Leave the boys on the streets alone. They are part of Texas and their history will grow with time.

COUNTY WAITS FOR FACTS ON COURT RULING

Eastland county schools were apparently taking a wait and see attitude Tuesday following the historical United States Supreme Court ruling Monday which outlawed segregation of Negro and White pupils in public schools.

Following the announcement that the highest court in the nation had unanimously voted that such segregation of the races is unconstitutional, most school officials in the county declined to be quoted.

In Eastland, M. H. Perry, president of the Eastland Independent School Board, said that he would wait any statement he might make cleared before the entire school board.

G. B. Rush, superintendent of Ranger Independent Schools, said that he was waiting for clarification from the state level.

An Associated Press release quoted him as saying, "I don't think anyone can estimate the seriousness of this decision—what it will cost—what it will do to the curriculum."

Thomas Wright Completes USMC Combat Training

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (Spl.)—Marine Pfc. Thomas L. Wright, son of Mrs. E. P. Wright of Hale Center, and husband of the former Miss Dolores F. Williamson of Rt. 2, Eastland, completed four weeks of individual combat training here May 6.

The combat training is normally given to all Marines upon completion of recruit training before they are assigned to a duty station or school and also to men scheduled for overseas duty.

The trainees learn that all Marines are basically infantrymen whether they serve as cooks, typists, truck drivers, or with an aviation unit.

Cheap Advice on Legal Matters Can Be Costly

One of the ambitions of the great American public is to seek a bargain. To try and obtain information, merchandise or advice at a lesser cost than normal, or no cost at all.

On some articles, a gain is made when a lesser cost is found for the same merchandise, but on legal matters, the procurer is the victim. A person may be injured

financially by not seeking advice on a legal problem, from an attorney.

It has been said, "A fool is his own attorney." In the state of Texas over the years the method of justice and equity has gained in the type of standards set and the precedents used.

A method had to be set up to insure that the legal profession would advance in its standards and requirements, so the State Bar of Texas was formed.

This body set up objectives to promote the encouragement of respect for law and courts and have standards, whereby, a seeker of legal advice would be guaranteed that the attorney of choice was competent and trustworthy.

In the early days of Texas the method of finding a man guilty or innocent was based on rules and position and not on facts.

In some of our nations south of the border the method used in finding a man's innocence is based upon his position in the community and the amount of money he is able to pass along to the right hand.

In Texas, due to the State Bar Association, the method is different. Every man regardless of his

creed, color or religion, receives the same attention and his guilt or innocence is based upon the decision of a jury who must weigh each and every issue before a verdict is given.

With the guidance of the State Bar Association, Texas can rest assured that the system used in this state is based upon right and justice.

Work on the new Staff Road and bridge is expected to start early next month, Eastland county commissioners told The Telegram Monday in an exclusive interview.

Perrin In Basic Training Period

FORT BLISS, Tex. (Spl.)—Private Billy J. Perrin, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Perrin of 601 Apple St., Ranger, recently began eight weeks of basic training in the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center at Fort Bliss.

The first eight weeks of basic training are spent on fundamental infantry subjects like army drill, rifle, machine gun, and bazooka marksmanship, and familiarization with army technical subjects. This first phase of training is climaxed with a one week maneuver in the field.

Upon completion of the first eight week cycle, he will either be assigned for further training at Fort Bliss in the techniques of antiaircraft artillery or he will be transferred to another training center for schooling in some other army skill.

Should he remain at Fort Bliss, his second eight weeks will see him learn the uses of various electronic equipment employed by the AAA-RTC. He will also be expertly trained in the firing of light and medium antiaircraft artillery at low flying and high altitude aerial targets on the one-and-one-half million acre Fort Bliss ranges.

All but three landowners have made settlement for the right of way for the road, Judge Hart said.

Work on the bridge as soon as possible is being prompted by rapidly rising waters back of the new dam. Without the bridge, which has been approved by the State Highway Commission, the Staff community would be cut off from both Eastland and Ranger. Funds for the bridge and the road were granted in a special appropriation from the State Highway Commission. Judge Hart said the funds came as a "clean cut gift."

The Highway Commission authorized the construction of a road from a point four and four-tenths miles east of Eastland on Farm-Market Road 870, southeast six and three-tenths miles to an east-west road intersection, south of Staff.

The bridge will cut across the lake one mile west of the present county road. An appropriation of \$125,000 has been granted for the project, \$50,000 of that amount to be earmarked for the bridge.

G. L. Smith, resident engineer with the State Highway Dept., has already forwarded plans for both projects to Austin. Working with Smith on the Plans was District Engineer Robert J. Milligan of Brownwood.

When Beets Are Young, Their Tops Are Tender, and Rich in Vitamins

Beets give a heavy yield for the space they take in the home garden; and can be harvested all summer long and served in many delicious ways.

The height of their quality is reached when they are as big as a golf ball; so several sowings at intervals are advisable to keep new crops coming to be harvested in their prime.

If your beets showed these symptoms last summer, be sure to spread lime or limestone screenings over your garden this spring.

Beets also suffer from crowding, after their roots have begun to swell. They always require thinning out, because each seed is really a cluster of seeds, and too many plants will always grow, too close together, no matter how thin the seeds are sown.

Germination does not average as high as many other seeds, the federal standard being 63 per cent. It is usually advisable to sow seeds an inch apart.

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Most people do not realize how zealously the information given by a client to his lawyer is guarded. It is a fundamental principle of the legal profession that all information confided to lawyers must remain secret. It is the property of the client the same as though it were money, and is not the property of your lawyer to give away. There are only three people in whom you can confide and know that your confidence is protected. They are your lawyer, your doctor and your minister.

Even the law itself protects you in your relationship with your lawyer. No one can compel him to divulge any information confided to him by a client. The reason for

this protection is obvious. Unless you are able to confide fully and completely in your lawyer, he is unable to help you. He cannot protect your interests unless he knows all the facts.

There is an exception to this protection, however, for under the Canons of Professional Ethics to which the lawyer subscribes, the announced intention of a client to commit a crime is not included within the confidences which he is bound to respect. The lawyer may properly make such disclosures as may be necessary to prevent the act or protect those against whom it is threatened.
