

ENGINE NO. 1" MAKES ITS RECORD RUN-Streaking along before the push of six 4500pound thrust rockets, this rocket sled carries its passenger, Lt.-Col. John P. Stapp, at a record-breaking trip ground speed of 421 miles per hour at Holloman Air Development Center near Ala-mogordo, N. M. The Northrup-built device, nicknamed "Engine No. 1, Volunteer Fire Department," is being used to study effects encountered by crews of jet planes during supersonic ballouts. When equipped with 12 rockets, the device is expected to attain a speed of 1800 miles an hour, and simulate conditions which a pilot would face at approximately 1800 miles per hour at a 40,000-foot altitude.
