

# Ranger Youths Make Tuesday A Black Day For All

Tuesday was a "Black Day" for Ranger when 27 of our High School boys were asked to come to the city police station for questioning.

There is a great difference between "boyhood pranks" which is often referred to as "Boys will be boys" and the destruction of property, endangering lives and stealing or if you want to call it "shop lifting".

What is the answer to the conduct of our youth that will manage Ranger tomorrow? Is it the fault of the school system? The boy is only there a part of the day. Is it the fault of the church? Does the preacher teach shoplifting and destruction of property or do they preach the morality right? Is it the fault of the Police Department, should they overlook the wrongs of the youth of our city and smile as they drive down the streets of Ranger at 70 miles an hour or laugh as they throw rotten eggs at the Police Car? Should they do their jobs, as the protector of our properties and lives that we pay them to do? Is

it the fault of the press for not exposing the boys and make them lose face and marked as "juvenile delinquents" or should the press try and build up their character and not destroy it? Is it the fault of the home. Does the home encourage violations of laws, discourtesy to officers and school teachers, consuming alcoholic beverages and stealing? No! The home teaches right, truth and manners and gives the youth today things that we never dreamed about having when we were young. The home gives love, tender care and

warmth. Is it the youth? Is that the way that they want to live, with no thought of the aftermath? Aftermaths that give heartaches, broken homes and embarrassments. No it definitely is not all the fault of the boy. A boy brought up in a Ranger home knows what is right and what is wrong and he believes it. A boy is sometimes led astray by others and in my opinion it is the fault of every single organization, department and home in Ranger, plus the boy.

It is the fault of the school system for not providing more activities for the youth after their school hours, during the school hours discipline should be taught, their parents should be contacted and methods taken to remedy this condition.

It is the fault of the Police Department for letting our youth do things that are wrong and not taking the measures as outlined by our laws. If the boy deserves another chance I believe the police department should give it to him, but definitely not chance after chance. If they violate the laws

of our city, state and national government they should be duly punished.  
It is the fault of the press for not promoting more activities, advertising part time jobs for Saturdays to give the youth an understanding of the business world. It is the fault of the press for not having a better understanding with the school system, the police department, and the home of our youth, on youth problems so that we might print things that will encourage youth and understand them.  
It is the fault of the church because every preacher regardless of denomination or creed should help our youth by talking to them and encouraging the right and exposing the wrong. To stand in your pulpit and explain to the youth the meaning of stealing, drinking beer, destroying property and speeding with odds that in the town area you might hit some innocent child. Encourage home life and for the families to come to church as families and not father and mother only or brother and sister only but as a family. Have programs for the youth of High School age that will encourage them to take part in church functions and above all talk to them sometime. Don't cast them out because they do, or did wrong but bring them in stronger, make it your goal and not just as side effort. They need you and that is one of the duties of a preacher to build youth and by building youth, you build the community.  
It is the fault of the home for letting them do as they please for letting them go places instead of (Continued on Page 5)

## RJC Increases Student Body

With registration for the spring semester now complete, the enrollment figures at Ranger Junior College show an increase of 60 full-time students. Of these new students 30 are enrolled in the Ranger schools, and the other 30 divided between the Breckenridge and Albany branches of the college.

In the Ranger day school most of the new students are natives of Ranger and neighboring towns. However, several here come from some distance away. Donald Hickey, a pre-dental student, comes from Vernon, Texas. Leonard Rodawalt, majoring in physical education, is from Electra, Texas.  
The student who represents the town most distant from Ranger is William Colfax, a native of Chicago, Ill. Colfax has registered at Ranger Junior College for courses leading to a degree in electrical engineering.

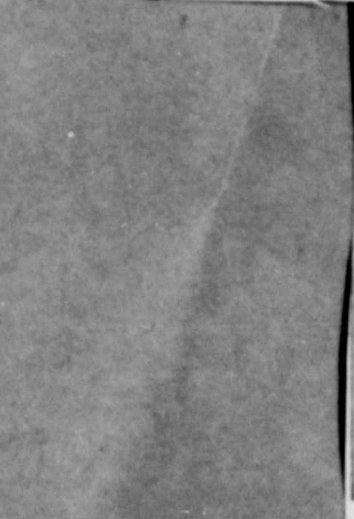

Everybody here needs to work together and help support Ranger. Now to get down to our team work. There has been a trend in the past few months for a good many people to stray away from Ranger to do their buying of clothing, furniture, lumber and groceries—just to mention a few things. They claim it is so much cheaper. How much? When you need credit in a tight spot—you ask for it here in Ranger. If you need a loan you ask for it here in Ranger. The old home merchant is sure a good guy when you are a little short of cash.  
But—if you think you can get ahead by driving 90 miles, one way, and save a few pennies, on paper you sure don't think anything of it. It surely does look tempting when you read all of those "come on" ads in the paper from another town. But, brother, they can't give it away and stay in business! You pay for it and you had better believe it. Sure groceries, clothes and furniture are high, but when you can buy them on credit and pay just about what you want to each month, you always buy the best. Comes the time when you have the ready cash and your home merchant is too high! So you run over to some surrounding town and get some of their cheaper merchandise. You get just what you pay for, brother, if the price is cheap, so is the merchandise quality, and remember, when your money is gone so is their "come on" friendship.  
When you are driving your car, it takes about 9c per mile to operate it. You never think anything of driving approximately 180 miles to do your shopping and all the time imagining what savings you are going to get. Think about it—you may save as high as 10c on a can of food marked "special" and you buy the rest of your needs. In an overall picture you don't give anything because they have their cushion to "bounce" back that dime. The same with clothes and furniture. The article may look the same, but if it is so much cheaper there is a flaw somewhere.  
After you have "shopped" you are getting hungry and it is a long drive home—so you have some lunch—and don't forget to all this amount to your expense account because it all comes with "Operation Cheaper." With lunch over, you drive back home. Did you think that you have driven 180 miles if you go to Post Worth? Giving your car average mileage, we'll say it used 10 gallons of gas, or about \$2.75 worth. You will have spent at least \$1.50 for your lunch for after all you have saved so much you can afford it.

However, you enjoyed the trip so you think nothing of your time or expense. But it really adds up to this: If you buy a bill of groceries here in Ranger, you get them delivered free. Same thing applies to furniture, lumber, etc. So take a look at the thing and see how it balances. You don't get by as cheap as you thought you did. Do you? How about coming back to the team and making Ranger the town it should and could be. Trade somewhere in our town and you will find its service friendly and courteous and lasting. After all it is YOUR town too!  
Just one or two things more. When I discovered this trend of straying away, I was shocked to learn that the gross includes some leading figures, people who are solely dependent on Ranger for their living. Some are in the limelight everyday, individuals who are employed and make their living here by the support of businesses and merchants in Ranger. The town which needs their help is forgotten when they get the pay check and start to spend it. The

old saying "don't owe Ranger anything" is far from being correct. We do owe it something. It's our home and we make our living, educate our children and carry on our everyday lives here and we can best help by keeping our businesses alive. Who pays the city and school taxes here? Who supports our churches, community chest, and our March of Dimes? Our businessmen and merchants do! Will these other towns (friends though they are) pay for our new lake?  
Just take a look around and into the future. Picture Ranger without any stores or business firms. How would you like to have to drive ten miles to buy a quart of milk or a pound of nails? That is our future unless this trend is stopped and we all get back to boosting Ranger. It is your town—it needs you—and you need it. Our slogan is "Shop in Friendly Ranger." Abide by it and you will find it is true.
