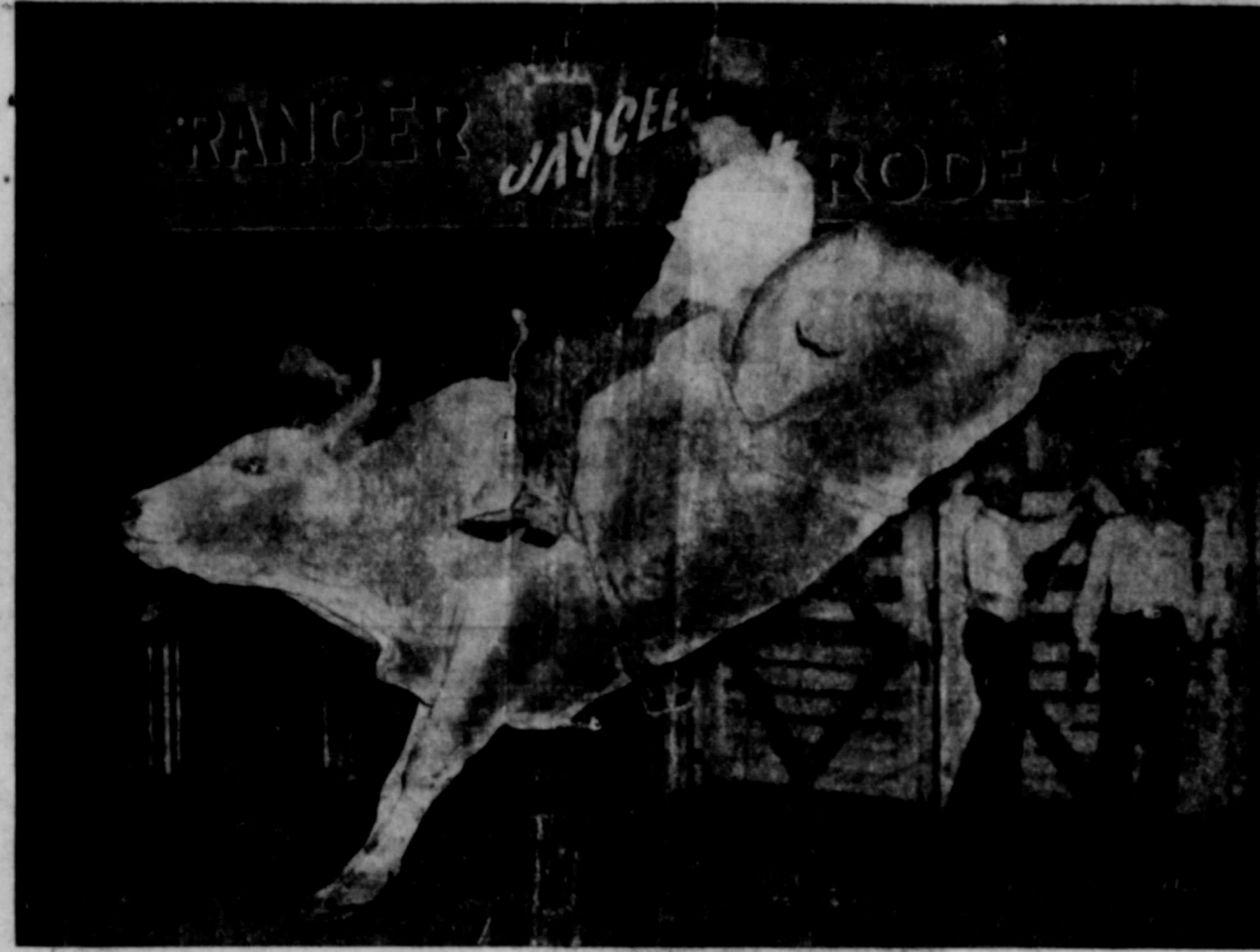

## Judges To Have Choice of 848 Names For Lake

The winner of the \$100 prize for the name given to the new lake may not be known for several days yet.

R. V. Galloway, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, said this morning that it will probably be several days before the board of judges are able to decide upon a single name as the winning title for the new Eastland County Water Supply District lake.

In the final tabulations it was found that 848 different suggestions for a name for the lake submitted to both the Eastland and the Ranger chambers of commerce. In Ranger alone, Galloway said his office received 807 entries from 198 towns.

The total of 848 different suggested names for the lake was determined after duplications had been eliminated, Galloway said. He said it is reasonable to assume that it will take several days before the judges are able to reduce this to a single selection.

"The contest," he added, "which was conducted jointly between the two organizations for the water supply district was unquestionably a success. It achieved an unusual amount of publicity for the cities of Ranger and Eastland which had not been fully anticipated when we decided to hold the contest. The response exceeded by far all expectations."

As soon as a name is selected for the lake, it is indicated that a date will be announced for the dedication program, at which time the person suggesting the winning name in the contest will be an honored guest.

Advance ticket sales for the Ninth Annual Ranger Jaycee Rodeo and Round-Up which opens tomorrow night, Wednesday, July 21 at 8 p.m. and runs through Saturday night, July 24, are well ahead of the sales last year, Wilson Guest, who is directing ticket sales, said today.

Sales of tickets were brisk Monday and this morning at the Rodeo Ticket Office in the lobby of the Paramount hotel. Miss Mildred Balch is in charge of the ticket office.

Heaviest ticket sales this morning had been for the Wednesday and Saturday night performances. General admission tickets are 60 cents and \$1.20; reserved seats, \$1.80 and box seats \$2.40.

The first event of Rodeo week will be staged Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock when the annual parade is held in downtown Ranger. Pat Mossey, parade boss, indicated today that this year's turnout for the parade will be good, and a large number of entries are expected by tomorrow noon. The parade will assemble on West Commerce, and the route will be on Pine to Marston then to Main and on Main back to Commerce.

Some of the rodeo stock was moved into Ranger over the week and the activity at the rodeo grounds was brisk this morning as final preparations were being made.

Bob Estes of Baird is producer of the rodeo, which is approved by the Rodeo Cowboys Association. Mrs. Estes who is secretary for the rodeo began receiving entries early Monday.

## CITY'S SALT WATER STREET MAY PROVE TO BE SUCCESS

Early indications are that the city's experimental use of salt water for obtaining a hard surfaced street, will prove successful, it was the opinion expressed today by Les Crossley, Ranger city manager.

The experiment being made on a quarter of a mile section of Desdemona from Cooper Street south, was started last week. The idea was originated after the successful surfacing of streets and roads with salt.

Heavy salt water, 28 per cent salt by weight, obtained from the M. E. Daniel lease north of Mottson Valley, was used instead of the usual method of mixing the road soil with salt and then wetting to obtain a crystallized surface.

The experiment was conducted by the city with cooperation from Frank Castleberry, county commissioner. The salt water was poured on the street after it was bladed, and the loose soil then mixed with the liquid.

A total of 9,800 gallons of water was hauled from the Daniel lease by Phillips Transport Company, and used on the test section. Based on the salt content by weight it is estimated that more than 10 tons of salt was used. The normal use of salt for surfacing is said to be about six tons per mile.

It will be several more days before the experimental section will be thoroughly dry. It is expected that the salt will crystallize and bind the soil into a hard surface.

Hook Lemmons, city street commissioner of Breckenridge, J. W. Morrow, county judge; I. L. Griffith, Sam Jones and James Bryan, county commissioners of Stephens county were in Ranger to inspect the salt water treatment during the time it was being applied.

## City Sells House To Water District

The dwelling owned by the City of Ranger and located at the Lake Hagaman pump station will probably be moved to the site of the filtration plant of the Eastland County Water Supply District, at an early date, City Manager Les Crossley said today.

The dwelling, presently occupied by W. O. McMillan, city pumper, was recently sold by the city to the water district, and the house will be moved to the new location for the purpose of providing a place of residence for whoever is employed to operate the filtration plant.

## Ranger Postal Receipts Are Ahead of 1953

Postal receipts in Ranger for the past three months are \$1,416.30 ahead of those of the same period a year ago, Postmaster Alvin E. Crawley said today.

The post office records show receipts for April at \$2,275.90; May, \$3,115.18; and June, \$4,355.49, making a total for the quarter ending June 30, of \$9,746.57. This compares with \$8,330.27 in the same three months of 1953.

## Ranger Overcomes Low Water Supply

The cooperation of Ranger citizens over the weekend in reducing the use of water by a temporary suspension of watering lawns, shrubs and gardens enabled the city to recover an almost full supply of water in the tower on Ranger hill, City Manager Les Crossley said today.

"Dr. Calvin Harris, mayor and O. L. Cantrell, city water commissioner," Crossley said, "have expressed official appreciation on behalf of the City of Ranger to its citizens for the wonderful support given the appeal on Saturday when they were requested to reduce the use of water."

Crossley again emphasized that it was not a shortage of supply which caused the request to suspend the outside use of water, but it was because of the continued capacity demand upon the city's water system which has prevented the pumping facilities to overcome the storage problem which had arisen.

The city water tower has a capacity of 460,000 gallons, but this storage had dropped to less than half that amount by Saturday morning.

When citizens responded to the appeal of city officials, the supply was built up over the weekend, and lacked only about 24,000 gallons being full Monday afternoon.

During the weekend alterations were made at the city's Lake Hagaman plant in an effort to increase the capacity for lifting water from the lake.

Led by City Commissioner O. L. Cantrell and L. T. Rushing, a large crew of workmen Sunday laid a new 6-inch low lift line which will enable the plant to increase its water capacity at least 9,000 gallons an hour. Crossley said the task would normally require a crew of men about two and a half days time, but the job was completed in less than eleven hours.

The new low lift line was attached to the small stand-by pump and will increase the volume of raw water being fed into the treating system. The plant has two low lift pumps, with the smaller one in use.

## Little League YANKEES AND GIANTS TIED FOR LEAGUE LEAD; FINAL GAMES SET FOR NEXT WEEK

Two teams in Ranger's Little League, Killingsworth's Yankees and Commercial State Bank Giants enter the final stretch of the season tied for first place, and there is a mathematical possibility that the winner of the league will not be known until the last night of play.

The Little League will suspend play for the remainder of this week—Rodeo Week in Ranger—and the final two nights of baseball scheduled for this season will be played July 25 and July 29.

In Monday night's games, the Killingsworth Yankees defeated the Premier Dodgers by a score of 12 to 10, and in the second game the Commercial State Bank Giants took a game from Art's Tool and Supply Indians, by a score of 11 to nine, despite the fact that the Dodgers out-hit the Yankees.

The Yankees broke away with a series of hits in the first inning to get an eight run lead over the Dodgers. This one big inning enabled them to stay out in front and hold a margin of winning scores over the Dodgers. Scoring by

In the second game, it looked like a tight ball game for two and a half innings, with the Indians holding a one to nothing lead over the Giants. In the second half of the third inning, the Giants picked up six runs and went into the lead, adding five more in the fourth, which proved to be enough to defeat the Indians.

This was another game in which the losing team had out-hit the winners. In several instances the Indians threatened to pull another surprise win even to the rally staged in the last inning which netted two runs and left a man on base at the final out was made.

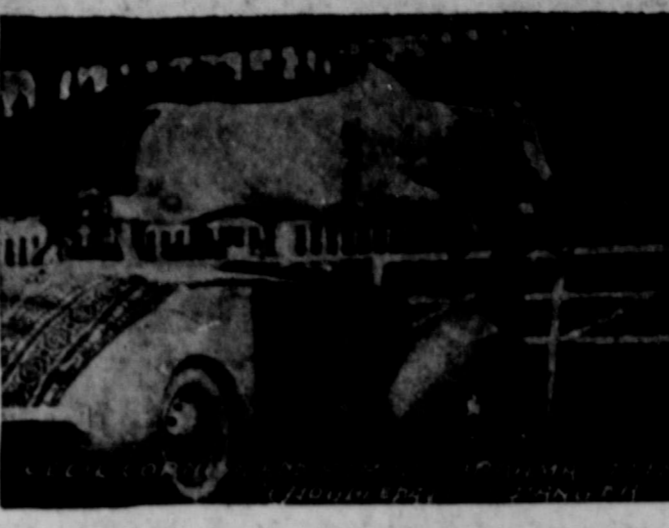

er one used as a stand-by in case the large pump developed trouble. P-10 have previously been attached to one low lift line.  
Crossley said should the serious storage supply develop again, they will try to work out another plan at the plant to increase the flow of treated water into the city mains. Then if this fails, some future plan of voluntary slow-down on water use may be requested.  
The city manager declared that every effort is being made to fully treat all the water before it is pumped into the city's distribution system. The new low lift line will enable them to pump a larger volume into the treating system, and thus have a larger volume of treated water ready for the distribution system.

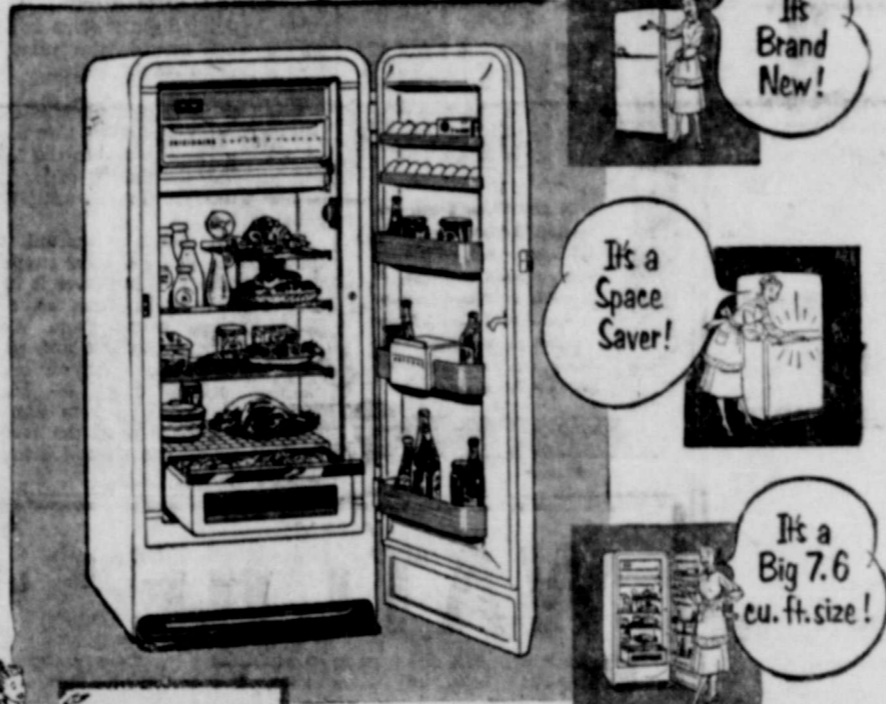

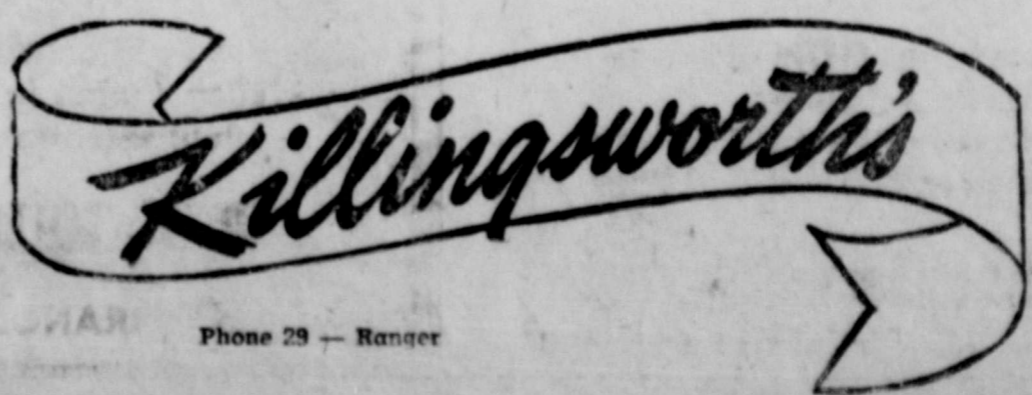

To preserve the whiteness of white nylon garments, wash them apart from colored things. If the white turns yellow or has stubborn stains, use one of the new bleaches containing sodium perborate. Nylon articles can be washed in water as hot as the hand can stand. Water which is too hot may cause stubborn wrinkles.

Try this crumb topping for your favorite coffee cake. Sprinkle it with spicy oatmeal cookie crumbs which have been mixed with a little brown sugar and moistened with melted butter or margarine.

Picnic sandwiches will stay fresh longer if, after they're wrapped, you seal the edges of the waxed paper with a hot iron.

Next time you serve waffles or pancakes, try this syrup. Heat 1 cup of maple-blended syrup to boiling and 3-4 cup of drained, canned crushed pineapple. When chilled, this syrup is a good sauce on ice cream and sherbet.

If patches of dirt on floors are hard to remove with a dry mop, rub them with fine steel wool moistened with turpentine.

Here's a gourmet rich dish you can prepare easily. Just take a 5-ounce package of pre-cooked rice, cook according to package directions, and before serving add 1-4 cup chopped stuffed olives and 2 tablespoons of butter or margarine, mixing lightly. This is delicious when served with ham or with a tomato rabbit sauce.

Small tears in net curtains can be mended by applying a thin coat of colorless nail polish to the tear and pressing the frayed edges together with the fingers until the polish dries.

Cook as much macaroni or spaghetti as you need for supper. Don't overcook it, but have it tender. Drain it well. Then make a good cheese sauce from your recipe. Season with salt and pepper, and add about a cup of finely chopped leftover meat — ham, beef or tongue. Heat to almost boiling and pour over the macaroni. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and serve.

Army Major Raymond A. Kessler, in co-operation with the Insular Bureau of Agriculture (Philippines), in 1931 produced a vaccine for rinderpest, an acute cattle disease. Within a few years after the development of this vaccine, rinderpest was eradicated from the islands.

The nickel silver family of alloys contain no silver whatsoever, but are alloys of copper, nickel and zinc. They form tough and durable bases for plated flatware, such as knives, forks and spoons.
