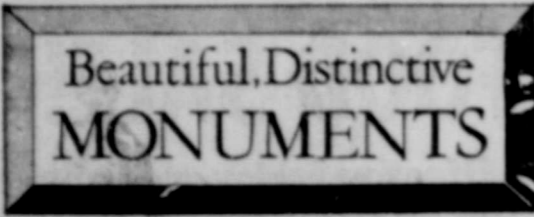

And in view of what we are told in (Gal. 1:8-9) how do you think they will appear? I have as much right to worship another God as they had to build another church, for the same chapter that teaches "one God" also teaches "one body" (church) and "one faith". Why will some accept the fact that there is "one God" and reject the fact that there is "one body" and "one faith"? We would like for you to come and study with us from the "one faith", the New Testament, that has been delivered. Bring your questions concerning these vital things with you. You will find that you are welcomed and that the scriptures only will be used to show what is from God.
