Ranger Bulldogs Narrowly Nudge Clyde By 26 To 21

The Ranger Bulldogs kept their district hopes alive with a narrow 26 to 21 victory over Clyde Friday night at Bulldog Stadium. Both teams held identical records going into the game, with 3-3 season and 1-0 district.

Clyde scored early in the first quarter on a 63 yard burst by Ricky Dennis, the speedster that was to contribute 190 yards to Clyde's 240 total offense.

Ranger bounced back with L. H. Pound's 33 yard journey around left end and Ray Newnam's 2 point conversion, to give the home town Bulldogs a one point lead going into the second period.

Clyde opened the second quarter with Ricky Dennis blazing his own path around right end for 13 yards. Taking the kickoff on the 17, Jimmy Drennan set Ranger's second touchdown in gear with a 25 yard run back to the 42. The 57 yard drive used up a large portion of the second quarter time, with 13 plays and 4 first downs. The drive was climaxed as Johnny McGee found Jimmy Drennan in the right flat with a pass, and Drennan hugging the sideline for the final five yards of the 19 yard scoring play.

With the clock giving way, McGee hit Jesse Renteria with a pass on the Clyde 10, sending Ranger into half time nursing an uneasy one point lead.

Ranger received the second half opening kickoff and ran four plays before relinquishing possession via the fumble. Clyde ran three plays before Lee Ausburn accepted the returned favor by intercepting a pass on the 39. On second down following the interception, Clyde's George Dyer stole a McGee pass and ran it back to the 19.

From that point, they ran four plays, climaxed by Dennis' 4 yard blast for the score. A two point conversion gave them a 21 to 14 lead going into the final period.

After taking over on downs on the 50, Ranger started the fourth quarter scoring activities with Drennan carrying on the reverse for seven, off tackle for seven, off tackle for five and Newnam knifing for two.

On the identical play that worked for a previous touchdown, Pounds followed good blocking around left end for 27 yards to the 6. Newnam carried for 3 before climaxing the drive with the plunge into the end zone. The try for two failed, leaving the home team in the shadows of the score board by one point with less than seven minutes remaining in the final period.

Receiving the kick and moving for a net of minus one in three plays, Clyde punted to Renteria on the 35. Drennan took the ball on a handoff, cut to the right sideline for a journey that was to be close to a touchdown. Drennan fought his way into the end zone only to learn that he had stepped out of bounds on the 23.

Pounds carried for four to the 18 and 6 to the 12, only to have an offside penalty erase the effort, setting the Bulldogs back to the 23. Two plays for no gain set up fourth and ten from the 23. A field goal attempt set the stage for the break of the ball game as kicker Johnny Camacho was hit by an eager defender, giving the Ranger team the benefit of a Clyde 11 yard penalty, half the distance to the goal line.

From the 11, Newnam carried for four and two, with McGee getting the final four

With three minutes left to play, Clyde took the kickoff only to fumble on second down with Ranger recovering on their 41.

Six plays and a 15 yard penalty against Clyde gave Ranger first and goal to go on the nine. Rather than risk an attempt to score, the Bulldogs elected to run out the clock, holding on to a 26 to 21 victory.

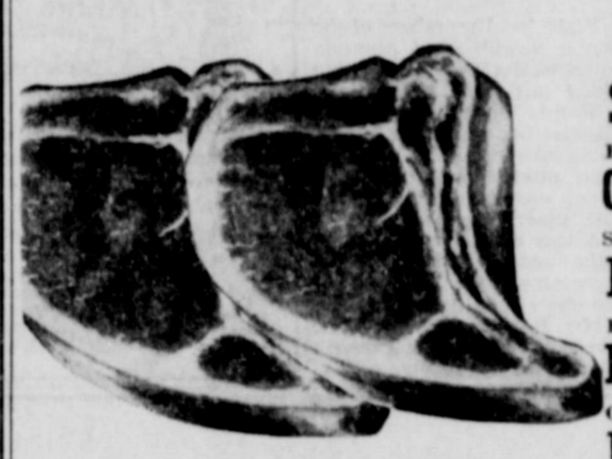

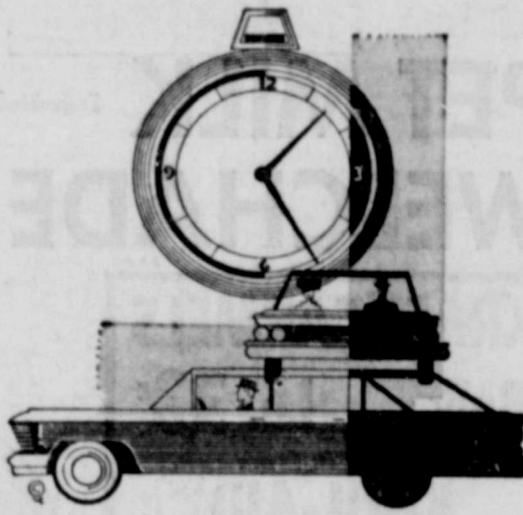

The Price Of Progress

(AN EDITORIAL)

In 1957 a series of plush highways, east-west and north-south, were conceived. The push for their reality was started from that date with the scheduled completion set for 1972. In the six years that have passed since the beginning of this project, little more than one-third of the highways have been completed.

Along the designated routes selected for the interstate highways, federal and state governments have been acquiring land parcels for the right of way. Some have been acquired through direct purchase. Those that could not be bought were condemned and forced sale was made.

In the state of Texas to date, 17,888 parcels of land have been bought for right of way. Of this total, 3,132 were acquired by condemnation. Total cost to taxpayers was \$159,087,038.

By what right does the government take such liberties against the will of the private land owner? This is commonly known as "the right of eminent domain." The government has the power to exercise this right in securing property in the "public's interest", so long as they give the owner "just compensation."

This super highway network has cost more than just the large sum of money being spent on construction and right of way. It has cost many — throughout the nation and our own state — their right to private land ownership, even their homes and businesses.

The year 1957 was one of declining economy and, although various reasons have been given to justify this construction, the prime reason could very well have been a so called "pump priming."

If it were a stimulant to the nation's economy, then the betterment of a few has been made at the expense of many.

How can the people of our own Eastland County justify this project? Can we call it a stimulant to our economy? Just ask the hundreds of business men that will be directly affected in the towns of Ranger, Eastland and Cisco. Consider the loss in local tax dollars.

The finished interstate highway system will have covered 41,000 miles of right of way. In this distance, many Rangers, Eastlands and Ciscos have been encountered. Who can show them just reasons for this project.

Call it progress; call it national security; call it anything you like. But try to really justify it.

Who will benefit most by this dream highway? The truck companies to be sure. Tourists will find it of little value as the places of attraction will not likely be served by this monstrous, monotonous ribbon.

Small towns such as ours may not be able to defeat this "progress," but we can let our thoughts be known.

And there is one freedom we have not been deprived of — the right to vote. We can still voice our sentiments through the polls.

Up For Vote . . . Trapping Seen As Important To Large Industry Of County

The government trapping program is important to the future well being of an impor-tant and growing Eastland County industry — production of wool and mohair.

That was the theme of the program Thursday night at a meeting of livestock raisers and land owners at the courthouse in Eastland. They met to discuss the Nov. 9 elec-tion in which county residents will be asked to vote on whether or not the county should contribute to the program.

Last spring, the county dis-continued paying \$135 per acre to a fund for a trapper. Under the program, the federal government and the state pay about half of the man's salary, making the trap-ping available to counties that will pay the balance.

For several years, Eastland County paid \$135 and the East-land County Trappers Associa-tion paid \$85 per month. Since the commissioners court discontinued support, the as-sociation has managed to raise enough money to keep the program alive.

The court agreed recently to put the question on the bal-lot for the regular Nov. 9 election and let people of the county express an opinion. Also on the ballot will be the proposition of whether do e deer permits will continue to be sold in large numbers at the county clerk's office. Prop-osed amendments to the constitution also will be on the ballot.

Bernard Hanna of Eastland, president of the trappers as-sociation, pointed out that one firm at Ranger has bought approximately one and a half million pounds of mohair this year. This, he added, repre-sents a big dollar volume in-dustry for all parts of the county. Goat and sheep rais-ing has been described as a big potential industry for the county.

Mr. Hanna said the cost to the county was less than one-half of one percent of tax money of the general fund.

The trappers control wolves, foxes and bobcats that prey on young livestock. They use snares, traps and cyanide bait. The trappers always have the written permission of the rancher or land owner before working on his property.
