## Jack Duvall Named Ranger High School Football Coach

The athletic committee of the Ranger Independent School District School Board, announced today that Jack Duvall of Weatherford, has been named head football coach of Ranger High School.

The committee composed of Dr. W. F. Watkins, D. C. Artzbach, and Aaron Heston, met Tuesday night with Duvall and completed the final arrangements.

Duvall, 29, is a 1955 graduate of Texas Christian University. He majored in physical education. Duvall coached for the past five years, serving as head coach of the junior high teams at Lubbock and Amarillo for four years. He has been assistant football coach at Weatherford High School for the past year.

Duvall said that an assistant coach has not been selected as yet, but several applicants have been received.

He plans to come to Ranger in about two weeks to work in the physical education department in the afternoon, until school is out. He will teach in

the physical education department at Ranger High School.

Duvall is married and is a father of four children, Jim, age

6, Vicki, 5, Stacy 3 and Trisha, seven months. The family will move to Ranger as soon as school is out.

## Bank Shows Large Deposit Increase

Deposits at the Commercial State Bank in Ranger show an increase of \$240,330.22 over the same period last year.

On deposit March 26, 1962, was \$2,615,836.92. At the same time in 1961, \$2,375,506.80 was on deposit at the Ranger Bank.

Also showing an increase over last year are the total resources and liabilities. Current resources and liabilities are \$2,857,992.93. At the same bank capital, reserves, and surplus were \$2,624,463.23. This is an increase of \$226,789.25, according to the statement issued by the bank.

Loans and discounts show a slight decrease over the last year. Current loans are \$1,057,041.68, while last year the total was \$1,070,730.09.

**State Fair Premiums Announced**

Premiums totaling \$87,962 have been announced for livestock and poultry entries at the 1962 State Fair of Texas Oct. 6-21.

The total includes \$62,700 for the tenth annual Pan-American Livestock Exposition, to be held Oct. 6-14, and \$22,158 for the Ju-Lor Livestock Show Oct. 15-20. Poultry show premiums are \$2,500.

Pan-American premiums include \$31,500 for beef cattle, \$18,300 for dairy cattle, \$8,650 for swine, \$5,101 for sheep, 718 for Angora goats and a \$535 special herdsman award.

Beef breed premiums are Angus, \$7,500; Brahman, \$4,500; Charolais, \$2,000; Hereford, \$10,000; Santa Gertrudis, \$5,000; and Short-horn, \$2,500. A National Santa Gertrudis Show and Sale will be presented as a feature of the Pan-American.

For dairy cattle breeds, premiums are Ayrshire, \$1,000; Guernsey, \$4,000; Holstein, \$5,700; Jersey, \$4,700; and Milking Shorthorn, \$2,000.

Junior Livestock Show premiums include \$4,665 for the dairy show, \$3,500 for beef breeders, \$2,605 for steers, \$4,025 for market steers, \$4,679 for burros, \$1,345 for lambs and \$480 as a junior exhibit award.

## AIRLINE MILESTONE: 100 MILLION PASSENGERS

NEW YORK—American Airlines has reached an aviation milestone by becoming the first airline in the world to transport 100 million passengers.

Serving as the national symbol of the 100 millionth passenger is pioneer airman James H. (Jimmy) Doolittle. Lt. Gen. Doolittle is being honored for his numerous contributions to commercial aviation—including pioneering the vital science of "blind flying" in the late twenties and his prime role in the development of 100 octane aviation gasoline.

The famous flier, a frequent airline passenger the past three decades, this year marks the 20th anniversary of the most daring of his many military achievements—leading the spectacular air raid on Tokyo in April, 1942, when this nation's fortunes in World War II were at their lowest point.

Joining Gen. Doolittle in commemorating American's 100 millionth passenger are single passengers from each of the principal cities served by the airline in this country. They were selected to call attention to the contributions made by air travelers from their areas over the years in helping the airline be the first to reach the historic figure.

American Airlines traces its history through predecessor companies to 1926, when air mail contracts let by the government enabled the infant industry to get its start. To give some idea of the enormous growth in popularity of air travel, the predecessors of American in 1927 carried a total of 190 passengers—and the airline carries almost that number on one of its Astrojets today.

It took American more than a decade to fly its first million passengers, about 2 1/2 years more to fly its second million. Now, it transports nearly that many each month on its airlines.

American reached its 50 millionth passenger in 1955, again a first, and the coming of the jets enabled it to add another 50 million in a little more than six years.

The Texas tax on gasoline is 5c per gallon. Gasoline taxes imposed very from state to state. Deductions for gasoline taxes should, of course, be based upon the specific number of gallons purchased in Texas and other states.

However, where this computation is impossible due to inadequate records, you can often arrive at a reasonable approximation of your gasoline taxes paid by determining the number of miles you drove your car in each state, dividing this figure by the number of miles you receive per gallon, and then multiplying the number of gallons used by the tax per gallon in the various states where you used your car.

In the case of the Texas sales tax, the Internal Revenue Service has issued a schedule of what it considers a reasonable estimate of sales tax based upon your income. If you do not have specific records this schedule should be used. Otherwise, you may be called upon to substantiate your deduction.

Medical and dental expenses incurred by you and your dependents are deductible as itemized personal deductions in the year you pay your medical or dental bill.

Generally, these expenses include fees of doctors, dentists and nurses, hospital expenses, eye glasses, false teeth hearing aids, air premiums paid on hospital and medical insurance. Medicines and drugs are "medical expenses" only to the extent that they exceed 1 per cent of your adjusted gross income.

You also are entitled to deduct the cost of transportation primarily for and essential to the rendition of medical care. Medical expenses for which you receive reimbursement through hospital and medical insurance are deductible only to the extent that they exceed the amount received.

If you are under 65 years of age, your deduction for medical expenses is limited to those expenses for yourself, your wife and your dependents which exceed 3 per cent of your adjusted gross income. This limitation does not apply to expenses for yourself or your wife, if either of you are over 65. It also does not apply to medical expenses in the care of your or your wife's mother or father if the parent receiving medical care is your dependent and is over 65. A "dependent" for the purpose of the medical expense deduction is the same as in the case of exemptions, except the \$600 limitation on gross income does not apply.

The deduction for medical expenses cannot exceed \$2,500 for each exemption you claim (except the exemptions for over 65 and blindness) with an overall maximum of \$5,000 on a return and \$10,000 on a joint return. If either you or

DEDUCTIONS FOR TAXES AND MEDICAL EXPENSES

Most state and local taxes are deductible on your income tax return but Federal taxes, such as income, Social Security, estate and excise taxes are not. The taxes most commonly deducted on your return are state sales taxes, real estate taxes, personal property taxes, automobile license taxes, state gasoline taxes, driver's license fees and city income taxes.

While the ordinary real estate tax is deductible, special tax assessments which are levied against your property are not deductible if they are for improvements, such as streets, sewers or sidewalks which increase the value of your property.

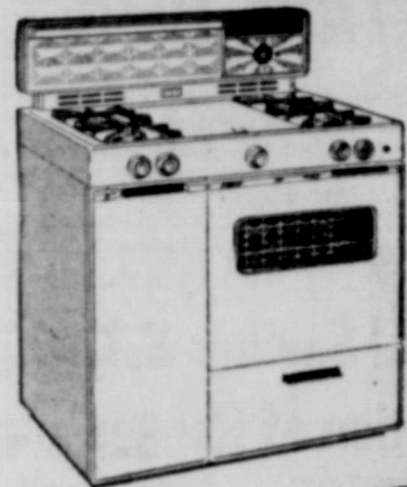

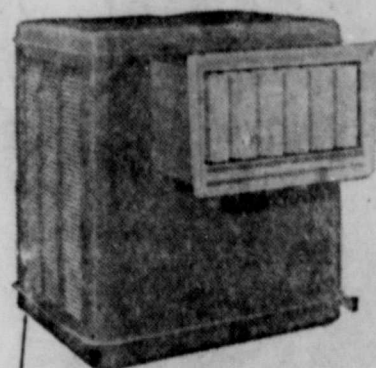

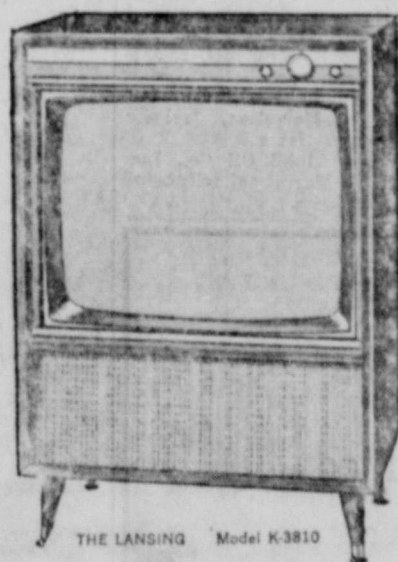

program of work. The problems arising relative to juvenile delinquency in the county are kept at a minimum because of 4-H Club and other youth activities.  
Your Commissioners' Court has never refused to help our aged people of our county or any family who was in dire need of help, medical help or hospital care since I became your County Judge.  
When I became your County Judge, the Commissioners' Court appointed a County Veterans officer for each American Legion Post in the county, to assist the Disabled War Veterans, their widows and dependents in securing Federal Aid. Last year these Veterans Officers secured \$570,429.00 for these disabled war veterans and their dependents of Eastland County.  
We have maintained sufficient money in our Road and Bridge funds to purchase Right-of-Ways on all Farm-to-Market roads, and the County's part of Right-of-Ways on State Highways being built or improved in the county. Under our present plans, we will be able to keep an ample amount of money in the Road and Bridge funds to finance all Right-of-Way costs for several years in the future. We have done this without raising your taxes.  
When I became County Judge and a member of the Commissioners' Court, the county owed \$708,190.00, which included the Court House debt of \$150,000.00. We have paid off the Court House debt and have paid off the balance of the \$4 1/2 million Road Board debt. On April 1, 1962, we have cash on hand, \$287,865.20. The total indebtedness of the county is \$97,786.09. Only five counties of the 254 counties of this state have a lower tax rate than Eastland County. So, you can see that the financial condition of Eastland County is in the best shape than for many years.
