



That all-American pastime of the picnic is right around the corner. Picnics aren't much fun though, if you have a lot of problems with them. Often the best picnic spots are not equipped with running water. Sowhat to do about such things as washing hands before mealtime? Here's a solution that is so easy, you will wonder why you hadn't thought of using it long before this. Simply take along a capped jar of soapy water and another jar of clear rinse water. Then all you have to do is to pour the soapsuds over your hands, lather, and then rinse with water right out of the jar. Don't even have to take along a basin.
