Dr. Richardson is the author of "The Comanche Barrier to the South Plains Settlement," "The Greater Southwest" (with Dr. Carl Coke Rister), "Texas: The Lone Star State," and "Adventuring With a Purpose."

Pecan Growers Urged To Enter Eastland County Show Dec. 8-9

Plans are rapidly being completed for the ninth annual Eastland County Pecan Show to be held at Ranger Dec. 8-9. It was reported today by "Hank" Sims, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

The pecan organization and the Ranger Chamber of Commerce are jointly sponsoring the annual affair, which will be held in the Joseph building on Main street, according to R. V. Galloway, manager of the Chamber. A quart of pecans constitute an entry and they may be either of the supershell variety or native seedlings. There is no charge for entering the show, anyone from Eastland or adjoining counties is eligible to show, according to Sims. Ribbons will be awarded the winners. No cash prizes are to be paid. Top cash pieces of each variety will be sent to Texas A & M College to be entered in the State Pecan Show. These

will not be returned. Others will be returned to the owners after the show, it was explained. Judges of the show will be from the horticultural department of A & M College, headed by B. G. Hancock, horticultural specialist of the Agricultural Extension Service who has helped to judge all of the previous shows of the county.

The pecan bake show will be under the direction of the County Home Demonstration Council, Mrs. C. M. McCain, Eastland, chairman. The 1947 Club at Ranger will have charge of the pecan queen contest. Mrs. J. P. Morris is president of the club. The crowning of the queen will be held on the night of Thursday, Dec. 7 in the High School auditorium. A new feature of this year's show is decorative centerpieces using pecans and other autumn flora. Cash prizes will be paid to

the winners of first, second and third places in this event, according to Sims. The National Pecan Shellers and Processors Association of Chicago, will award a trophy, to the owner of the winning grand champion supershell variety as well as the grand champion of the native seedling variety.

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TP Buys Oil Properties of Woodson Oil Co.

Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company has increased its daily oil production rate by 1,045 barrels through two acquisitions announced today by Eugene T. Adair, president, of Fort Worth.
Adair said TP had acquired the Oil Company of Fort Worth, consisting of approximately 50,000 producing properties of Woodson acres in Texas, Colorado, Louisiana and Oklahoma, and also 1,068 acres in Hockley County, Texas, from the L. G. Yarbrough Estate, Clovis, New Mexico, and W. A. Phillips of Arlington. Both transactions involved cash considerations and oil payments, amounts not disclosed.
The Woodson properties include 36,000 developed acres on which there are 91.75 wells, producing 885 barrels of oil and 2,190,000 cubic feet of gas per day about 14,900 undeveloped acres. Most of the producing property is in Throckmorton County, Texas, immediately between Texas Pacific's district headquarters at Hamlin and Ellisville.
"This location will enable us to operate these additional wells economically and efficiently," Adair said.
The Hockley County acreage, now producing 160 barrels of oil per day from 23 net wells, is also adjacent to TP properties, being north of the Company's Leveland Field. Adair said this acreage will eventually be an ideal addition to a waterfront project already started in the Leveland Field.

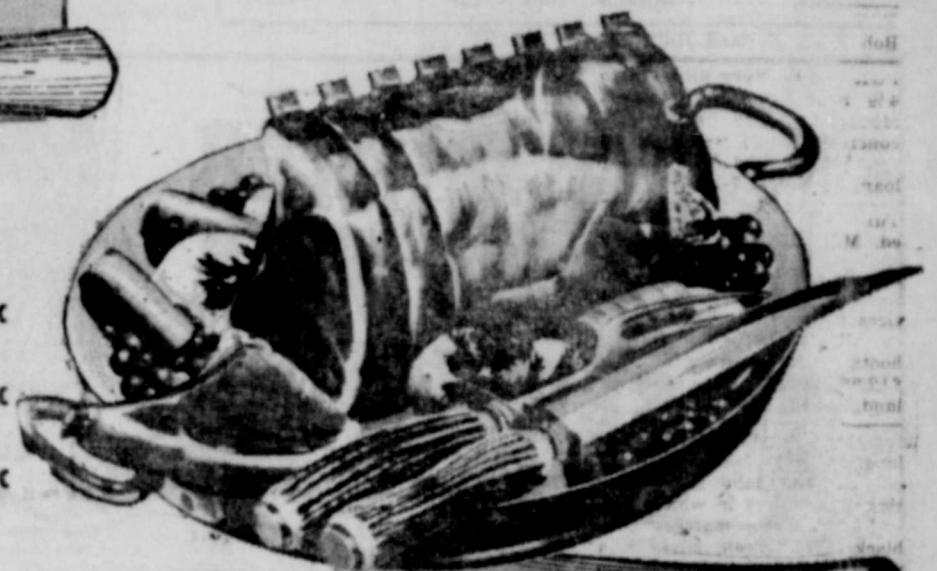

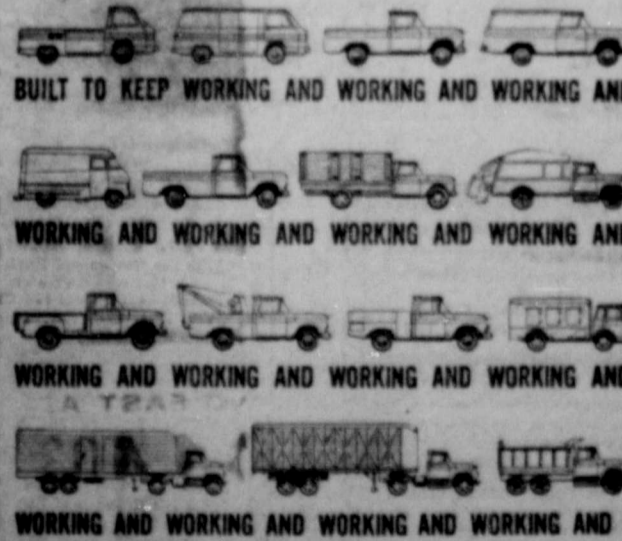

Good Demand Expected For Cattle in November

According to the Monthly Summary Texas Feedlot Report: Slaughter cattle—A generally steady market with only small price fluctuation was the situation in the Texas slaughter cattle trade during October. Demand has been good throughout the month and number of feed cattle which have reached marketing finish continues in short supply. Indications are that both a good demand and short supply of feed cattle will continue during November. This situation favors slaughter cattle price increases during the next 60 days. Feedlot operators report that supply of heavy cattle, which were a problem early in the fall, have been reduced to the point that packer buyers are making inquiries about this type cattle. The demand for light weight cattle (500-800 pound) has continued strong. A number of feeders are gearng their operations to only the production of this weight cattle. Most carcass beef was selling below \$40. At \$40 on the rail and assuming a 61% dressing percentage, packers can pay \$24.40 per CWT for the live animal. This, of course, assumes that returns from by-products will meet the packers overhead. Feeder cattle—The demand for feeder cattle for feedlot replacement continued strong during the month.

Prices were generally steady to strong with a slackening of demand late in the month as the lack of rain in wheat areas retarded wheat pasture development. A high percentage of the cattle going into Texas feedlots are on the calf order. Some increase in the number of yearlings being placed on feed was noted late in the month. Some purchases of stocker cattle for the stocking of data fields was begun during the month. Additional rain is needed for the best development of these pastures. Even if general rains come it is too late for these pastures to make the necessary growth to carry large numbers of cattle. The major movement of feeder cattle is complete and feeders will find the selection reduced. The strong demand for stocker and feeder cattle prevented the normal seasonal price decline this fall. The average price for good feeder steers 500-800 pound at Kansas City during the week ending October 21, was 1.87 per CWT below the same week in 1960.

Those who will be serving as conference leaders are: Mrs. Cook, Grand Prairie; Mrs. Reynolds and Mrs. Bianco, Fort Worth; Mrs. Waite, Dallas; Mrs. Crumbly, Grandbury; and Rev. Dempsey. A nursery will be open and workers will be on hand to care for children up through 12 years of age. Rev. Dean Bark of Cisco is Training Union Director for the Cisco Baptist Association. A special invitation is extended to all the Training Union officers of the Baptist Churches in this area to attend this important meeting.

Woolens May Be Dried With No Shrinkage Fear

After laundering, your favorite sweaters and other fine cloths may be dried without shrinking or distortion in automatic clothes dryers. Bright sun and brisk winds may be great for an outing at the beach, but they are rough on clothes hung outside to dry. Fine woolens, for example, should never be dried in the sun. Loosely knit or woven woolens may be gently dried with no tumbling action in a stationary rack which fits into some models of automatic clothes dryers. The racks are also useful for drying afghans, hand knit socks, and even the sheepest nylons. Fine woolens should be removed from the dryer while slightly moist and completely dried at room temperature.

OUTSTANDING FACTORS OUTLINED FOR YOUR BEST TURKEY BUYS

Thanksgiving and Christmas are only a few weeks away, and consumer interest in turkeys is probably greater now than at any other season.

There are three things a home-maker should consider before buying a turkey.

The first consideration should be the size of turkey to buy. This will depend largely on the number of people to be served and on the reaction of the family to leftovers. In order to give each person ser-

ved a generous portion, about three fourths of a pound of ready-to-cook turkey will be needed for each, explains the specialist.

After deciding on the size of bird, quality should be the next consideration. Best quality birds, which are designated Grade A, will have an even covering of fat over the entire body. They will also be broad-breasted with bulging thighs and large drumsticks. Turkeys with these qualities have a maximum meat to bone ratio, thus giving more edible meat per dollar spent. Birds without blemishes, such as torn skin or bruises, should be selected.

The third consideration should be the grade an inspection identification. The tags are usually found on the wings. If the bird has a tag which reads, "Inspected for Wholesomeness by USDA," it means the turkey was processed in a plant which is under the USDA inspection program. If a tag reads, "USDA Grade A," you will know the bird was given this quality rating by a USDA grader in the processing plant.

If homemakers will consider these factors before buying a turkey, they will get a bird that will make a beautiful and delicious centerpiece for Thanksgiving or Christmas tables.
