



Crop Outlook Is **Good For Season**

Last Friday night's freeze and frost caused no serious damage to fruit crop prospects in tihs region. That was the opinion today of County Agent J. M. Cooper after a survey of the county.

The temperature dropped to as low as 29 degrees in area thermometers, and there was

This week's new cold wave, with anticipated low temperatures of around 30 degrees early Thursday morning, presented a new threat to county fruit orchards. The extent of any damage will be known in a few days, or chard men said.

Weather men expected warming temperatures be-ginning today. The new cold front arrived early Wednesday, dropping temperatures to 38 degrees. Wednesday's high was about 65 degrees with an expected low last night of near 30 degrees.

considerable ice and a fairly heavy frost in low places.

Only a small percentage of the peach trees were in bloom, Mr. Cooper said. Some trees had as much as 50 per cent of their buds in bloom, and some damage was expected to these. The outlook for a peach crop was described as excel-

Early blooming apricot, pear and plum trees probably had more damage than any other varieties of fruits.

Doss Alexander, Pioneer fruit and pecan orchard owner, agreed with Mr. Cooper. He said the mercury dropped to 30 degrees at his place, but the temperature was below Rev. Frank H. Brooks, Jr. freezing only about two hours.
