Community Improvements of Lacasa Area Judged Tuesday Afternoon

Residents of the Lacasa Community, north of Ranger, met Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 p.m. in the community club house, to prepare for judging of their community in the statewide community improvement contest.

Mrs. Joe Jackson, president of the Lacasa Community Club, extended a welcome to those present and gave a brief history of the community.

Mrs. Jackson said that the first settlers came to Lacasa in 1856. In 1957 residents of the area bought a building to be used as a community club house. The first improvements to the building were made in 1959 when a new coat of paint was applied to the inside and floor covering and underpinning were added. In 1960, a new roof, kitchen cabinets and refrigerator were added to the clubhouse. New lighting was installed in 1961.

The community placed third in the statewide contest in 1961.

Projects for the community betterment this year were explained by residents of the community.

Mrs. Robert Jackson, told of the planting of shrubs, rosebushes at the Macedonia Cemetery. She said that the dog and crampoppers destroyed part of the plants, but those that survived were doing well.

Another major community project was the remodeling of the kitchen at New Hope Baptist Church. Mrs. Zelma Herrington said that a refrigerator, a stove and running water was added in addition to the remodeling of the room. Also, a landscaping program was completed on the church yard. Money was derived from last year's contest winnings for this project.

Mrs. Mary Herrington told of the new signs at Mt. Zion Cemetery. Residents of the community erected an archway over the entrance with the name of the cemetery placed on the archway.

making of textile pictures and braided rags. Rugs were made of discarded socks and strings from feed sacks. Mrs. C. B. McNabb explained this project.

Mrs. A. O. Tompkins told of the new quilts and boxes of used clothing that was made and collected in the community for use by Carla hurricane victims on the Texas Coast.

Two separate collections were made on this project. The first collection included about 35 boxes of clothing and 10 new quilts, made by women of the community. The second collection produced 13 new quilts, 17 boxes of clothing and one box of shoes plus a sizable cash donation.

Mrs. Vinson Jones, 4-H leader for the community told

of the very successful program carried out by the youth of the community. The Lacasa 4-H Club has 27 members enrolled.

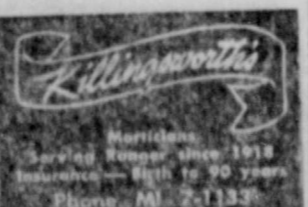
Mrs. Jackson, in summing up the year's work, said that 12 new stock tanks had been built in the community, one new orchard planted and several homes remodeled.

Further agriculture accomplishments included a broodstock program, cash contributions to the acreage evaluation program, tickle, pear control and brush control with goats and bulldozers.

After the program, the team of judges were taken on a tour of the community to view the improvements. Winners in the contest will be announced in about two weeks.

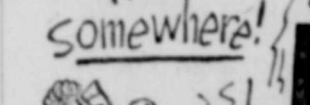

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A Story Worth Re-Telling Is The Tale of 'Ole Rip'

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an account of 'Ole Rip', written by an Eastland and Ranger Junior College journalism student. The story of the famous horned toad, whose remains now lie in state in the Eastland County Courthouse, is a story dear to the hearts of native Eastland countians, and deserving of re-telling.)

BY BOB PHILLIPS Possibly the most famous character in Eastland and Eastland County is Old Rip, the famed horned frog that rose to national prominence several years ago.

When the old Eastland courthouse was removed in 1928, a horned frog was found alive after being imprisoned in the cornerstone for thirty-one years. Someone named him Old Rip and he immediately became famous, especially after he was taken on a tour of the East. The tour proved too much for Old Rip, however, and he died of pneumonia January 28, 1929, less than a year after he was removed from the cornerstone.

A few years later, Larry McGraw, Carl Johnson, Herb Tanner, and a few other Chamber of Commerce members in Eastland put together a plan that would celebrate Old Rip, and that is when the first Horned Toad Derby began.

It was soon to be known nation-wide. Promoting and financing a derby was quite a job. The money was raised by having horned toad races as one of the main festivities of the derby. Clever letters were sent to merchants, manufacturers, and prominent people all over the United States and various other places asking if they would enter a frog in the races.

The response was better than expecting, for there were entries from everywhere. On year Edger Bergen, creator of Charlie McCarthy, entered a frog that won a share of the prize money.

The cost of entry was five dollars a toad and fifteen dollars entry fee for those who wished to enter the sweepstake race. Three hundred dollars went to the first place winner of the sweetstake race, \$200 for second place winner, and \$100 for third place winner.

The whole plan went smoothly, and Eastland had three successful derbies. The last Horned Toad Derby was held in 1950 and it proved to be the best of the three.

Over 600 toads were entered in the races. It has been said that the next year or so would be a good time to revive the derby, for it would again draw nation-wide attention to Eastland County.

Lack Of Fishing Licenses Costly

AUSTIN—This is fishing season, and too many are going fishing without buying licenses, according to arrest reports of game wardens for the month of March.

There were 94 arrests for fishing without a license during the month. In all, game wardens arrested 257 persons, and the courts assessed fines and costs amounting to \$8,889 for the month.

Although the deer hunting season has been closed since December 31, 1961, a number of arrests were made for killing deer in closed season, killing does, and hunting at night. In fact, there were 36 arrests made in connection with night hunting.

The licenses were suspended on 18 violators, and some of them paid fines amounting to \$200.

A fishing license is required of all persons between 17 and 65 who fish outside their home county or who fish with rod and reel or other winding device any place in the state. The price is \$2.15 for either resident or non-resident.

Historical Committee To Meet

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Imported Birds Loose In Texas

AUSTIN—Some 400 French redlegged partridges have been released in the prairie grass and meadows of Lamar County in recent weeks, according to W. J. Cutbirth, Jr., assistant executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

This is a European import, native to France, and the birds have been successfully transplanted to England. Brood stock was obtained from England about four years ago, through the cooperation and recommendation of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The purpose of the releases is to make a study of the exotic game bird, to determine if it is adaptable to the Texas environment, and if it will be a suitable game bird. The release site in Lamar County was selected because conditions appear to be similar to the native habitat in France and England. To date approximately 700 have been released in the study area.

The redlegged partridge is from three to four times the weight of the bobwhite quail. They are reported to eat a considerable amount of green foods, and because of their preference for more open range with a minimum of escape cover, they are not likely to compete directly with bobwhites for available food.

A check of the banded birds shows that to date they have remained within the study area. A limited number of redlegs are being raised at the Tyler game bird farm for this study, and none of them will be available for general release until such time as the study has accomplished its purpose.

Gibbens Blasts Current Tactics

"The smear campaign out of Austin, of which I had been warned, apparently is beginning here in the final days of this race," State Representative Wayne Gibbens said today as he blasted the smear campaign and tactics being waged by sources from outside this district. Gibbens is a candidate for re-election to the House from the 63rd Legislative District.

A piece of literature bearing an Austin postmark has been widely received over the district. Ministers of all denominations were apparently the main target of what Gibbens termed "the beginning of a vicious attempt to misrepresent and falsify my voting record by distributing misleading, scurrilous propaganda filled with half-truths and innuendo."

The return address on the envelope contained this piece of literature was LEGISLATIVE SERVICE, CAPITOL STATION, AUSTIN, TEXAS, and the information purports to show how Representative Gibbens voted on two issues.

The Texas Legislative Service by telegram has denied mailing any such voting records. Mr. Walter Long, head of this reputable legislative service in Austin, when contacted by telephone yesterday said, "the compiling and distributing of voting records is not a function of our service. We certainly had nothing to do with this." In answer to another question Mr. Long stated that no one is authorized to use the name of his legislative service on an envelope.

Representative Gibbens said "Apparently the professional Austin Lobbyists, who are opposed to my candidacy are attempting to hide behind the name of this responsible and respected legislative service in order to cloak this vicious and malicious propaganda with a false veil of truth."

Gibbens termed as "fraudulent" the use of the name "Legislative Service" as a return address on this envelope and has called for an investigation to ascertain if state or federal mail statutes have been violated.

District Attorney Jack Neal of Graham and Federal Postal Inspector L. H. Stephens of Fort Worth have been contacted and asked to investigate this matter. Both have indicated that they would do so.

Representative Gibbens said, "I am now getting this information together and will forward it all to the District Attorney and the postal authorities for their action if federal or state statutes have been violated."

"This propaganda makes it look as if I had voted to legalize gambling in Texas. Nothing is farther from the truth," Gibbens said. The material reproduced contains only a vote to postpone this issue and fails to accurately reflect my strong stand and votes against legalizing gambling in Texas. As is stated in the official records of the House of Representatives, I voted to postpone the measure only in order to secure more votes against the measure to insure its final defeat. This scurrilous propaganda also misrepresents the Carling Beer Bill."

In conclusion Gibbens added, "The people of this district can expect more misleading and false propaganda from outside Lobbyists who will stop at nothing in their attempt to defeat me."

It is generally felt in Ranger that if the election is called, it must be called by the County

Commissioner's Court within 30 days after the petitions are returned if found to be in order that the measure will carry by possible three to one.

The manner in which the petitions were issued calls for both on and off premise consumption of beer and wine.
