custom, but he could not see how they had gotten through the guards. While these toughts were passing through hs mind, behold, the hole place was lighted up, and there seemed to be crowds of the dead in their grave-clothes. All seemed to be shouting and filled with ecstasy, while all around and above was the most beautiful music he had ever heard; and the whole air seemed to be full of voices praising God. At this time there seemed to be a reeling and swimming of the earth, so that he turned so sick and faint that he could not stand on his feet. He said the earth seemed to sein from under him, and his senses left him, so that he knew not what did occur. I asked him in what condition he was when he came to himself. He said he was lying on the ground with his face down, I asked him if he could not have been mistaken as to the light. Was it not that day was coming the East? He said as first he thought of that, but at a stone's cast it was exceedingly dark; and then he remembered it was too early for day. A reduction in rates certain long distance telephone calls within Texas, which will save telephone users more than \$2.5 million a year, will be put into effect May 20, Archer Marx, Jr., Manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, announced today.
In general, the rate reduction will apply to station-tostation and person-to-person ils of more than 198 miles,

Marx said, The reduced rates will apply to nearly 17 million calls year within the state. The reductions will from five to 15 cents for a

three-minute call.

Marx pointed out that the reduction does not apply to calls to other states, nor does t apply to calls of short dis-

stances within the state.
The reduced rates result from accounting changes re-cently arrived at by agreement between the Federal Communi cations Commission, the Nat-ional Association of Railroad
