. One of the men pleaded guilty to assault with a motor vehicle and the other to driving while intoxicated in County Court Monday.

Injured in the accident was Deputy Sheriff Lee Horn. Horn and Sheriff Frank Tucker had stopped a car driven by Conrad Phillip Hazard of Eastland and were checking his papers when another car, driven by Karl K. White attempted to pass another car on the right hand side. The car driven by White smashed into the open door of Hazard's car, barely missing crushing Sheriff Tucker between the two vehicles, and hurled the deputy sheriff several yards down the shoulder of the highway. White jerked the car back on the highway after hitting the Hazard car, Sheriff Tucker said, and then smashed into the car he was attempting to pass, which was driven by a Mrs. Garrett.

Horn was given a check up at the Eastland Memorial Hospital following the mishap and was later released.

## CARBON MAN IS HIT AND RUN VICTIM

West Texas officers are searching for a hit and run driver today and a carbon man is in a Fort Worth jail with "serious" leg injuries following a mishap Friday night between Carbon and Okra.

Injured is Floyd Morris. He was treated at a Gorman hospital following the mishap and later was taken to Fort Worth for specialist treatment. Morris' leg was said to have been badly injured.

Morris was parked on the shoulder of the farm to market road fixing a flat when the accident took place. Officers had made no arrests in the case Monday morning and clues were scarce.

The mishap occurred shortly before 11 p.m.

## Eastland County Has Bank Robbery Scare

Eastland county law enforcement officers joined officers from 12 other counties Friday morning in keeping a close watch on West Texas banks after a tip off that a bank in this area was to be robbed.

Sheriff Frank Tucker had men stationed at every bank in Eastland county early Friday in anticipation of an attempted hold-up. It didn't come off.

Ablene officers did arrest a "suspect", but he was later released. The man was held for investigation only and was released about 3 p.m. Friday.

Ablene police Thursday night advised officers in 12 counties to place guards around banks, particularly small ones, in their counties. Besides Eastland and Taylor counties, Breckenridge, Albany, Baird, Sweetwater, Anson, Colorado City, Coleman, Roby, Snyder and Ballinger were under alert.

Ablene Detective Capt. W. B. McDonald, Lt. W. E. Cliff and a federal officer arrested a man in downtown Abilene as he stepped from a taxi cab about 8:30 a.m. The man who gave his address as Mesa, Ariz., denied any knowledge of a bank holdup.

He was booked for vagrancy and held for investigation. The man apparently had no police record in Texas or Arizona. Officers said he had been in Abilene about three days.

"We're called on to do something like this dozens of times a year," Capt. McDonald said. "We have to act on every tip. If we ignored one we'd be sure to miss a real case, so we can't take a chance."

## Delayed But There Is Hope

After treatment at the West Texas Clinic in Ranger, the Red Cross, under the guidance of Mrs. Kenneth Jameson, stepped in. Mrs. Jameson took the family to her home and arranged for the car to be quickly repaired. While the Scroggs are waiting for the repairs to be completed on their car, they are being treated as guests in Mrs. Jameson's home.

### BI-DISTRICT HONORS GO TO WINNER OF IMPORTANT TILT

Stymied in their bid for a Thanksgiving Day game, the Ranger High School Bulldogs will meet the Albany Lions in bi-district play Friday night at 8 p.m. in Breckenridge.

The decision to play the tilt came at a meeting of officials of the two schools in Cisco Saturday after no decision was reached Friday night following the Lions' 12-

victory over Haskell in a game which decided the 8-A championship. Ranger will represent District 7-A in the state playoffs.

Home-seat tickets were on sale at the Ranger High School office Tuesday morning and fans were practically fighting for them. One thousand, two hundred tickets were made available to Ranger fans and they were not expected to last long. Tickets sold for \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students.

### Ranger Band Gains First Class Rating

Ranger's High School band brought home a Division I Class A rating from the Interscholastic League marching contest held Saturday in Stephenville.

The band, under the direction of Fred Steffy, went through a seven minute marching drill before the eagle eye of top rated judges to cop the honor.

Judging was based on appearance, uniforms, the ability to perform maneuvers. The Ranger band was praised highly.

Next Spring the RHS bandsters will seek to gain the same rating in sight reading.

### County Gets New Wildcat Near Olden

E. J. Suddler, Abilene, No. 1 George Fox, Jr., is a wildcat for the area three miles southeast of Olden in Eastland County.

Contracted for 3,600 feet with rotary, location is 1,980 feet from the east and 700 feet from the north lines of Section 58. McClellan CSL Survey.

Other area oil news: A new Mississippi discovery has been completed in northern Stephens County 3 1/2 miles southeast of Newton, as Woodson Oil Co. No. 1 T. C. Harris.

It flowed 243.25 barrels of oil gravity oil in 9 1/2 hours, for a calculated daily potential of 598.8 barrels.

Production was through 1-4 choke with 1,600 pounds on casing and 975 pounds on tubing from open hole at 4,294 - 4,302 feet. Top of the pay was picked at 4,291 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 476-1.

The new field opener is one and one-half miles northeast of the Tipton Mississippi field.

Taxman Oil Co., et al, Kansas City, is to drill No. 1 A. B. Lane as a wildcat in western Palo Pinto County near the Stephens County line and five miles northeast of Caddo.

Location for the 4,500-foot test is 660 feet from the south and west lines of the southeast quarter of Section 12, block 4. T&P Survey.

Two of the men were from Eastland, two from Cisco, and one from Ranger and one from Breckenridge.

The men left Abilene Friday.

### NEW STAMP

SUVA, Fiji Islands—The current eightpenny postage stamp will gear an overprint to commemorate the visit of Queen Elizabeth in December. The stamp will bear the words "Royal Visit, 1953," and will go on sale Dec. 17, the day the Queen arrives at Suva. The stamps will be on sale for a period of one week after the date.

### \$75,000 Suit Filed By Eastland Man

A suit for \$75,000 and cost has been filed in the U. S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas by an Eastland county man.

The suit, filed by Homer T. Glover of Eastland, alleges that Glover sold an oil and gas lease in Stephens county to G. B. Butterfield, of Billings, Montana, last April with the understanding that Butterfield's check for \$45,000 would not be cashed until a certain date.

Glover said he complied with the bargain and didn't present the check for payment until the end of September. Then it was returned voided marked "payment stopped," his allegation said.

Glover maintains that Butterfield broke contract and is asking the \$45,000 allegedly agreed upon for the lease, costs for court action and services involved in transference of the lease, and \$30,000 damages for losses he says he incurred through the delay caused by the agreement.

Owen and Owen of Eastland are attorneys for Glover. Butterfield's attorneys are Tjar, Bain and Mikah of Minneapolis, Minn.; Thornton and Thornton of Oney, and McMahon, Springer, Smart & Walter of Abilene.

### Murder Trial Set Dec. 14 In Eastland

The murder trial of T. Clifton Clary, which will be tried in 91st District Court in Eastland on a change of venue, has been set for Dec. 14.

Clary twice has been found guilty of the murder of his wife by trial courts, but both convictions were reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin. The case was originally tried in Russell county and Clary was given a 99 year sentence. He appealed the case and the Appeals Court ordered a new trial. The case went to Mitchell county on a change of venue and he was found guilty there and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Again the Appeals Court overruled the verdict and the case was transferred to Eastland county.

District Attorney Joe Nurnale said Tuesday that he would assist District Attorney E. C. Grinstead of Russell county in the prosecution of the case. District Attorney Eldon Mahon of Mitchell county will also assist.

Defense attorneys are Runge and Hardeman of San Angelo and Frank Sparks of Eastland.

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### Re-Organization Of Petroleum Co. Announced; Chamberlain President

Geneva Petroleum Co., in Eastland for the past 11 years, has been re-organized and is now incorporated as Jack Chamberlain, Inc. Jack Chamberlain, president of the new firm said in Eastland Tuesday.

Chamberlain is a well known oil man in Eastland. He is a past president of the Quarterback Club—during his term of office the Field House was built—and past president of the Eastland-Country Club. Chamberlain built and donated the Recreation Club House at the Country Club to that organization.

Capital stock in the new corporation is \$125,000. Incorporation papers were filed with the office of the Nevada Secretary of State in July and the company has been given a permit to do business in the State of Texas until 1963.

The company has just staked No. 2 Frank Good as a 3,500-foot test 12 miles northwest of Eastland, 330 feet from the north and west lines of J. R. Stubblefield Survey 56.

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## Carbon GI Stationed At German Castle

FRANKFURT, Germany—Sgt. Raymond J. McAllister Jr., 26, whose mother, Mrs. O. L. Woods, lives in Olden, is now stationed near Frankfurt, Germany, in an historical old castle which has housed "foot soldiers" since the 14th Century.

The castle, which dates back to 1388, now houses the 1st Battalion of the 4th Division's 8th Infantry Regiment. McAllister, son of Raymond J. McAllister, 2802 W. Rovey Ave., Phoenix, Ariz., is a clerk in Headquarters Company of the battalion, part of the NATO

defense force for western Europe. Now known as the Dutzbach Kaserne, the castle was first used to quarter the roving armies of medieval tribes. It was occupied in 1610 by Philip III of France and later, under the Hessians, converted into a fort. Troops from the partition fought as "mercenaries" for the British against the Washington during the American revolution.

The castle sheltered troops of Napoleon at the height of his continental conquest and the army of Frederick the Great. In World War I it was used by the 168th Hessian Infantry Regiment which introduced the "Hessian machine gun" in combat. More recently the castle housed troops of Hitler's 36th Infantry Regiment during World War II.

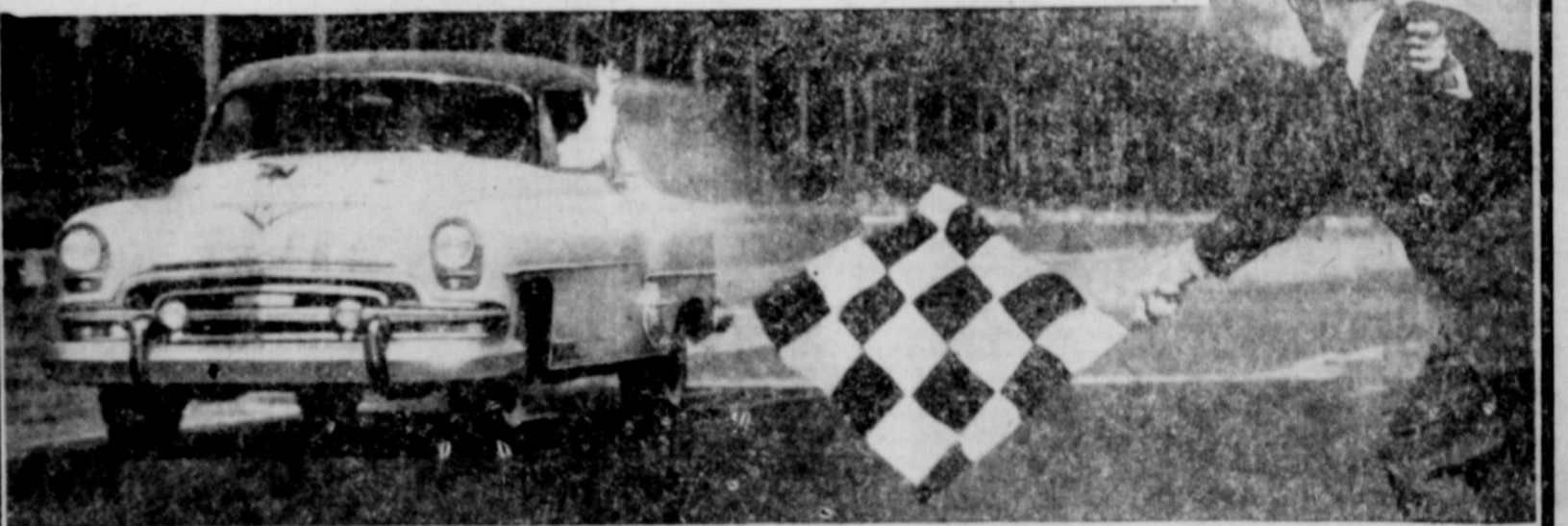

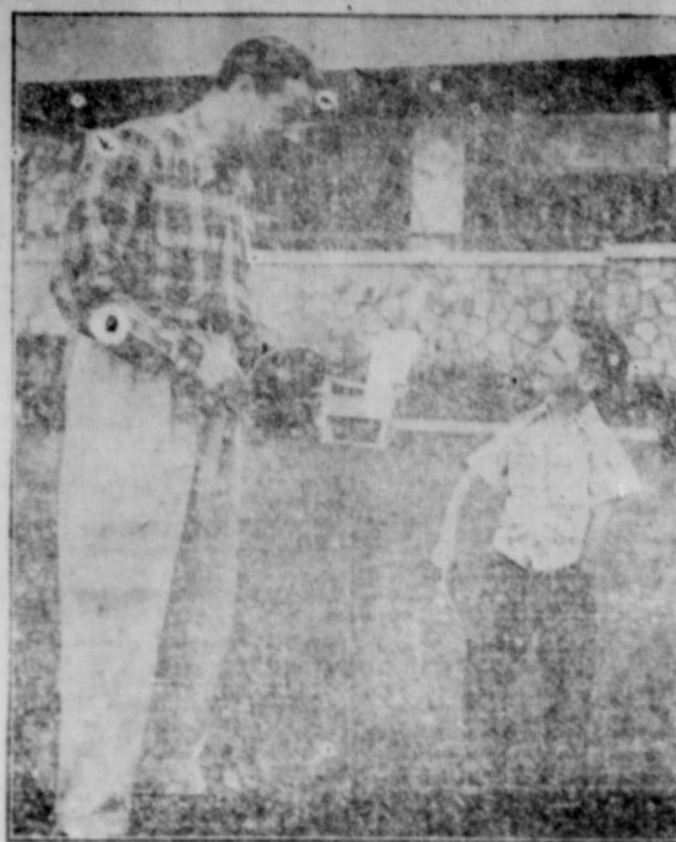

## EASTLAND MAVS END SEASON WITH 41-20 VICTORY OVER CROSS PLAINS BUFFALOES

Eastland's Mavericks closed out their 1953 gridiron season on a winning note Friday night when they smashed the Cross Plains Buffaloes 41-20 in a District 7-A tilt played at Cross Plains.

The Mavericks had a rather easy time of it with Left half Jamie Jessop leading the way with four touchdowns in one of his best performances. The speedy Mav back tossed the only Eastland completion of the night to account for another TD.

The game, marred by loose officiating, was sewed up in the first quarter for all practical reasons. Moving in blitzkrieg fashion, the Mavericks rolled to a 28-0 first quarter lead.

CHICAGO—Special—More than 1,200 outstanding rural youth—mostly farm boys and girls—from the 48 states, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico, will be honored delegates to the 22nd National 4-H Congress in Chicago, November 29-December 3. They are the "cream of the crop" selected by the Extension Service as state, sectional and national winners in the 1953 4-H award program of projects of agriculture and homemaking.

The youthful delegates will represent more than 2 million active 4-H members throughout the United States.

Expenditures of the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, a citizens' group, total approximately \$900,000 in grants annually to assist the Co-operative Extension Service in furthering the program, membership and influence of 4-H. The major portion of the grants, which are provided by some 40 industrial organizations, foundations and prominent public-spirited men and women, are used for 4-H merit awards, including medals, savings bonds, trips, college scholarships and leader training.

## Cook Book About Meat On Market

Just about everything there is to say about America's No. 1 main course is covered in the latest cookbook on meat.

John and Marie Robertson, old hands at cookbook writing, in their latest work, "The Meat Cookbook" (Henry Holt), discuss everything from Chateaubriand to cold cuts, from New England boiled dinner to Chinese steak with mushrooms.

The book also is a guide to buying, cutting, carving and storing the food which the authors say "accounts for at least a fourth of the average family food budget and three-fourths of a meal's success."

The Robertsons include several recipes using economy cuts. Typical is this one for Creole steak:

1 pound flank steak; 3 tablespoons lard or drippings; 1 medium onion chopped; 1 clove garlic, mashed; 2 green peppers, cut in 1-inch squares; 1 cup celery, cut in 1-inch pieces; 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce; 1 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon pepper; and one 10-ounce can condensed tomato soup.

Slice steak into thin ribbons 4 or 5 inches long. Brown in fat, stirring constantly. Lower the flame, add onion and garlic, and stir until onion becomes transparent. Add peppers, celery, seasonings and soup. Cover. Cook over low heat until meat and vegetables are tender, about 1 hour. Serve very hot. Serves four.

Suggested accompanying menu: chicken broth garnished with chopped water cress; fluffy rice; avocado salad, and date and nut torte.

## Prelim Boxers Scarce Because of Good Times

PORTLAND, Me. — Chick Hayes, a boxing matchmaker, blames "the good times" for his difficulty in obtaining preliminary fighters.

"Almost anyone can get a job that pays \$50 to \$60 a week now," says Hayes, "and you can't blame boys too much for not wanting to train a week or more for a fight, particularly when they don't actually need the money."

## Tips For Holiday Fruit Cake Baking

If you bake your own holiday fruit cakes, here are some tips for easing the job.

In shopping, remember that 1/2 pounds of pineapple, cherries and citrus peels each produces 1 1/2 cups. One pound of walnuts produces 12 3/4 cups nutmeats; 1 pound almonds, 1 1/2 cups; and 1 pound filberts, 1 1/2 cups.

Don't try to do all the preparation and baking in one day. Buy fruits and nuts during regular shopping trips. Cut them and store in screw-top jars as you find time during regular kitchen duty. Prepare the pans and measure the ingredients the day before baking, and you'll find the actual cake-making a breeze.

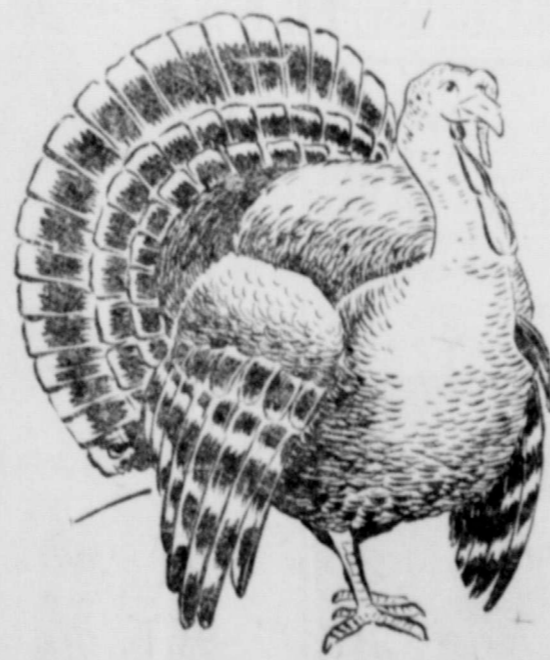

### Fashion Makers Letting Down Small Fry, Complains Designer

NEW YORK — Now it's a fashion designer instead of educators and social workers worrying about neglect of children. Helen Lee, mother of three, says clothing manufacturers have been letting the small fry down for years.

Only recently, she says, have the fashion people made an effort to dress small girls in something other than ruffles and pastels.

The designer, a native of Knoxville, Tenn., has been making children's clothes for 25 years. For her pioneering in production of more sophisticated apparel, she was one of three winners of this year's American Fashion Critics Award.

"I believe firmly in a dress a girl can put on, button up, and forget about," she said. "I loathe clothes which aren't utilitarian. But for years mothers have washed and ironed pinks, blues, yellows and whites. Plus ruffles and tucks. I don't know where they ever found the time or energy."

More practical, she believes, are

charcoal grays, and black.

"I spice the dark colors up with the bright reds, oranges and such," she said. "But little girls love black."

The designer, affiliated with a concern (Youngland) which does an \$8,000,000 annual business in girls' dresses, prefers to design for the three to seven age group.

"By the time they're 10 or 12," she said, "their shape has changed... they're lost everything and gained nothing."

### TSCW Adds Nursing Program

An important development in the Texas State College for Women's program in the preparation of professional nurses in Texas has been announced by Dr. John A. Guin, president.

The expanded program, to become effective in September, 1954, will for instructional purposes in the field of nursing education combine the extensive resources of TSCW with those of the new \$11,000,000 facilities of Parkland Memorial Hospital of Dallas.

"The proximity of the new Parkland facilities in northwest Dallas to the campus of TSCW will offer a complete integration of academic and professional studies and will provide for the continuous participation of students in campus affairs," Dr. Guin said.

"This highly integrated four-year degree program of the TSCW School of Nursing will be inaugurated on the TSCW campus next fall. The present diploma course of the Parkland School of Nursing will be discontinued after a three-year period of transition beginning with the 1954-55 session."

A change of name will not be allowed to injure third persons under our laws. The change does not operate to release the applicant from any responsibility which he may have incurred under his original name. Nor will it defeat or destroy any rights or property or causes of action which the person may have had or held in his original name.

Any person transacting business in Texas under any name other than his real name is required to file in the County Clerk's Office in each county in which he conducts his business an "assumed name certificate", giving the name of the business and the true full name and post office address of each person carrying on the business, a new certificate is required to be filed setting out the facts.

Whenever the name of a corporation is changed, Texas laws require that its corporate charter must be amended and the amendment filed with the Secretary of State.

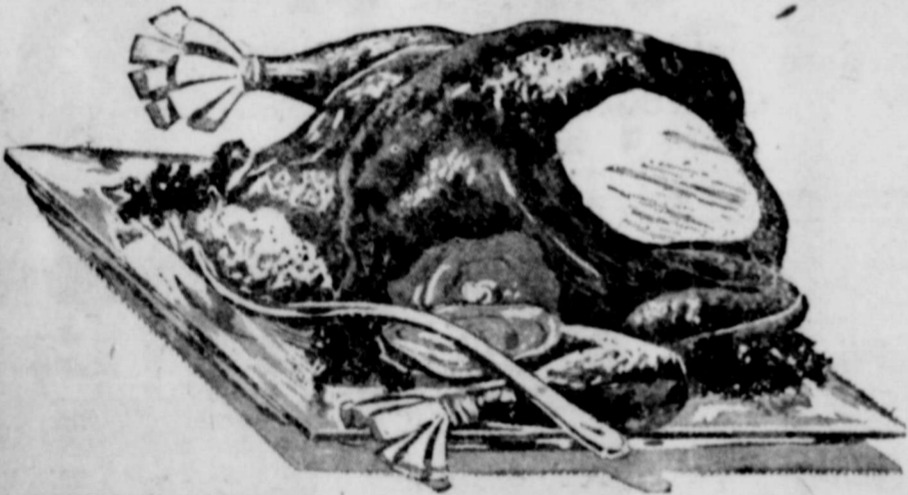

## Buffet Supper Popular Way To Entertain Many Friends During The Football Season

The hostess who would like to entertain this fall in a delightful and convenient manner should consider a buffet supper. The buffet supper is a popular form of week-end entertaining. It enables a hostess to invite a large number of friends to her home. For this reason, many families are planning a buffet supper during the football season.

A hostess needn't worry about a number of rigid rules for setting the table for a buffet supper. She need follow only a few basic rules, according to John D. Shaw, of 1847 Rogers Blvd. After these few rules are followed, the hostess can make full use of her ingenuity.

Napkins, for example, are placed in stacks at one or both corners of a course weave cloth. Plates should be of ample size and placed in piles, about eight to a stack.

"Serving pieces are very important," explains Mr. Shaw. "The smart hostess, when planning her buffet supper, will make certain she has all the individual serving pieces she'll need. If she's having cold turkey or chicken, she will need a cold meat fork. She'll also need the right serving pieces for each of the hot vegetables, salads and pastry. In all, there are nine essential serving pieces. This month, for the first time, we are introducing a chest that has all nine serving pieces as well as a service for eight."

Main dishes, such as cold meats and poultry, usually are placed at either end of the table. Creamed mushrooms and hot vegetables should be in covered dishes. Lettuce, Newburg, or omelets can be prepared in a chafing dish. The salad, olives, pickles, jelly and even dessert generally are on the table at its initial setting. Glasses, too, are on the serving table.

The flat silver is laid out flat in some conventional form at convenient places. A never should be racked. The serving pieces should be arranged parallel to the serving dishes.

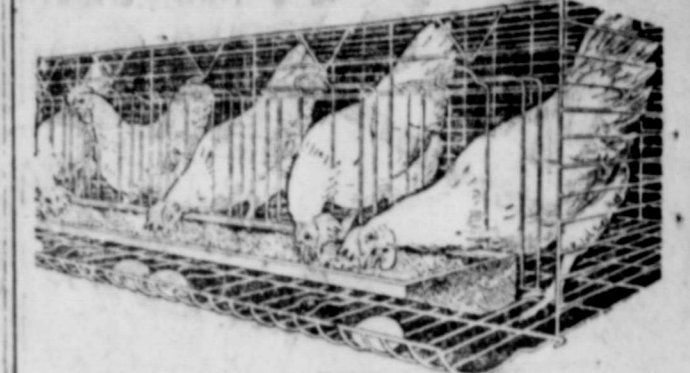
