**Monday Deadline For Farmers To File Tax Returns**

Monday, February 1, is an important Federal income tax deadline for farmers and employers. District Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., said today.

"Farmers who did not file estimated tax returns for 1953 are required to file their final income tax return by midnight of February 1," the Director said. "The usual deadline is January 31, but since that date falls on a Sunday farmers are given an extra day to comply with the law."

Farmers' estimated tax returns and estimated tax payments were due on January 15. Mr. Campbell explained, but those farmers who did not file an estimate may avoid penalties by filing their final return and paying their income tax on or before February 1.

He also said that during the month of January employers must issue statements of tax withheld from wages (Form W-2) to all employees.

The chief of the Dallas office of the Internal Revenue Service also called attention to the fact that midnight Monday is also the deadline for:

Employers to file their quarterly return of withheld income and social security taxes on Form 941 accompanied by triplicates of Form W-2a. Payment in cash of depository receipts is also required.

Employers to file reconciliation returns on tax withholding statements issued to employees.

Employers of eight or more persons to file federal unemployment tax returns.

The deadline for filing 1953 income tax returns for persons other than farmers (and for farmers who filed estimated returns) is March 15.

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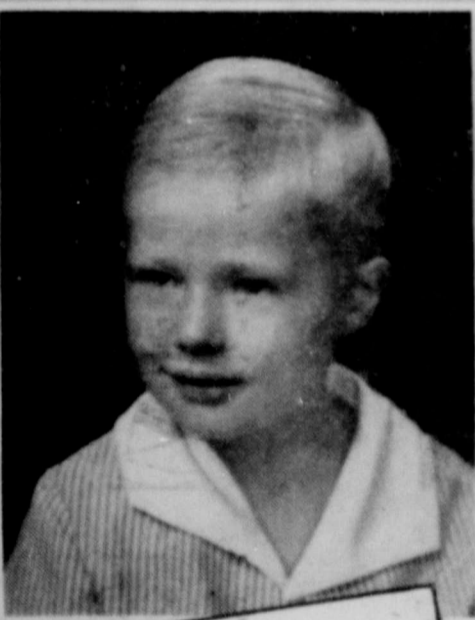

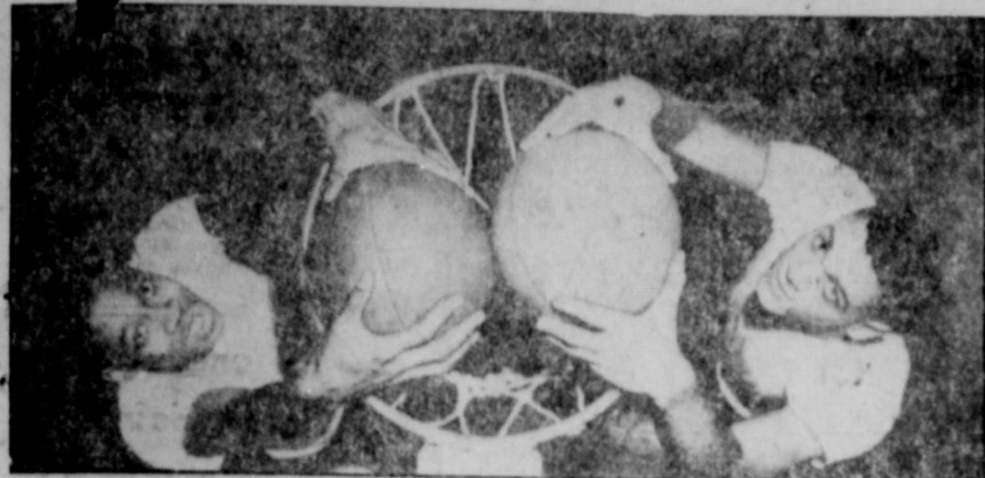

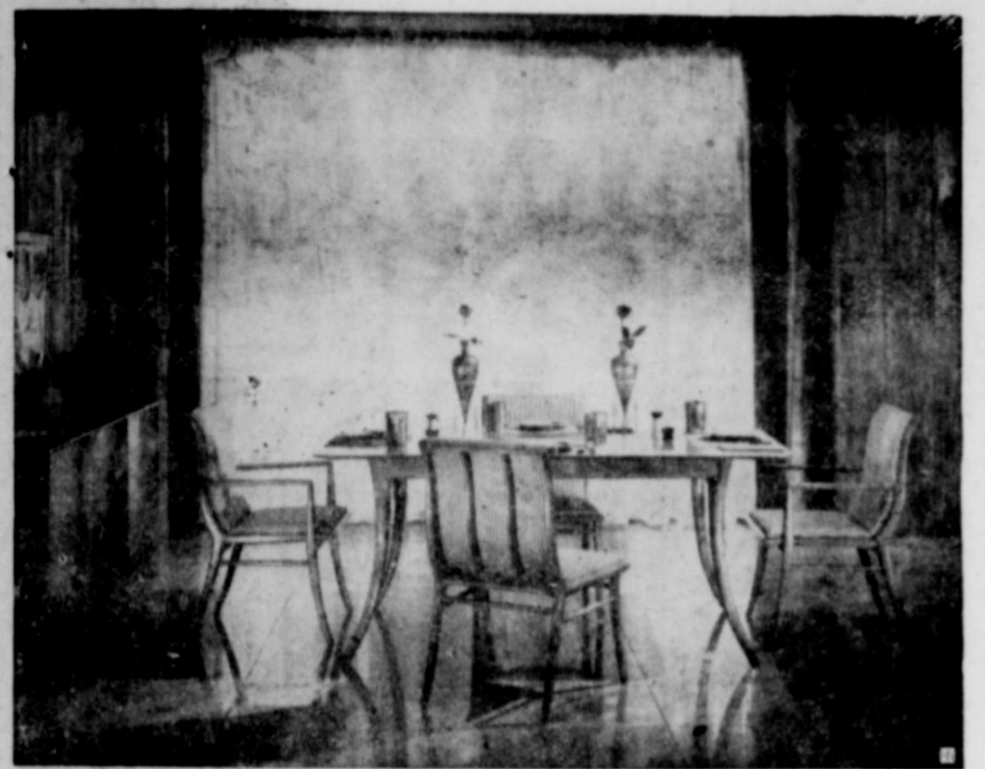

Both teams plan several other games.

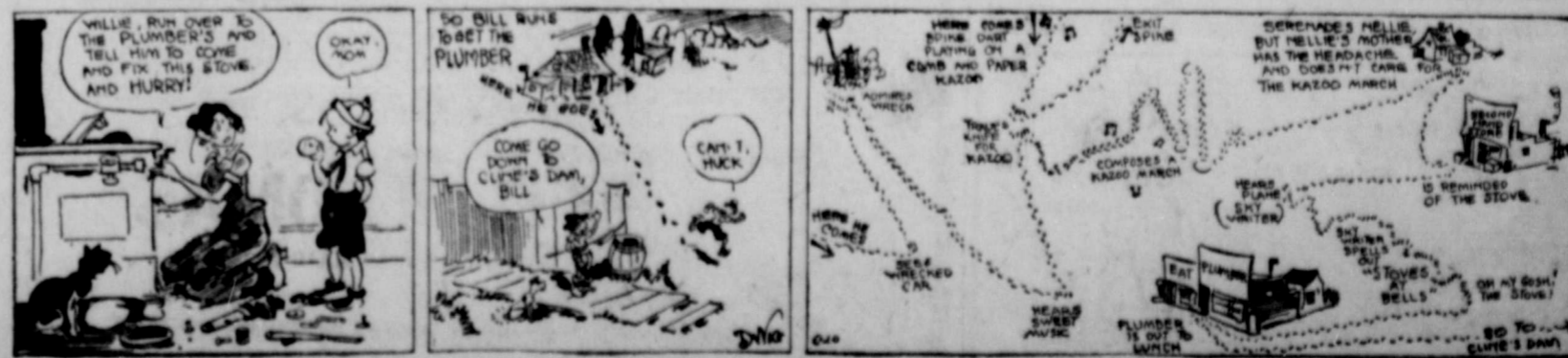

## Office Open At Courthouse For Income Tax Aid

Early filing of your 1953 income tax return will be a big help to Uncle Sam and will put behind you a detail that becomes a bigger headache the longer you put it off. That's the word from Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue.

Campbell, who would be very happy to see a steady flow of letters bearing checks and money orders—no cash, please—reminded taxpayers today that payments should be made to the order of the District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas.

"The vast bulk of Dallas District taxpayers will find no difficulty in making out their own returns, especially if they use Form 1040-A," Campbell said. "But for those who have a problem or two, our office stands ready to give assistance or advice. If you can present the facts on your problem after the phone, call us at 191. If you need personal aid, visit our office at Eastland County Court House."

"To obtain help and avoid the rush and pressure of last minute crowds, call or come in now, while our personnel are better able to assist you."

"It's true that the filing deadline is March 15, but little or nothing is gained by waiting until the last minute to pay up. Taking care of your payments now will help your government to carry on its important defense and construction programs and many other activities, and will let you plan your budget for the rest of the year with assurance."

The district director stressed that careful reading of the instructions, accompanying the forms recently mailed out, will enable most taxpayers to prepare their own returns, often in less than an hour.
