PETITIONS CIRCULATED

Vote to Abolish County School Office Is Sought

Petitions asking the abolishment of the county school superintendent's office are being circulated in the county and workers are attempting to have the necessary number of signatures by Saturday, this newspaper learned today.

The petitions are believed to have originated anonymously and at least one, which was received by an Eastland man, was said to have been mailed from an "en route" train.

The law requires that the petitions bear the names of at least 25 percent of the qualified voters of the county, before the county judge orders an election at which the voters will decide whether or not the office will be abolished.

Rough estimates are that there are some 6,000 qualified voters in the county, indicating that 1,200 signatures would be necessary to call such an election.

Speculation existed as to whether the matter could be made a part of the May 2nd Democratic Primary ballot or, perhaps, the run-off ballot in June.

Petitions were reported in Cisco and Ranger, each with varying numbers of signers. There was no indication of a major drive by any particular group for the petitions, although several individuals reported interest in the petitions.

A vacancy in the county school superintendent's office occurred recently with the death of H. R. (Pop) Garrett, and O. L. Stamey of Cisco, formerly a supervisor in the office, was appointed by the commissioners court to serve the remainder of this year.

71 'Free' Votes Are Issued; Ballot Design Is Pending

Seventy-one more Eastland County people will be eligible to vote in national elections than in local, county and district elections.

That's the number of "free" poll tax receipts issued by the County tax assessor-collector's office, according to a report here.

Number by precincts is: Eastland, 28; Cisco, 25; Ranger, 11; Olden, 2; Gorman, 3; Carbon, 1; and Nimrod, 1.

Persons issued the free poll tax receipts will be eligible to vote in national elections but not in local races.

There appears to be some question as to what constitutes a "national" election. Some contend that the Democratic Primary in May will not be a national election even though there are national candidates involved, because a primary is for the purpose of "nominating", rather than electing.

Others feel differently, and apparently a ruling may be necessary on this.

It's possible that the May 2 Democratic Primary ballot will be made up of two parts — with the top part listing "national" races, on which the "free" tax receipt holders and regular poll tax receipt holders may vote, and the bottom half listing local races, on which only the bonified poll tax receipt holders may vote.

The drafting of the actual ballot is being postponed until the deadline for filing for county school superintendent has passed. The death of H. R. (Pop) Garrett recently resulted in the setting of the new deadline for that race. The deadline is April 8th, and absentee balloting begins five days later.

Stock Show Open Friday In Eastland

Choice animals will begin moving into the pens and stalls at the show barns north of Eastland Thursday night in preparation for the opening of the 1964 edition of the Eastland County Livestock Show beginning Friday morning.

And months of toil of grooming will pay off for the many county 4-H Club and FFA members as the annual show gets under way. It'll be a lucky day, even though its Friday the 13th, for those whose animals make it through the stiffest of competition for the coveted awards and cash money.

Almost \$1,800 will be awarded this year through classes which are believed to represent the highest quality of animals ever shown in the county show. Rigid requirements and specifications dictate that every youngster "toe up" to win honors in this show. Although a less than record number of entries is expected, the individual quality of the stock is known to be higher, even than last year, when over 600 animals were judged by the critical eye of top judges.

A new feature this year of particular interest to the spectator public is the addition of judging of breeding sheep Friday evening beginning at 7:30 p.m. The public will thus have an opportunity to see the judging of these fine animals in the comfort of the large arena where bleachers and adequate lighting has been provided. A class of Southdown breeding sheep has been added, too, and will go under the judges' eye Friday evening.

Show Supt. Robert Kincaid has announced that the show, one of the largest of its kind in the area, will be the showplace of the \$4,000,000 annual livestock industry in the county.

All animals must be properly entered and in stalls by 10 p.m. today (Thursday). Classifying, sifting and judging will start promptly at 8 a.m. Friday and is expected to be completed by 4 p.m. Saturday with the auction of the 176 fat lambs, 34 steers and 81 hogs to follow at 7 p.m. at the Eastland Livestock Auction Co. on Highway 80 east.

Among the top animals vying for ribbons and gold will be several which have already placed high in the statewide show at Houston as well as the recent show in Cisco. One of the judges, Heston McBride of Llano, will be picking winners in the fat steer division. Mr. McBride's son's steer swept the Houston show and sold for \$20,500, it is reported.

Sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, the show will be held at the association's modern facilities northeast of Eastland. The show grounds can be reached by turning north off West Main St. (at College St.), and passing the Hollywood-Vassarette Co., the Haydite Plant, and turning left

Frauds Boost Auto Insurance Costs

Criminal gangs and average citizens faking and exaggerating automobile accidents are hitting the nation's insurance companies for an estimated 350 million dollar toll a year and sending automobile insurance rates to ever-higher levels.

Charles Remsberg, writing in the February Reader's Digest, says three out of four automobile property-damage and personal-injury claims are "fainted with some aspect of fraud." That estimate is attributed to N. Morgan Woods, manager of the Claims Bureau of the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies.

Auto insurance companies have lost 50 million dollars on bodily-injury policies in the past decade while, at the same time, drivers have been hit with skyrocketing insurance premiums. The article re-

ports that between 1953 and 1963 the average rate for motor-vehicle liability soared 57 percent.

Some of the more desperate fakers, Mr. Remsberg says, deliberately inflict their own injuries. He cites this example:

"Members of a Birmingham, Ala., gang ... scraped their arms and legs raw with bricks to simulate abrasions. En route to a hospital, they cut their gums so they could spit blood; and they ate cakes of laundry soap to induce nausea and fever. In the emergency room, they would then claim they had been injured when a heavily insured car (owned by another gang member) plowed into them, generally at a bus stop."

Most insurance cheats prefer to fake injuries and utilize their acting talents to make them seem real. Most popular in the "rear-end" accident. In this, a car loaded with accident fakers pulls in front of another vehicle, then slams to a stop so that the unsuspecting driver can't avoid a collision.


But ordinary citizens often connive with shady repairmen attorneys and others in efforts to bilk insurance companies, says Remsberg.

Stoppag measures have been taken in some areas to catch and prosecute the chiselers, but no solution is likely until the public realizes the cure for this evil is its own responsibility, he says. The article "Accident Fraud Is Highway Hobby" is condensed from The Kiwanis Magazine.

State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

AUSTIN—It used to be the dogwood blooms which set off politics in Texas. But the Legislature changed that when it moved primaries to May from June.

So, Texas candidates are losing no time in getting down to roughhouse campaigning.

A look at the roster of Democratic candidates for the legislature shows 404 contestants for 150 seats in the House of Representatives, 13 of these women. And these women are among the 83 House candidates on the Republican side of the ledger.

Two of the 16 female candidates are incumbents—Miss Maul Isaacks of El Paso and Mrs. Myra Banfield of Rosenberg.

Texas also boasts a woman state senator, Mrs. Neveille Colson of Navasota. She is a veteran with 24 years' service in the House and Senate. However, Senator Colson drew a four-year term last year and is not up for re-election.

History shows that women have had scant success in state elections, one notable exception is the late Miriam A. Ferguson, governor of the state from 1925 to 1927 and from 1933 to 1935.

Whether their luck will be better in legislative races in 1964—a leap year—remains to be seen. It may be significant to note that as of January, 1964, the number of Texas women aged 21 and over was estimated to be a little more than 3,000,000, while their male counterparts were estimated to number less than 3,000,000.

Registration of voters who want to qualify for free votes in federal elections will continue through March 7. County tax collectors are issuing the free receipts which may be obtained by direct personal or mail application.

Holders of the free registrations cannot vote in state or local races, in constitutional amendment or bond elections—only for president, vice president, U. S. Senator, U. S. representative and congressman-at-large.

State attorneys emphasize, however, that the free registration receipts are good for primary elections, the November general election and any special election involving federal offices during the coming year. In other words, those who have them can vote in their party primary for senatorial election for these offices, as well as the general election.

Voters over 60 in cities of 10,000 or more population who did not get their poll tax exemptions before the January 31 deadline cannot qualify for special registration. Over-age

voters in smaller cities need no certificate of any kind.

Although the official compilation of poll tax payments and exemption certificates is not due from State Comptroller Robert Calvert until the first of April, many county tax assessor-collectors have stated they expect the number of qualified voters to exceed 1960's 2,594,000.

This prediction does not take into account registrations of those voters who cast ballots in federal races only. Registration for federal certificates seems to be going slow, but poll-tax registration also ran slow until the last week in January.

A statement by Pat O'Keefe, executive director of the State Democratic Committee, indicated that interest in voter registration seems lightest in rural areas.

Republican party officials have not hazarded a guess on the score, but are hoping to get 300,000 Texans to cast ballots on their May 2 primary. Total of 1962 GOP primary participants was 135,000.

Although the State Health Department reported an "Uninterrupted decline" in the Texas birth rate per 1,000 population between 1956 and 1962, the state's population continues to rise.

Births in 1962 totaled 244,069. New settlers moving in from other states accounted for a 200,000 increase, helping to make the population pass the 10 million mark last year. But at the same time the number of deaths for one year reached an all-time high of 81,118.

Heart disease was the leading cause of death, accounting for 33 per cent; cancer was second with 15 per cent; apoplexy, third with 12 per cent of the deaths; and accidents of all kinds, fourth with seven per cent.

Governor To Be Speaker For New Industrial Plant

MINERAL WELLS — Governor John Connally will be the main speaker at ceremonies in Mineral Wells Friday, April 10, officially opening Electra Manufacturing Company's new plant, it was announced today by Senator Tom Creighton and Sam Morrison, co-chairmen of Electra Dedication Committee of the Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce.

The affair will be open to the public, with three to five thousand people expected, according to Creighton. Expected to be present for the occasion are dignitaries of Dallas, Fort Worth, Abilene, Area Chambers of Commerce, and about fifty members of the Legislature in the North Central Texas Area.

The new plant is 25,000 square feet and will house the 225 people expected to be employed by the end of this year under the company's progressive hiring plan. Electra manufactures precision film resistors, integrated circuit boards, automotive voltage regulators and other electronic equipment. The company owns plants in Kansas and California and their newest operation in Mineral Wells is expected to manufacture resistors. Jack D. White, plant manager, has already started a training program for the nucleus of the work force for the new plant.

Auto Inspection Deadline Near

AUSTIN — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Col. Homer Garrison Jr., today reminded Texas vehicle owners that the 1964 vehicle inspection deadline will soon be upon them. He reported that some 80

percent of the allotted inspection period has elapsed and only 10 per cent of the vehicles have been inspected.

"If this trend continues, vehicle owners can expect to have to wait in line in order to get their vehicles inspected by the April 15 deadline," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas experienced its worst traffic fatality record in 1963 and vehicle defects were involved in some of these fatal accidents. He urged all Texans to begin the new year with

safe vehicles and to keep them safe throughout the year. He added that vehicles involved in traffic accidents should be re-inspected after repairs have been made.


"Some 5,000 official inspection stations over the state are waiting to inspect the four million vehicles which will have to be inspected by April 15," the DPS director said.

"There can be no extension of time, and after the deadline date of April 15, vehicles which come under the provisions of the Inspection Act which do not display the 1964 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law."
