Ranger JC Grad Promoted To Oil Exploration Clerk

FORT WORTH (AP)—A graduate of Ranger Junior College, Celestion H. Jackson has been named district exploration clerk in Stanolind Oil and Gas Company's Albuquerque, New Mexico, district exploration office, it was announced here by William J. Nolte, division exploration superintendent for Stanolind's North Texas-New Mexico division.

Jackson is assuming a new position created as a result of the recently announced reorganization of the company's exploration districts. The reorganization was designed to strengthen Stanolind's exploration program, and represents a further step in the decentralization of operating and staff activities.

In his new capacity, Jackson will be in charge of clerical and administrative detail work for the Albuquerque district. Jackson moves to Albuquerque from Andrews, Texas, where he was plant clerk at the South-Fulerton Gasoline Plant. He has been with Stanolind since 1944.

MORE EFFICIENCY DUE WITH NEW TRASH TRUCK, CITY CLAIMS

The City of Ranger recently purchased one of the new type Pak-Mor trash trucks to aid in the city's increasing trash problem. The truck will soon go into service, Lester Crossley, city manager, has announced.

As its name implies the unit packs the trash and garbage into the truck as it is loaded thus greatly increasing the amount that can be loaded before dumping. The older type truck that the city previously employed was unable to transport near as large loads on each trip.

City officials deemed the purchase necessary to their effort toward giving the citizens a better trash service, even though the truck drained the city funds of slightly more than \$5000.

Crossley stated, "Trash pick-up and disposal is one of the major problems facing all cities, and in Ranger it is particularly a problem in that our city limits are so large in proportion to total population, there being 16 square miles within the city limits. In addition a large portion of the city was never subdivided and consequently there are many houses that do not have an alley, making it necessary for the sanitary employees to either carry trash long distances to the truck or drive into the driveway and back out."

Nearly three years ago the City Commission enacted an ordinance providing for a trash service for ever house within the city limits, with a charge of 25 cents per month for the service. However, without the newer equipment the city has not been able to render as efficient service as they desired.

Citizens are urged to keep their trash in barrels and to make them as accessible as possible.

Ranger Travel To Arlington; Bulldogs Host Mineral Wells Rebels Rated 2 Nationally

Ranger Junior College Rangers have an opportunity Saturday night of placing themselves in the national spotlight when they engage the Arlington State Rebels,

against the Rangers, but Coach Claude "Chen" Gilstrap of ASC has said that he is anticipating a very tough battle from the visiting Rangers "who are always at their best against ASC."

Last year a highly favored Rebel team was extended to the utmost to eke out a 13-6 victory over the Rangers.

He appeared quite cheerful over the performance of the "new team" during the past two weeks. The Rangers have had two weeks to prepare for the contest since an open date followed the Tarleton contest.

At Ranger JC ... Student Influx Draws \$71,000

Dr. Price Ashton, president of Ranger Junior College, indicated today in a reply to a State Legislative Budget Board telegram that college enrollment in the Ranger school would exceed 600 students by November, 1956.

This estimate, made on the amount of growth of the college in the past few years, will be used by the Budget Board to write the year's appropriation bill.

Dr. Ashton also said that there were 400 full time students enrolled at the first of this month, in determining eligibility for state apportionment at that time. He added that enrollment should increase to 540 within one year from now.

If the estimated increase in enrollment materializes, state apportionments to the college would increase slightly more than \$25,000 next year and nearly repeat itself the next year.

The state's apportionment table is scaled according to the number of students enrolled. The state pays \$230 for each student up to 250. All over 250 draw \$189 each.

This year, Ranger Junior College had its depository increased by \$46,000. Next year it will be increased to approximately \$71,000 yearly and up according to registration figures.

The apportionments do not affect the college's building program as revenue for construction is derived from a different source, however it is utilized for teacher's salaries and supplies. The college regulates the salaries of the various instructors.

Dr. Ashton stated that the year before he was appointed president of the institution that the college received \$28,000 from the state on the basis of 116 enrollments.

On Fourth Period TD Pups Gig Mineral Wells 6-0

The Bulldog Pups set a goal for their big brothers Tuesday night by thumping Mineral Wells Junior High 6-0 in a conference tilt at Range Stadium.

It was Ranger fullback Kirby Kidwell who yielded a particularly stiff right arm, who performed yoeman's service for the Pups in eating up yardage, especially when a first down was needed, and then finally scoring the games winning touchdown on the first play of the fourth stanza.

For the most part, it was the battle of a bruising ground game pitted against an ineffective aerial attack. Pathbreaking Ranger maintained possession of the ball for nearly three fourths of the contest while Mineral Wells was allowed only 31 offensive plays—14 of which were passes. They were able to complete only two for a net gain of 31 yards.

County Voters Pass Only Four Amendments Tuesday

Eastland County voters as expected went all the way with the Democrats in the general election Tuesday but favored only four of the proposed constitutional amendments.

Final vote tabulations showed that amendment one (old age assistance) passed 1379 to 297, amendment four (confederate pension fund) was favored 1495 to 763, amendment 10 (military voting) passed 1379 to 871, and number 11 (tax officials) went over 1,074 to 720.

Here was how voting went on the amendments which were not favored by Eastland County voters:

Number 2 (retirement credits), for 1,015, against 1,246.
Number 3 (employee benefits), for 1,052, against 1,086.
Number 5 (state salaries), for 958, against 1,325.
Number 6 (toll road grants), for 964, against 1,215.

The Ranger Bulldogs, with a victory and one defeat on their conference record, engage the twice-beaten but powerful Mineral Wells Mountaineers in a "Mother-Dad" game Friday night at Ranger Stadium. In a 9-AAA loop tilt.

Mothers and fathers of the Ranger gridmen will be provided with chairs on the sidelines near the Bulldog reserve bench and the parents will wear the identical number on their back as the son has inscribed on his jersey.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF RANGER, ON DECEMBER 4, 1954

Notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger that a special election will be held in the City of Ranger at the City Hall on December 4, 1954, as provided for in the following ordinance passed by the City Commission on November 2, 1954:

An ordinance providing for the submission to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger, Texas, of a certain amendment to the Charter of said City to be voted on at a Special Election to be held in said City on December 4, 1954. Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ranger:

That there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger at a special election to be held in the City of Ranger on December 4, 1954, the following proposed amendment to the present charter of said City of Ranger:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

1. That Sections Two, Eight, and Nine, all of Article V of said Charter of the City of Ranger be so amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 2 — Term of Office: The Mayor and each Commissioner shall serve as follows:

Beginning in the year 1955 the Mayor and Commissioners of Places Two and four shall serve for a term of two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified, unless sooner removed from office as herein provided.

Beginning in the year 1955 the Commissioners of Places One and Three shall serve as follows:

For one year beginning with the 1955 term, and thereafter beginning with the 1956 term for two years; and until his successor is elected and qualified, unless sooner removed from office as herein provided."

"Section 8 — Election Day. The regular municipal elections of the City of Ranger shall be held on the first Tuesday in April in the year 1955, and on said first Tuesday in April every year thereafter."

"Section 9 — Election, Laws Controlling: All elections provided for in this Chapter, except the regular election held on the first Tuesday of April, 1955, and on said day every year thereafter shall be called special elections, and all elections shall be conducted and results canvassed and announced by the election authorities prescribed by the Election Code of the State of Texas, and said Election Code shall control in all municipal elections, except as otherwise herein provided."

2. That all parts of the existing city charter of the City of Ranger in conflict herewith, and especially Sections 2, 8, and 9, all of Article V, as the same now exist, are hereby repealed and said Sections 2, 8, and 9 of Article V, as the same herein read, be substituted therefor.
