THREE DAY SUSPENSION OF OUTSIDE WATERING IS REQUESTED BY CITY

Faced with a low supply of water in the city's water tower, an appeal was issued to Ranger citizens, Saturday Ranger Junior Chamber of Commounced Saturday morning when morning to go slow on the use of water. morning to go slow on the use of water,

Both Dr. Calvin Harris, Mayor, and O. L. Cantrell, city water commissioner, joined Les Crossley, city manager in asking that citizens go under a voluntary water rationing until the water tower can be refilled.

For Saturday, Sunday and Monday, it is requested that all outside watering of lawns, gardens and shrubs be discontinued.

Crossley explained that there is no actual shortage of water at Lake Hagaman, but the record use of water in Ranger for the past month has taxed the city's pumping system to capacity, and the drain of water on the system the group going east and south has been in some instances actually greater than the pump-

As a result the supply in the city water tower has drop-ped below a safe level, and this morning it stood at only alf full despite the fact that the pumping equipment was running at full capacity.

The suspension of outside watering is only a temporary measure but one that is badly needed in order to refill the water tower to capacity, Crossley said.




