This amendment would provide four-year terms for elective district, county and precinct officers instead of the present two-year term. If it is adopted, the following officials elected in the 1954 general election will serve for four years: district and county clerks, county judges, treasurers, crim nal district attorneys, surveyors hide and animal inspectors, jus tices of the peace and comn ioners of precincts two and four. Sheriffs, tax assessors-collectors constables, and commissioners precincts one and three will be elected for two year terms.




