## S. M. McAnelly Retires From Lone Star After 40 Years

Possibly the thing Stanley McAnelly misses most following his retirement after almost 40 years with Lone Star Producing Company in Ranger, is a test car he jokingly called his "Buick."

Several years ago, it was decided he needed a test car in which to permanently install his apparatus. He needed a good deal of room so he requested a Buick but instead, he got a Chevrolet. The boys around his Ranger headquarters would pass by the car, lick their fingers, and draw three circles on each side of the hood. And to this day, every time he refers to the car, he calls it his "Buick."

Mr. McAnelly began his work with Chestnut and Smith in June, 1922, as a mechanics helper. He served as an operator and chief loading rack before being made a tester in 1925, a job he held until his retirement on October 31.

The retiree well remembers the oil boom town of Ranger in the early 20's. "It was a wild and wicked town," he said. "There were killings every night. I also remember how scarce a good sidewalk was in those days too. But both Ranger and I survived the boom days. I think it's unusual for a man to work for a company for 40 years, but even more unusual for a man to work in the same location for that many years."

## Ranger-Eastland Highway To Get \$107,000 Re-Vamp

The Texas Highway Commission has approved a 7.5 mile highway betterment project on U. S. Hwy. 80 from Broughter Street in Eastland to Farm Road 2461 west of Ranger according to District Engineer E. M. Pritchard of Brownwood. This work will be an asphaltic concrete level-up and shoulder seal coat, and is estimated to cost \$107,000.

The work approved is part of the 1962 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program in which funds allocated throughout the State for improvements to the U. S. and State Highway Systems. This program is intended to provide additional safety features and proper upkeep on these highway systems.

The work in Eastland County is part of the nine county District's program allotment of \$33,000. Other counties in the District in which work is scheduled under this program are Comanche, Lampasas, McCulloch, and Stephens.

Pritchard said that surveys and plan work would begin immediately and construction should begin on most of these projects by summer of 1962.

Resident Engineer R. P. Haun, Jr. of Eastland will be in charge of work in Eastland county.

## Lynn Nicholson Bags Elk on Hunting Trip

Lynn Nicholson, an employee of Lone Star surveying crew, returned last Friday from a successful hunting trip at Lake City, Colo. Nicholson was in a party of six that made the trek to Red Mountain for the hunting season there. He was the only one in the party to kill an elk. Another member of the party, all of Midland, bagged a 200 pound buck.

The elk weighed 600 pounds and had a head rack of five points on one side and four on the other.

The hunting party arrived in the mountains before the hunting season opened and set up camp. Nicholson made his kill on the first day, about one mile from camp. He dressed and quartered the animal on the spot, but said that it took him two days and two horses to bring it back to camp. The snow was very deep and the horses could not travel at a fast pace. The temperature was from 10 to 15 degrees above freezing while the party was there. Nicholson made his kill at the distance of 400 yards. The kill was made at an altitude of 13,500 feet.

Nicholson said that this was his first elk and it was rather expensive. Hunting licenses cost \$50 and include tags for one elk, one bear and three deer. He had the head mounted.

For your information, I have prepared the following fact sheet concerning the new Sunday Law, which will become effective in November of 1961. As your elected representative, I feel that I should try to help keep you informed on matters that affect your

business. Please feel free to contact me, if I may be of further service to you. Senate bill 35 makes it illegal to offer for sale the following items on Saturday or Sunday (if you choose to sell on Sunday, you cannot sell on Saturday—if you decide to sell on Saturday,

you must not sell on Sunday): "Clothing; clothing accessories; wearing apparel; footwear; headwear; home, business, office or outdoor furniture; kitchenware; kitchen utensils; china; home appliances; stoves; refrigerators; air conditioners; electric fans; radios; television sets; washing machines;

driers; cameras; hardware; tools; excluding non-power driven hand tools; jewelry; precious or semi-precious stones; silverware; watches; clocks; luggage; motor vehicles; musical instruments; recordings; toys; excluding items customarily sold as novelties and souvenirs;

mattresses; bed coverings; lamps; drape; blinds; curtains; mirrors; lawn mowers; or cloth piece goods." There is a maximum fine of \$100 on the first offense, and \$500 on convictions thereafter. Occasional sales are exempt un-

der this act. Emergency sales are exempt under this act. I hope this information will prove to be of help to you. Should you have questions concerning this or other Legislative matters, please let me know. As you probably

know, I worked as hard as I could to keep Texas free of an UNFAIR SALES TAX; However, I was on the losing side and we now have one of the most burdensome Sales Tax laws in the United States. Some merchants have closed their doors because of it. If you have

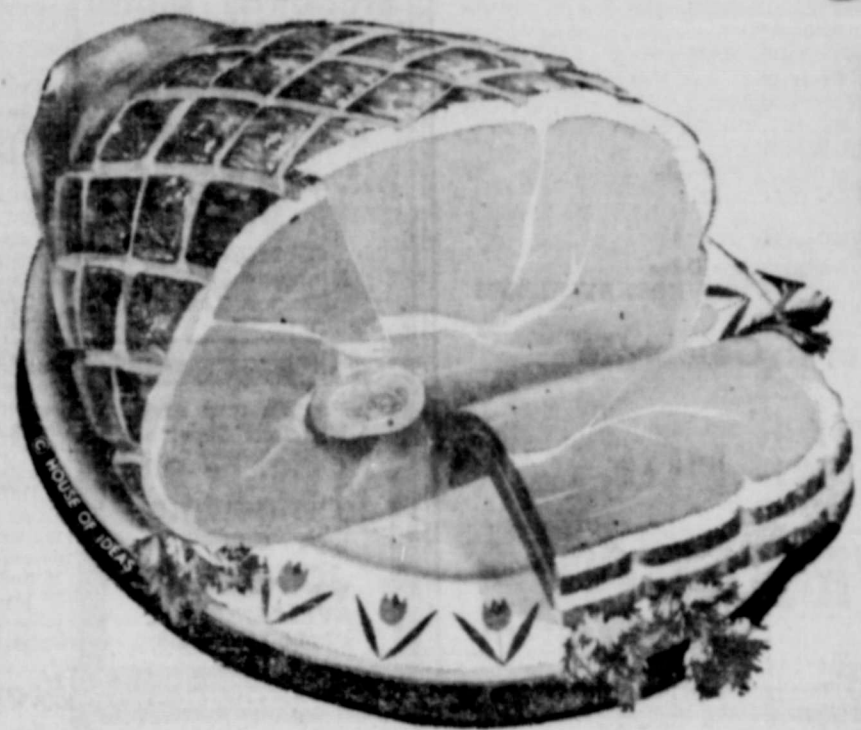

dred thousand employes, their families and community friends. But, essentially, Chevrolet will celebrate its golden anniversary doing what it does best. Its plants will be humming at top speed to build enough cars and trucks to satisfy anticipated record demand for its 1962 products.

Chevrolet's "Golden Anniversary" lineup is the largest and most varied in the company's history, according to E. N. Cole, general manager of the Chevrolet division and vice president of General Motors. A total of 32 mod-

els are included in the Corvair, Chevy II, Corvette and regular Chevrolet lines plus 200 different truck models. Chevrolet maintains 22 manufacturing and 13 assembly plants around the country. To sell and service its products, Chevrolet operates 41 parts service warehouses and 57 sales offices located strategically across the United States. Over 100,000 people are currently on the company's payrolls.

Chevrolet's nationwide operations today are a far cry from the company's localized and faltering activities during its first few years of existence.

Chevrolet was founded by William C. Durant, a Flint businessman who in 1908 had organized the General Motors Company which later became General Motors Corporation. Because of financial difficulties, however, Durant lost control of his youthful consolidation in 1910 and immediately was looking for a new vehicle with which he could regain power in the automotive industry. To this end, he organized the Chevrolet Motor Company which was incorporated on Nov. 3, 1911. To design a car for his new

company, Durant hired Louis Chevrolet, one of three French brothers who had gained worldwide fame as race drivers. Chevrolet spent two years designing a car which, with some styling modifications, was put into production in 1912 but received limited public acceptance.

Even before his 1911 experimental model had been put into production, however, Louis Chevrolet left the company to return to his first love of racing.

The first Chevrolet plant was a small barn-like garage on West Grand Boulevard in Detroit. With employment of a few hundred people, the plant turned out 2,959 cars during its first year of operation in 1912.

The year 1913 began a period of accelerating popularity for Chevrolet cars and expansion of plant facilities to accommodate the increasing demand.

During the same year, Durant merged Chevrolet with the Little Motor Car Company of Flint and moved his Detroit operations to the Flint Wagon Works. A second assembly plant was also leased in New York City in 1913.

Main reason for the increasing customer demand was the introduction of two new models called the Baby Grand touring car and the Royal Mail roadster which replaced the original 1912 car. These new models met with strong public approval and production jumped to 5,987 units in 1913 and to 13,292 in 1915.

During its first five years of operation, Chevrolet was competing in a market just above the low-price class. But in 1916, with the introduction of the famous "490" model—so named because of its price—Chevrolet made its first important bid for volume sales in the American mass market.

Currently, Chevrolet holds the industry record for number of cars and trucks built by a company during a year (2,247,612 in 1960). It also holds the industry record for most passenger cars built during a year by one company (1,873,98 in 1960) and most trucks (494,573 in 1960).

During its 50-year history, Chevrolet has built more than 45 million cars and trucks for both domestic and foreign distribution. It took Chevrolet nearly 12 years to produce its first million vehicles. Today it takes about 5-1/2 months of regular operations.

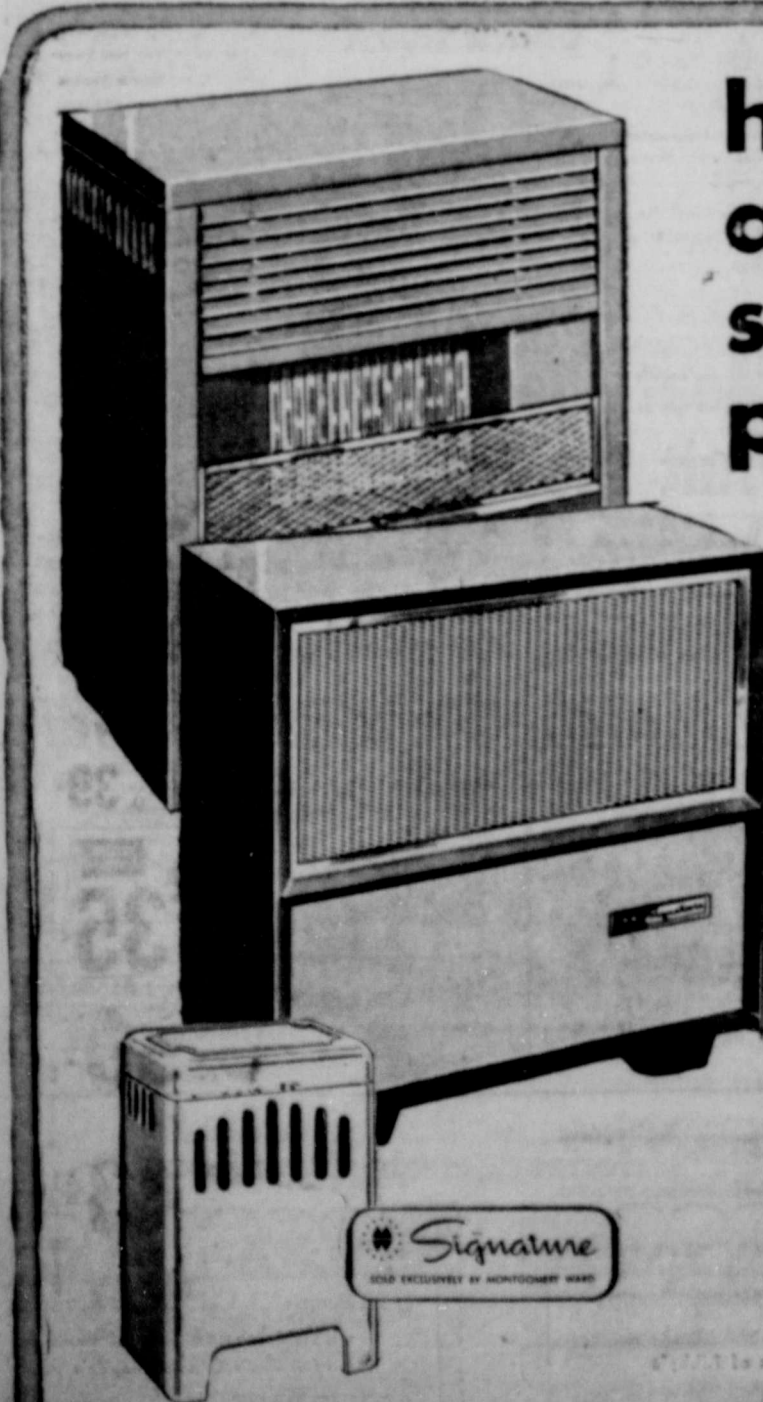

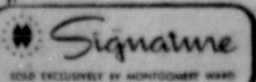

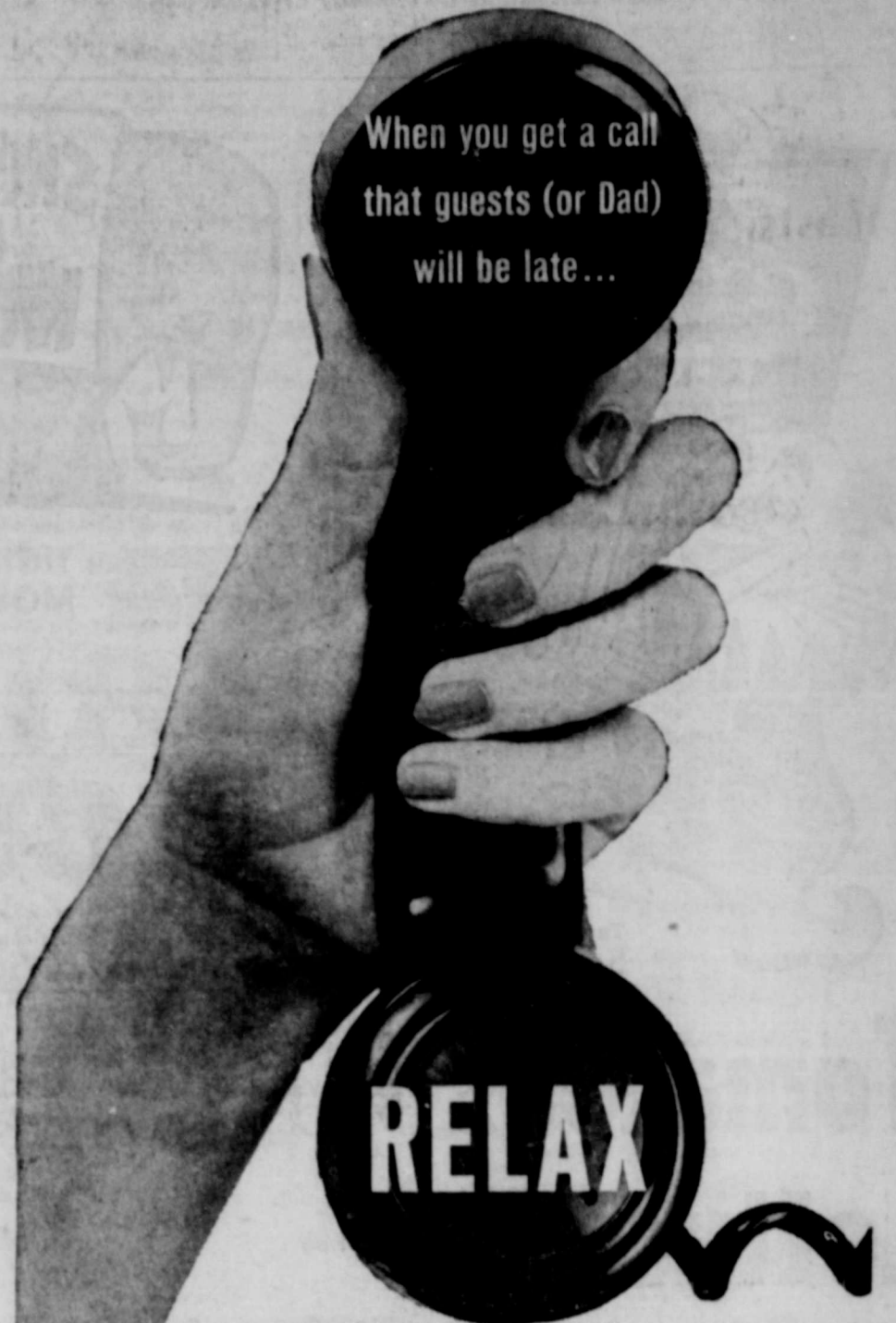

## Area Peanut Industry To Be Televised Sat., Nov. 4

The Southwest peanut industry will be given a considerable boost on November 4, at 1:30 p.m. during the Farm Review, narrated by A. B. Jolly, Farm Director, KRLD-TV, Dallas.

Recently Jolly brought his television crew to the Gorman area, where he filmed the various operations in getting farmers stock peanuts from the producer to the end-user. He first filmed the digging, shaking, windrowing, and combining operation on Lee D. B. Warren farm near Gorman. At the same farm he viewed the demonstration plot of the Starr variety recently introduced at the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station, Stephenville.

Next, Jolly interviewed Ross Wilson, Manager, South Western Peanut Growers Association relative to the functions performed by the Association in the marketing of farmers stock peanuts over the Southwest. R. C. Ashworth, Supervising Inspector, Tex-

as Federal State Inspection Service, then demonstrated the grading process used to determine the quality of all farmers stock peanuts.

Films were made of peanuts being received by the Gorman Peanut Company. Documentation was made of the drying and cleaning equipment and operation as well as bulk storage facilities, the shelling operation, and the "electric eye" automatic pickers. Cold storage facilities were also visited.

Films of this coverage will be a part of Jolly's regular Saturday program on November 4, beginning at 1:30 p.m. on Channel 4 TV, Station KRLD in Dallas. J. M. Cooper, County Agent, Eastland, who coordinated the entire operation and Ross Wilson, Manager, Southwestern Peanut Growers Association will be interviewed on this program and will receive points of interest during the film. All those interested in peanuts are urged to watch this program.

## Eastside Church of Christ

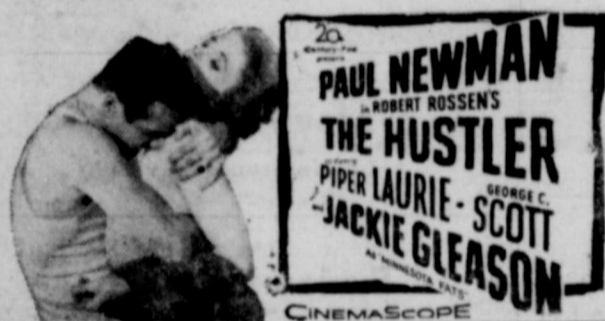
