BREAKDOWN IS GIVEN OF ALL COUNTY TOWNS

A breakdown of Eastland County school children who will be eligible to receive the Salk polio vaccine in April if tests prove successful was made Thursday by Dr. L. C. Brown, county health officer.

Dr. Brown released figures showing just how many students in each county town will be eligible to take the tests if their parents agree.

Roadblock Is Run; Bullets Stop Pair

A 100-mile an hour automobile chase, which included officers from Eastland and Ranger, ended three miles out of Eastland Thursday night when Eastland police fired a series of shots at a 1954 Chevrolet driven by an Eastland man, forcing the driver to come to a halt.

Charges of speeding and reckless driving were filed against two young Eastland men, one 22 and the other 23 years old. The driver of the car was fined \$50 in Eastland corporation court and the other \$25.

Ray Laney, Eastland chief of police, gave this account of the chase. He said the two men were first spotted by Ranger police, who gave chase. Ranger police were unable to stop the speeding car and radioed ahead to Eastland police who set up a road block. The two men ran through the road block and speeded into downtown Eastland. The chase carried the speeder and Eastland police up Plum-mer, to Coneller to Sadosa to Seaman to Bassett Street and then over the bridge. Three miles out the youths halted their car, after Eastland police planted a bullet in the late model Chevrolet.

Chief Laney said his officers were forced to risk their lives in the speeding chase. "My men all have families and it isn't any fun to have to take their lives in their hands because a couple of boys act that way," he said. The boys also gave a lot of credit to the newly installed police radio in Eastland.

When questioned by police on why they didn't stop when police got after them with sirening siren and a flashing red light, one of the boys said, "Oh we had a '54 Chevy and so did you, so we just thought we would find out which one was best."

Police said they found out.

Court Redistricting Hearing March 28th

A hearing pertaining to Eastland, Callahan, Shackelford, Taylor and Stephens counties — involving a redistricting of district courts — is set for hearing Monday, March 28 at 7:30 p.m., Rep. Paul Brashear, Cisco, told the Times Saturday.

"I will appreciate your assistance in notifying the people of your area as this will be their opportunity to appear for or against this bill," Mr. Brashear said.

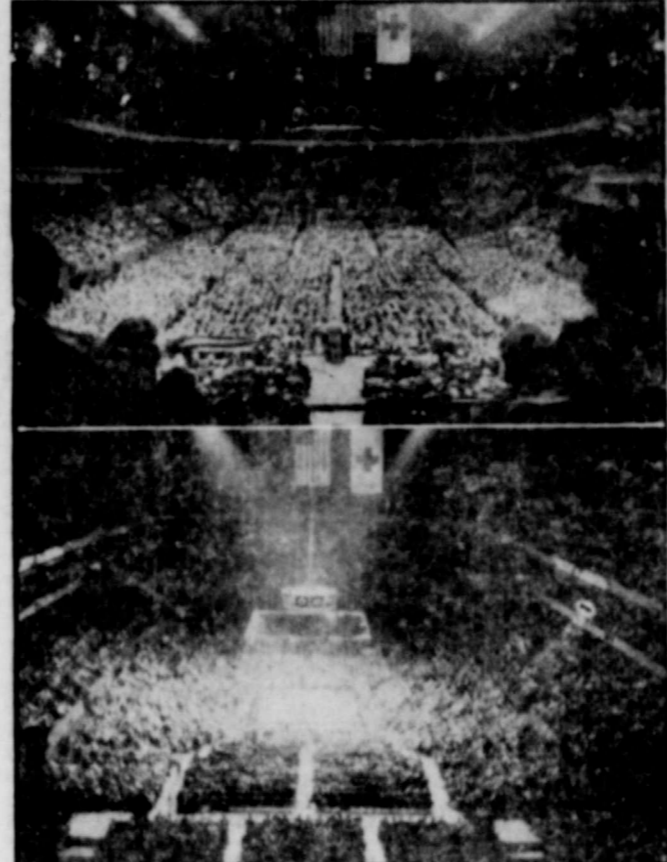
Mr. Brashear explained that House Bill 536, by Rep. Yancy of Houston, known as the Judicial Redistricting Bill of the entire state, will be heard in sections.

A bill introduced by Rep. Brashear and Rep. Mack Allison of Mineral Wells, House Bill 32, would increase the 91st District Court of Eastland County in size by adding Callahan County. The bill would also make a fulltime Taylor County court out of the 42nd District Court and would add Shackelford County to the 90th District Court.

Judge Turner Collie of the 91st District Court has expressed support of Mr. Brashear's plan. He cited the growth of Abilene and the expected growth of Taylor County to 100,000 in the immediate future, as reason for making the 42nd fulltime in Taylor County.

Judge Collie said the arrangement is agreeable to all judges affected and "90 percent of the attorneys in the five counties."

"We are now in a position to assist you people of Ranger in securing a portion of the industry from the East," M. L. Bird, vice president of general distribution of the Lone Star Gas Co., told a large group that had crowded into the Globson Hotel dining room Friday noon to attend a luncheon honoring Lone Star officials.

Bird added, "You have done much to attract industry here with your new lake, and we have encouraged other industries into the state where we have properties." "However," he said, "we have been a little jealous in getting industry near our properties, and now we can be jealous with Ranger."

The vice-president indicated that Ranger had at one time been the lifeline of Lone Star Gas, when the company found sufficient gas here to continue operation of their small but growing operational equipment. He said since that time to the present, Lone Star has serviced its 750,000th customer.

Dr. W. P. Watkins, acting as master of ceremonies in the absence of President Charles Milliken, replied, "If Ranger was the lifeline for Lone Star at one time, then Lone Star is the lifeline for Ranger now."

Certificates were issued Thursday night to 70 persons who completed the public relations course that was sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce the first four nights this week.

O. C. Warden presented the certificates. The course was administered here by E. A. Willeford, Retail Training specialist from the University of Texas.

Arrest Report Made For Hunting Season

AUSTIN—The Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission said the hazards faced by any feathered object taking flight during the hunting season were pointed up by the final arrest report for the recent legal shooting period.

The compilation included the case of a Central Texas man fined for shooting a sandhill crane, a large, slate-colored marsh bird. He was fined \$25.00 and costs.

"This poor fellow could have been color blind," said the Director. "Otherwise, I can see no excuse for shooting this beautiful specimen."

He pointed out that sometimes persons charged with shooting large white birds explain that they mistook the target for snow geese.

"But a sandhill crane," said the Director, "has so many distinctive characteristics besides a color unlike anything else in the large bird category. For one thing, the giant crane flies with its long neck extended and, in a more conspicuous way, carries its long legs straight out behind."

The report emphasized the many prosecutions for night hunting. Two Houston men were fined a total of \$400.00 and court costs for shooting a doe deer at dark. Another Houston man paid \$150 plus costs on charges of hunting from a car and hunting with an artificial light.

 and a sincere desire to be of service to my community."

I am married, and reside with my wife, Mary Jane Hale, who has been an employee of the Commercial State Bank for the past several years, and my daughter, Phyllis, age 12, in our home, which we own, at 815 Walnut St. I am 41 years of age and have lived my entire life in Ranger, with the exception of the time during which I was in the armed services, 28 months of that service having been in combat service with the 485th Quartermaster Refrigeration Company of the 3rd Army in the European theater. I am a graduate of the Ranger Public Schools. After graduating from High School I completed a business course in Lubbock, and since have taken a course in Municipal accounting, Municipal economics and operation. I am a member of the First Baptist Church, the American Legion and the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

"My parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Hale, who reside at 305 South Oak St. have been residents of Ranger for the past 23 years."

"I know that people of advanced age live in Ranger and I know that in many cases these elderly people have no source of income except what they receive from the State Welfare agency, which is only sufficient for bare living expenses and taxes and other expenses of the city are a very real burden, and could, unless such items are closely watched become a burden they could not possibly bear. If I am elected it shall be my policy to always keep in mind in setting tax and utility rates the limited funds our respected elderly people have with which to pay such items."

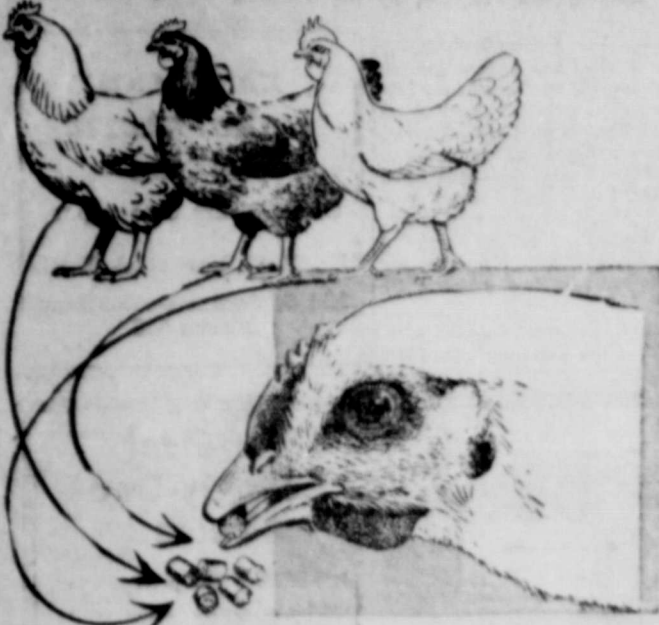

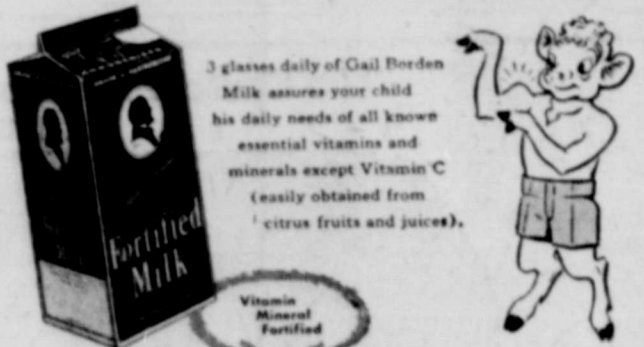
