Mothers' March On Polio Tonight

Deadline For Filing Allotment Blanks On Crops Is Feb. 5

Application blanks for new grower cotton allotments and new grower peanut allotments are now available at the Stabilization and Conservation office of the Department of Agriculture in the Eastland county courthouse, Emmett E. Powell, manager, said Thursday.

Powell said four requirements must be met by farmers. Cotton farmers must (1) file all applications by Feb. 5; (2) neither the operator or the landlord may be interested in another farm on which a cotton allotment has been established; (3) the applicant must expect to derive more than 50 per cent of his income from the farm; and (4) the operator and landlord must both sign the application except in extreme cases.

have had experience growing peanuts for two years out of the past five years; (2) the owner or operator must not have an interest in another farm on which a 1954 peanut allotment is established; (3) the operator must expect to derive 50 per cent or more of his income from the farm; and (4) all applications must be filed by Feb. 5.

Powell said the county committee, composed of E. T. Blackwell, J. B. Webb and Ed Townsend, meets the first and third Monday of each month to approve late requests for cost-sharing on a conservation practice.

Got Your W-2 Form? Then Get Busy Brother

"Begin preparing your income tax return when you get your Form W-2 from your employer."

That is the advice of Ellis Campbell Jr., district director.

"Employers are required to distribute Form W-2's (tax withholding statements) to all employees by January 31, Campbell said. For many taxpayers, the W-2 form provides all the principal information needed to file an income tax return, the Internal Revenue official said.

Even before receiving his W-2 forms, the taxpayer can take a big step toward filing his tax return by listing other income, business expenses and allowable personal deductions. "Then, when the W-2 is received," Campbell said, "preparing the tax return will be easy."

Any taxpayer who worked for more than one employer during 1953, from each employer who withheld Federal income tax from his wages or who would have withheld tax if the employee had claimed only one withholding exemption. All W-2 forms must be attached to one's income tax return, which must be mailed to the District Director of Internal Revenue, 2101 Pacific Ave., Dallas, Tex., by midnight of March 15.

RANGER PORCH LIGHTS WILL GUIDE VOLUNTEERS TO DOORS

Ranger's Mothers' March on Polio will be held tonight from 7 until 8 p.m. as stepped up efforts in the final four days of the March of Dimes 1954 contribution drive get underway here.

A score of volunteers, headed by Mrs. Pete Brashier, will make a door to door canvass of the city in an effort to put the Ranger \$5,000 quota over the top.

Volunteers, who will be aided in some areas by Ranger National Guardsmen, have been urged that porch lights in the city be turned on at 7 to aid in the campaign.

Mrs. Brashier, march chairman, has divided the city into sections with captains for each area. She said it was hoped that the canvass could be completed by 8 p.m.

The March of Dimes drive is due to end Jan. 31. The Mothers' March will highlight this week's activities.

And throughout the nation more than 2,000,000 women volunteers will start visiting an estimated 20,000,000 homes throughout the country tonight as participants in the Mothers' March on Polio.

The 1954 March of Dimes appeal for \$75,000,000 in polio fighting funds.

The Mothers' March will be conducted in some 40,000 communities. Similar marches will be held in other communities on subsequent evenings depending on local circumstances.

Each march opens with a blast of fire sirens or the ringing of church bells. Then the women begin visiting homes, where lighted porches or doorways signal that a contribution is waiting.

Actress Helen Hayes, who is a daughter Mary MacArthur died of diphtheria in 1949, is leading the marching mothers this year in her role as national chairman of women's activities for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Mrs. Hayes and Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower will join in a Mothers' March torchlight ceremony at the White House in Washington on Thursday (4:30 p.m., Jan. 28).

A record number of women have been drawn into the marches this year, Miss Hayes said, "because of their interest in the Polio Prevention Program being launched by the March of Dimes."

"From now on," she said, "the success of the March of Dimes is strictly up to the mothers. It will be up to them to assure that sufficient funds are raised for polio prevention and the other needs of the overall polio fight."

Since 1951, Mothers' Marches have added \$22,075,000 to the attack on polio. This is nearly 18 per cent of the funds which the National Foundation received during the past three years.

The Marchers have plowed through snowbanks, rowed boats through flood areas, plodded through congested cities and visited isolated homes to make their record possible. "It is a proud and thrilling record," commented Miss Hayes, "I am confident that no one will be disappointed in his desire to give this January."

In some localities, men have helped their wives by canvassing the business district, wearing tags which proclaimed: "Tonight I am a Mother."

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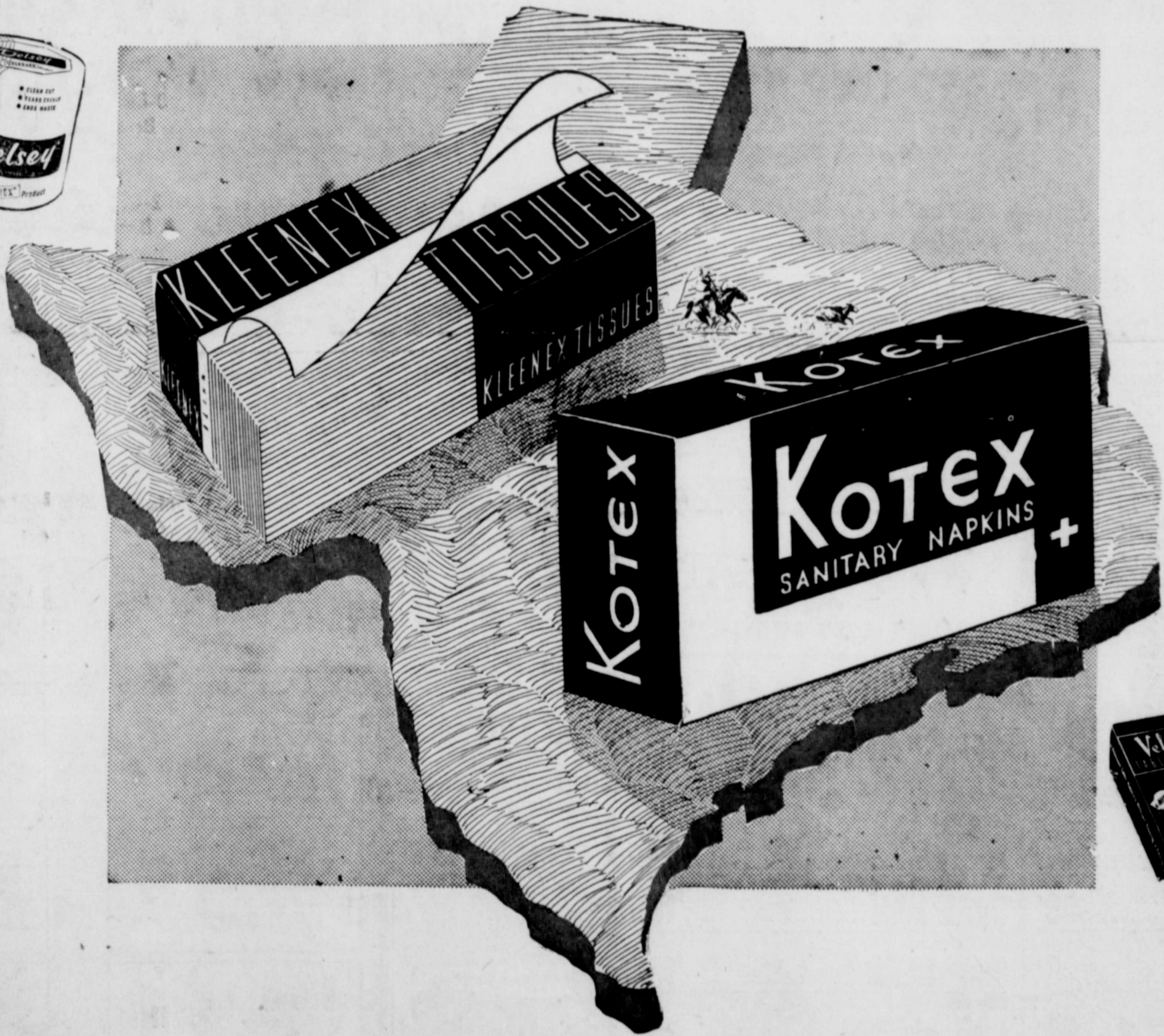

Doctrine Of The Church Of The NAZARENE

In answer to the many questions that have been asked since I have been in Ranger as to what the Church of the Nazarene believes, I wish to submit the following article:

The doctrines of the church are simple and brief. Using of intoxicating liquor as a beverage; using tobacco in any of its forms. "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? If any man defile the temple of God him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are" 1 Cor. 3:16. Songs, literature and entertainments not to the glory of God, the theatre, the ballroom and games of chance, looseness of conduct, etc. "Whosoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God", James 4:4.

Thirty six million of our youth are outside anybody's church. Christian men, women, boys and girls are needed more than ever before to take a stand and fight against these evils of our land.

CHURCH SERVICES Rev. Claude Harris To Speak On Girl's Ranch Thursday Evening

Rev. Claude H. Harris of Breckenridge, will speak on the subject "Girl's Ranch" at 7:30 p.m. tonight at the Second Baptist Church where a revival is now in progress.

Rev. Harris is the founder of Girl's Ranch, which is located midway between Breckenridge and Ranger. There are eight homes and ranches for boys, and orphan homes for children, but no place within our state for delinquent girls. The story behind this home began many years ago, although the home is new.

The land was bought by Sam L. Harris and his wife, who were retired stock farmers with many years spent near the location of Girl's Ranch. In their will they remembered their son, Claude, along with the six other children. Six hundred and forty acres of land fell into the hands of this preacher son. While serving as a chaplain in the Armed Services of his country, this preacher son had the privilege of visiting an orphanage in Tokyo and decided to devote his life to that kind of work.

Upon returning to the States he made his convictions known to several different people, but years passed without a clear understanding as to when or where this work should be undertaken.

Finally after much thought and prayer, things began to clear up and improvement was begun on the land in Stephens County for a Girl's Ranch. This work is purely a work of faith. Work was started on June 1, 1953 from offerings in churches and personal contributions. The home is not officially open and will not be until \$16,500 is raised to go in an endowment fund which will guarantee the first year's operating expenses.

The reception center is finished and almost furnished. Eight head of cattle, four head of hogs, fifty head of sheep, two ewe lambs, two registered and two rabbits have been furnished. A young quarter horse mare has been donated also. Building materials of all kinds are desperately needed and used materials will do. As soon as funds are available, construction will begin on the first dormitory for twenty girls.

The only one of its kind in Texas, the home is for the neglected, underprivileged (delinquent) girl who has nothing to look forward to but a reform school, or even worse. Girls will come from all denominations and no denominations. This home is for girls between 12 and 17 years of age who will be carried through high school and encouraged to go on through college. There are three girls living at the ranch now with a lady named Aunt Mamie Theodore who is serving as house mother. As funds are made available, more dormitories will be built to meet the humanitarian need of worthy girls—girls who, with the proper training and leadership may become missionaries, teachers, and home makers, and become a real asset to society.

States Rev. Harris, "we are endeavoring to fill the choir on Thursday evening with girls from 12 to 17 years of age. This service is especially for intermediate girls and their parents."

There is a mighty difference, and you are entitled to know the spiritual truths as they come from God's Holy Bible.

Sunday evening the pastor will bring the message "What Baptist Believe Concerning the True God." Not everyone knows about God, or even believes in a God. Too many people are not concerned enough with the Godly things of life to even read their Bibles. The citizens of Ranger will be judged according to the teachings of the Holy Bible. Man's personal belief is of no importance when God's plan is opposite that of mere man. The scripture says, "There is a way that seems right unto man, but the end thereof is death."

When an individual says, "Well you know, I have my own idea about certain things." When his ways do not square with God's holy Bible then that man's ways are wrong.

There is a Christian welcome for everyone who visits our services. Every person in the Ranger area, and the stranger within our borders have a special invitation to come worship with us.

The Mid-week hour of inspiration is finding a place in the hearts of discerning Christians. The nursery is always open for the little ones, and parents may either bring their babies to the services or leave them in competent hands in the nursery. You are always welcome.
