A Mother and Dad's Plea

This isn't written for sympathy. It is an earnest, desperate plea for steps to be taken by every individual in and around Ranger to have automatic arms or barriers placed on the main railroad crossing in Ranger.

When we received word our son was killed at the *crossing we asked the timeless old question, "Why was he taken from us? The minister at the hospital said, "It was the element of time that took his life.

We were broken hearted and beaten by our loss, The will to go on was feeble. We had to search for faith and courage to find away to live a normal life again. Thank God for the daughter and son left, we love them individually just as we did Tommy. Their place in our world made us go on to try to find happiness again,

Do you know what it is like to stand in your yard miles from a train track and listen to a train whistle and the roar of it's engine? You freeze inside, your heart aches, you wonder if the cars will stop or if the people will hear or see or perhaps have the time to get across. You wonder if their view is blocked as Tommy's was.

Do you know what it is like to cross a track practically every day and sometimes several times a day and look at a post which bears the marks of your son's car where his life's heartbeat stopped.

Do you know what it is like to not have a will to fight; but have a brother-in-law who begs and pleads that steps be taken to make the crossing safe for a bus load of children plus hundreds of individuals to cross. There's only one way-automatic arms to make people stop, or an overpass to go over-The price is so little compared to a life.

Do you know what it is like to hear a constable answer a phone and hear him say "Mrs. Townzen and her son Bob were just killed by the train."

It is only human for us not to be able to understand another's loss and heartache. Oh yes! We do take our relatives and friends loss very hard-We do try to do everything possible to help, and believe me it does help. Without that help we couldn't make it. But in time our understanding is put aside with out busy daily lives.

Let us not forget to quickly that within one year, eleven months and three days, three lives were taken at the same place. Let us not be angry for a short time 'that something was not done before this second accident, within so short a time. Other lives before this were taken. We hope no other home will be left with such heartaches and an empty place that no one can fill such as our home and the other homes affected. 


