Dean Haby Attends Meet At Abilene

Ranger Junior College's chairman of the American Heritage Project, Dean Ernen Haby, was in Abilene for the October 3, 7:30 p. m. dinner meeting held in Catchings Cafeteria on the Abilene Christian College campus.

Dean Haby has been in charge of this project at RJC for the past year. He was accompanied to the meeting by Mrs. Haby, a teacher in Ranger Public Schools and by several members of the college faculty.

Leon Borden Blair was the speaker for the program. He is a native Texas; a graduate of Texas Technological College in 1940 and from Rice University in 1949, where he earned his Masters of Arts degree. He currently is finishing up his Doctor of Philosophy degree in History at the University of Texas.

Mr. Blair is now retired from the United States Navy after serving twenty years as a commissioned Naval Aviator. During that time he lived in or visited in some fifty areas of the world that are now independent nations.

County Equipment Injunction Case Given To Appeals Court

The Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals will decide if streets and alleys in Gorman will be maintained with county equipment.

Judge T. M. Collie granted a temporary injunction in 81st District Court Tuesday restraining the county commissioners from using county equipment for work on streets within the city and on private property.

Notice to appeal was immediately given by O. C. McMillan of Stephenville, attorney for Commissioner Glen Justice and the request of McMillan.

Judge Collie also increased bond on the plaintiff from \$1,000 to 2,500. McMillan asked for \$10,000.

Frank Sparks, representing J. L. Butler and Bryan L. Johnson in seeking the injunction, was instructed by Judge Collie to draw up the order of the injunction. Questioned after the hearing,

Boom Town History Is Depicted In Musical Comedy

The history of Ranger as a boom town has been revived in a musical comedy written by two Abilene men, Dr. Pete Palasota and Dr. Macon Sumerlin.

The name of the new play is "Derrick Town" and is based on the actual history of the days of oil.

Dr. Pete Palasota, script man, reports that they first got the idea for this about four years ago, when they were doing a show titled "Pecos West."

The pair spent their spare time doing research and rewriting the show.

Dr. Macon Sumerlin, a former McMurry faculty member composed the music and wrote the lyrics for this, the first of a planned series of "the era of the west" shows.

Dr. Palasota, in a telephone conversation said, "The production is actually a community project with part of the cast being from McMurry College and part of the cast from citizens of Abilene."

The plot revolves around the days of the hustling oil boom with a group of excited citizens wanting easy money, invest with a "city slicker" to make that money. After being "slickered" their money the citizens had no money left to invest with legitimate oil men.

The play will open at the McMurry College little theater auditorium, located in the administration building, Thursday through Saturday of next week.

The possibility of the show being moved here for a short run was discussed with Dr. Palasota. There is a possibility that such an arrangement can be made.

Judge Collie also specified in his decision that county equipment is not to be used on any city streets "except those designated as highways." Sparks said after the hearing that there are no such county designated streets in Gorman at this time.

The Rangers defeated the ACC "B" team here on Sept 26 by a score of 12 to 6.

Charles Ashcraft Dies Here Monday Night

He was born in Henderson County, July 13, 1885. He had taught in Texas schools for 14 years and was a retired postal clerk having worked in the Ranger Post Office for 35 years.

He married the former Miss Utile Butler in Mingus, February 22, 1920. He was preceded in death by a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Brown who died in 1949.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Miss Bernice Ashcraft of Waco, Mrs. Lillian Cozy of Waco, and Mrs. Florence Bauhman, Conroe; one brother, John D. of Tulsa, Oklahoma; two sisters Mrs. Sallie Rogers of Ranger and Mrs. Alice Sneed of Clovis, New Mexico; 10 grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at the First Methodist Church with Rev. B. L. McCord, pastor, officiating.

Interment was in the Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth's Funeral Home.

Juvenile Delinquency Is Subject Of Rotary Speaker

Atkins Wright and Bill Cragg of Breckenridge, were guest speakers at the Ranger Rotary Club Wednesday.

The gentlemen from Breckenridge gave a report on their juvenile problem, and the manner in which they have handled it.

They reported such an increase in delinquency that something had to be done.

The county judge, tiring of such talking and pleading with these boys, was prepared to take a drastic step. Out of twenty boys before him at one time, he was set to send eight of them to Gatesville and Huntsville.

A newly formed citizens council stepped in, with a request that the boys be turned over to them and their sentences probated.

The judge granted this plea with the following stipulations: 1. That the boys work for the county the remaining two months, without pay. 2. That they be off the streets by sundown each day. 3. That they have council with a minister of their choice for a minimum of one hour each week.

Mr. Wright stated that the experiments has had good success thus far with the exception of two boys.

At the beginning of the trial -- all work and no play period -- the boys involved considered themselves something of a hero. They enjoyed the attention brought on by the daily rides on the truck to and from work. This,

according to Mr. Wright, was soon reduced to reality of just plain hard work.

The two boys that failed to live up to the stipulations set forth by the judge are now in Gatesville.

Each month a group of citizens from Breckenridge go to Gatesville to visit these boys. One, a star football player for the Breck High team is working hard to continue his studies, looking forward to his return home a good to school. In most cases the boys were sent there and forgotten.

Mr. Wright also stated that they had voluntary 11 p. m. curfew which is now being observed.

In their research they found that the primary cause for the trouble was the lack of respect for authority in school as well as the law. The parents as well, according to Mr. Wright, were as much responsible as anyone else for this lack of respect.

One of the boys now in Gatesville was given a car by his father who told him that the judge did not mean every night, and for him to go out and have a good time. This bought the boy a ticket to Gatesville.

This one rare exception is only a part of the problem which plagues the country.

Breckenridge has made a big step toward correcting their problem and has extended the offer of help to other cities with the same problem.

dogs turned in a good performance averaging 56 percent on offense and 62 percent on defense.

According to Coach Duval, any team that averages that well should win the game, which we almost did.

The average percentage for winning teams is a little over 60 percent, offense and defense.

The game with Dublin was the first game of the season that the Bulldogs have been able to handle the ball without the plague of fumbles. This can perhaps be accounted for due to playing conditions and the settling of the players team performance.

Fumbles usually are caused by miscues on the part of many members of the team. Center, quarterback, backs taking handoff, and guards allowing defenders to penetrate before the play can be completed.

As someone always gets the blame for fumbles, so should those receive credit when there is none.

The Bulldogs will return home October 18 to open the class 1A conference in our district with Cross Plains.

With the rough schedule of nonconference games, and the good showing made by the Bulldogs bring the hopes for a good showing in the conference by all Bulldog fans.

'Control Wildlife' Vet Says In Eastland Rotary Speech

"The control of wildlife in the head." Veon Howard was program chairman. Guests were Kimbell and J. L. Bradley, of Cisco, and O. D. Dillingham of Abilene. Speaking for the Eastland Rotary Club, Dr. Foster pointed out that this area could easily be the site for an outbreak of rabies, and that it is important to keep lower the skunk and fox population for the safety of livestock and humans. A rabid skunk was killed about five miles north of Ranger this last spring, he said, and added that he thought the county needs to continue the employment of its professional trapper. After the completion of the talk, which included a discussion of the many "misunderstandings" about rabies and the history of vaccines, Dr. Foster was joined in his opinion about the government trapper by Sam Kimbell, a Cisco area rancher. Mr. Kimbell said that petitions are now being circulated asking a county election to discontinue the services of the trapper. "Speaking for the sheep and goat raisers who provide a large segment of this county's economy," he said, "We're asking you not to sign the petitions because we need the trapper."

A Ranger firm has already bought over \$2 million worth of wool and mohair this year, Mr. Kimbell said, and this represents no small part of our economy. And the sheep and goat raisers will sustain great losses if the predatory animals aren't controlled. They are generally sick, and possibly rabid, he said, when they go about in the daytime. ERNEN HABY IS SPEAKER FOR BI-COUNTY COUNCIL P-TA

Ernen Haby, dean registrar at Ranger Junior College, was the speaker Friday morning when the Bi-County Council of Eastland-Callahan Counties met for the opening meeting of the school year in First Methodist Church in Ranger. He was introduced by Mrs. J. D. Johnson of Ranger. Mrs. C. W. Huffman, president, presided.
Mr. Haby, who as recently as last summer attended an administrators' workshop at the University of Texas for four weeks study, spoke on the problems of the "Dropouts." This vital problem to both parents and students, as well as school officials, was researched as part of the required reading for the course.
"To the student who has ability and wants to succeed in life, an education, hard work, with a planned approach and having everything right with the Lord, is the surest way to success that I know," he said by way of introductory remarks.
The most practical example to explain the necessity for further education was cited by the speaker in telling of the military's approach. "They come as recruiters to our campus each year; wanting the boys to continue their education and then go to officer's training school. Those boys who follow this advice are our military leaders of tomorrow. Those who drop out of school will end up in the lower ranks."
Mr. Haby said that educating youth is the most important job facing America. By 1970, three million young people per year can be expected to start their working careers, as compared with two million in 1960. This is an increase of 40% over the 1950's. Of 2,000,000 June 1962 high school graduates, only 800,000 of them went to college.
He pointed out that lack of maturity was a great factor in keeping young dropouts out of industry. They need the extra years of school for this reason as well as valuable education acquired.
"Automation in industry is replacing 1,800,000 jobs per year. In highly advanced industrial countries, the largest employed group is among people who work with knowledge. These groups, the knowledge workers, are the only employes groups growing rapidly," Mr. Haby said.
Among other ideas developed by Mr. Haby were:
Teachers are the largest single employe group. These, rather than workers on the automobile assembly line, are the representative employees of an educated society.
Magazines, books, newspapers, etc., still think and speak of two classes in our society: the bosses and the workers. This is no longer so.

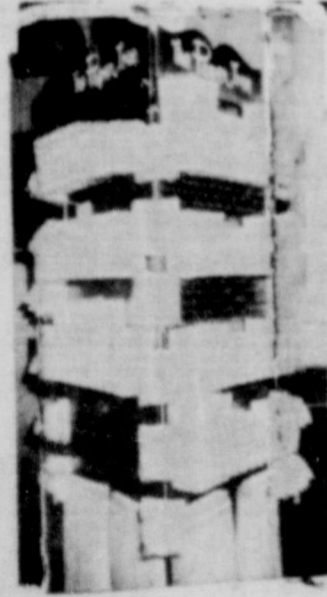

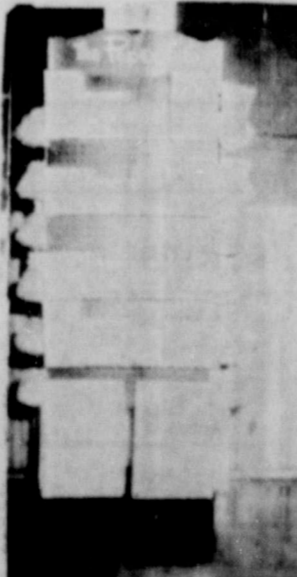
