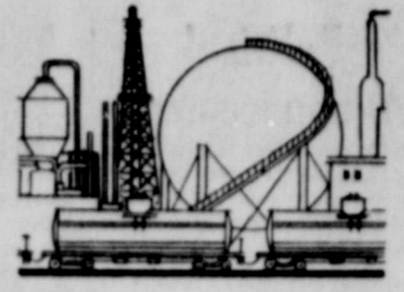

Mr. Arrington died Tuesday morning at 6 o'clock in the Western Manor Nursing and Convalescent Home, Ranger, after a lengthy illness.

He had resided in Alford for most of his life prior to moving to Ranger three years ago to make his home with his sister.

Mr. Arrington was born Dec. 29, 1877, in Boone County, Ark., and was united in marriage with Miss Mabel Clara Cooper on June 12, 1904 at Alford.

In addition to his sister, Mrs. Killingsworth of Ranger, he is survived by a number of nieces and nephews.

Mr. Jackson, well known and a frequent visitor to Ranger, was a well known breeder of registered Hereford cattle and raised quarterhorses.

Born Nov. 24, 1889, in Stephens County, he married Mabel Smith in Stephens County Aug. 23, 1917.

Mr. Jackson was a member of the board of directors of Stephens Memorial Hospital and was a stockholder in the First National and Citizens National banks in Breckenridge.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Joe L. of LaCasa; one sister, Mrs. Minnie Cook of Caddo; two brothers, Ben and Willie Jackson, both of Breckenridge; and two grandchildren.

Jasper Williamson New President Little League

Major changes in administration of Ranger's Little League were announced following a meeting of adult leaders held at City Hall Saturday night.

W. T. (Dub) Eaton, who served last year as LL president and was re-elected to the position prior to the start of the current season, resigned due to the press of business.

Leon Treese, vice president and director of the major division of the local Little League organization, also resigned.

Those Over 40 Reminded Of Glaucoma Screening

Are you 40 years of age or over?

If you are, one of the wisest things you can do is have your eyes tested for glaucoma at the Free Glaucoma Screening to be held Sunday afternoon from 2 to 5:30, this Sunday (May 17) in the Eastland High School Gymnasium.

The test is simple and painless but it could be the means of saving your eyesight. The gym is located two blocks south of Main St. (Highway 80) on Aemerman St.

The test will take but a few minutes.

The glaucoma screening program is sponsored by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, Eastland, Ranger and Cisco Lions Clubs, in cooperation with the East-

land County Medical Society and local health departments.

Tests will be administered by members of the Eastland County Medical Society and Dr. James C. Whittington of Fort Worth, serving as a public service. The doctors will be assisted by local volunteer nurses.

Dr. B. B. Alexander of Eastland and Dr. Whittington will serve as medical chairmen of the project.

Mrs. Pauline Outland, Houston, executive director, Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, will be in Eastland to assist in coordinating the program.

Marcus S. O'Dell, president, Eastland Lions Club, Roy Benton, president, Cisco Lions Club, and David Allsup, president of Ranger Lions Club, urge all citizens of this area,

who are 40 years of age or older, to take advantage of the free glaucoma test.

"Often victims of glaucoma are not aware that a serious eye disease is slowly robbing them of their ability to see, as the disease can rob you of sight without warning and most often without pain," Mr. O'Dell said. Sight destroyed by glaucoma cannot be restored, but if detected early enough, treatment can prevent further loss of sight.

It is hoped that area residents will come out and bring their neighbors to take the simple test which can detect symptoms indicating the possibility of glaucoma, the disease that strikes an estimated one out of every 50 persons in the over-40 age bracket," he said.

At Sea Leaving Tahiti

March 31, 1964

At 6 this morning we sailed from Papeete, leaving the beautiful island of Tahiti after our three day visit. Things that I shall always remember are the steep sided tree covered mountains that rise abruptly from the sea, the white clouds that play hide and seek around the mountain peaks, the ever changing colors of the water, sometimes green and other times blue or purple, the bright colored flowers and tall graceful coconut palms that wave gently in the breeze, and especially the happy Polynesian people who radiate happiness as they live their simple lives amidst such peaceful surroundings.

Yesterday afternoon the Mormon Choir came aboard the Monterey and for nearly an hour we were entertained with singing and dancing. Up to that time I had never thought much of native dancing, either in the West Indies or the South Pacific but yesterday's performance was a really beautiful. All ages performed, from children five years old to grandmothers and grandfathers. I believe that the children here are born with loose hips and a fine sense of rhythm.

On the dock of Papeete there were a dozen or more temporary booths set up for the sale of native products, shells, carved wood, beads and straw things. Prices, I noticed, were quite high when the tourists first went ashore, but two or three days later as it neared the time for the ship to sail prices were lowered considerably.

Ashore we bought postcard reproductions or paintings by Gauguin, and a few carved shells.

We also witnessed an exciting bicycle race in which there must have been about fifteen contestants. The course was around several blocks in the business section of Papeete, and the local traffic police were busy keeping the streets clear for the race. I heard that the race required thirty trips around the course. There must be thousands of bicycles on the island, many with small motor attached.

As we become more acquainted with fellow passengers I am impressed with the interesting people aboard. For example, the biologist who identified the bird that came aboard in mid-ocean is going to Australia to perform a somewhat unusual service for the Australian government. Now that Australian sheep men have solved the rabbit

problem and have the kangaroos pretty much under control there is another serious situation that needs correcting. Eagles prey on young lambs and are increasing in numbers as more and more sheep are being raised. This biologist and his wife are going to try to eliminate some of the eagles. We have met a good number of rich widows, retired bankers and business men and a colorful contractor who has constructed great projects throughout the world. We admire the couple who went with us to the island of Moorea on Saturday. The husband, who served on a destroyer in World War I, is blind. Tonight we will play bridge with the couple using Braille playing cards.

I neglected to mention that a few days ago, when we were a long way from land, a woman passenger asked the ship purser if the crew slept on board the ship. A few minutes later while Emily and I were in the ship's elevator I asked one of the ship's colored stewards, a fine genial fellow, what he thought of a question like that. He thought a minute and said, "That is expectable", which I thought answered nicely.

While in port the swimming pool was thoroughly cleaned and a net spread over it. This morning after we were well away from shore where the water is clean, the deck steward turned on the water and eight streams flowed for over an hour to fill it. While at sea it is constantly replenished with fresh sea water.

Breakfast is now served in both the main dining room and in the Pool Terrace on the promenade deck. This morning I noticed something new. The Heinz people now have tomato ketchup put up in individual packages of plastic sacks about one and a half inches wide and four inches long. Each sack contains about two teaspoonful of ketchup. To use it you tear off one end and squeeze out the contents. Very nice. Attention White Elephant!

We have left the Society Islands and our next stop will be at Rarotonga in the Cook Island group. The Wells Fargo Bank is selling stamps to be used on letters mailed tomorrow from Rarotonga.

This is being written on one of three new Royal typewriters that the Royal people have put aboard this ship for use by passengers, with no fee. It is good advertising, and probably will be appreciated by the editor of the Eastland Telegram. Surface mail sent from Rarotonga will have a fine ride on this ship all the way to San Francisco before boarding a train.



Doctors Offer Suggestions On Working In Yard

With the return of warm days, millions of home gardeners once again are getting out to spade beds, plant seed, spread fertilizer, mow grass and the other countless minor tasks attendant to keeping the lawn neat and attractive.

Your doctor recommends gardening as excellent therapy, for both body and mind. For those who enjoy digging good exercise, fresh air and sunshine after a winter of being cooped up indoors.

Your doctor also offers a few suggestions on keeping gardening fun and safe:

Take it easy, at least for the first few sessions. Don't try to work a 10-hour day at hard manual labor on the first warm weekend. Take frequent rest breaks and work at a pace that isn't too tiring. As the season advances, your muscles will limber up and you will be able to go more with less discomfort.

Cuts, scratches and bruises are the fate of most gardeners. Usually they aren't serious. Clean minor cuts with warm water and soap and cover with a light bandage. Tetanus lurks in the soil, and a booster shot of tetanus toxoid is recommended at the onset of the gardening season for all who have not kept their immunization up-to-date.

Stop and think, briefly, about safety before handling garden tools — especially power tools such as lawn mowers. Power tools are great labor-saving devices, properly used. Used carelessly, they can slash off fingers and toes. Always turn off the mower when it is left unattended, even briefly. Always turn it off when adding gasoline to the tank. If the motor is electric, don't use the machine in wet grass. Power tools usually are accompanied by safety instructions. Read them carefully.

Modern gardening is made plants. Careless use and storage of pesticides can cause serious accidents. A cardinal rule is to read the instructions on the package carefully and obey their safety warnings. Pesticides are safe, if used properly and kept away from children.

Poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac also sprout up in the spring, to the great discomfort of many amateur gardeners. Look for the three-leaf sprigs that mark poison ivy and poison oak. If in doubt, consult a botany handbook or garden encyclopedia. If you find poison ivy in your yard, dig it out — roots and all — being careful not to touch. If you burn poison ivy avoid the smoke. The poisonous oils vaporize in the smoke and thus expose your whole body, eyes included. If you get a poison ivy rash, your doctor can suggest soothing medications to ease the itching and discomfort while healing progresses.

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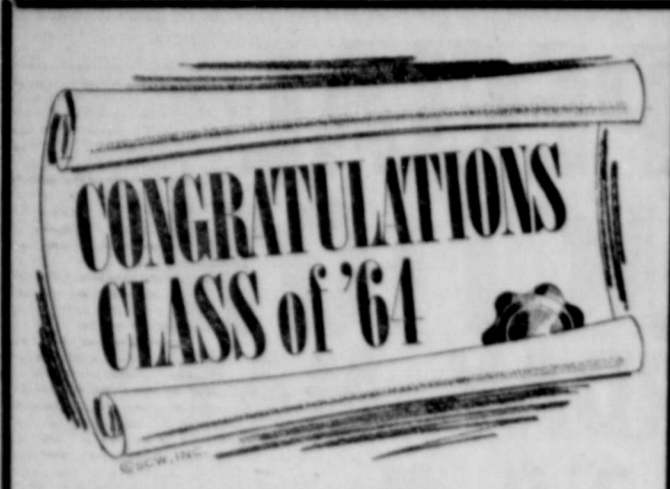

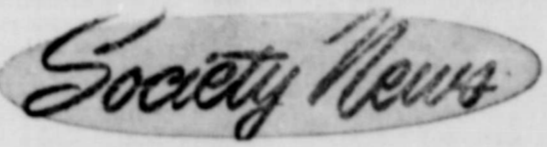

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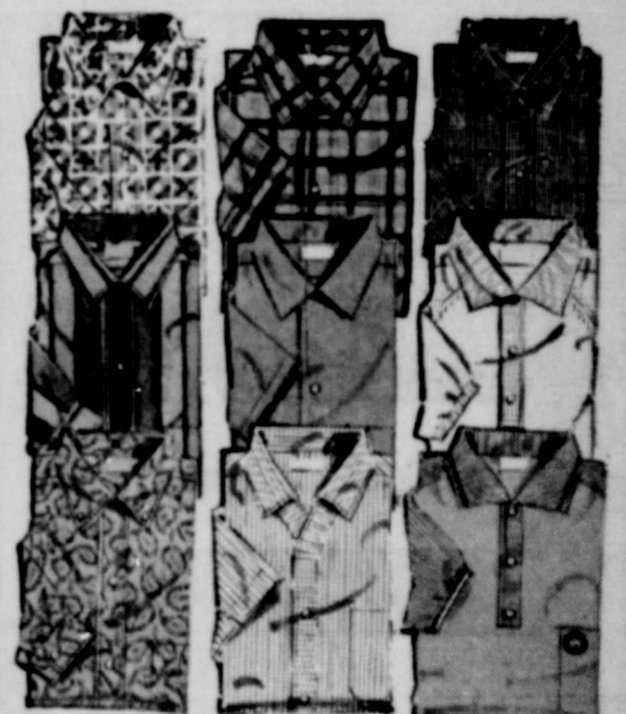
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J. T. Eggen Dies; Rites Held Monday

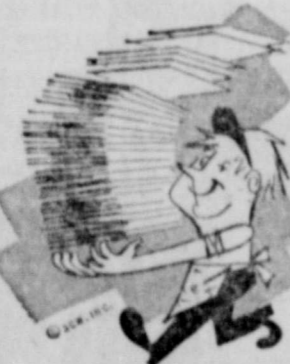

Eastland Woman Has Patent On Remarkable Infant Chair

A very talented lady in Eastland is Mrs. Mattie B. (Martha) Hubbard of Eastland and some youngsters are going to be "sitting pretty" because of her.

Mrs. Hubbard received a 17-year patent March 31st on an "Infants Seat and Bed" which she has designed. She started work on her invention on December 15, 1900, and completed it on May 5, 1961.

The Infants Seat and Bed is designed to give the baby all of the comforts and conveniences of home. Mrs. Hubbard said that she conceived

the idea for the chair when she thought of all the things that must be taken along when you travel with an infant.

The framework of the seat and bed is of wire and it is lined with plastic covered cushions. It will fold down and make a bed; it has a safety belt and may be used as a car seat for baby; storage compartment underneath can be used to put a plastic bath tub which will hold bottles, diapers, linens for the bed and other supplies; the removable foot rest may be placed across the arms to form a high chair for baby; the extension rack that makes the bed may be taken off to make a carrier for baby; and the chair may be used as a training chair.

Mrs. Hubbard states that the seat and bed is now ready for purchasers or manufacturers.

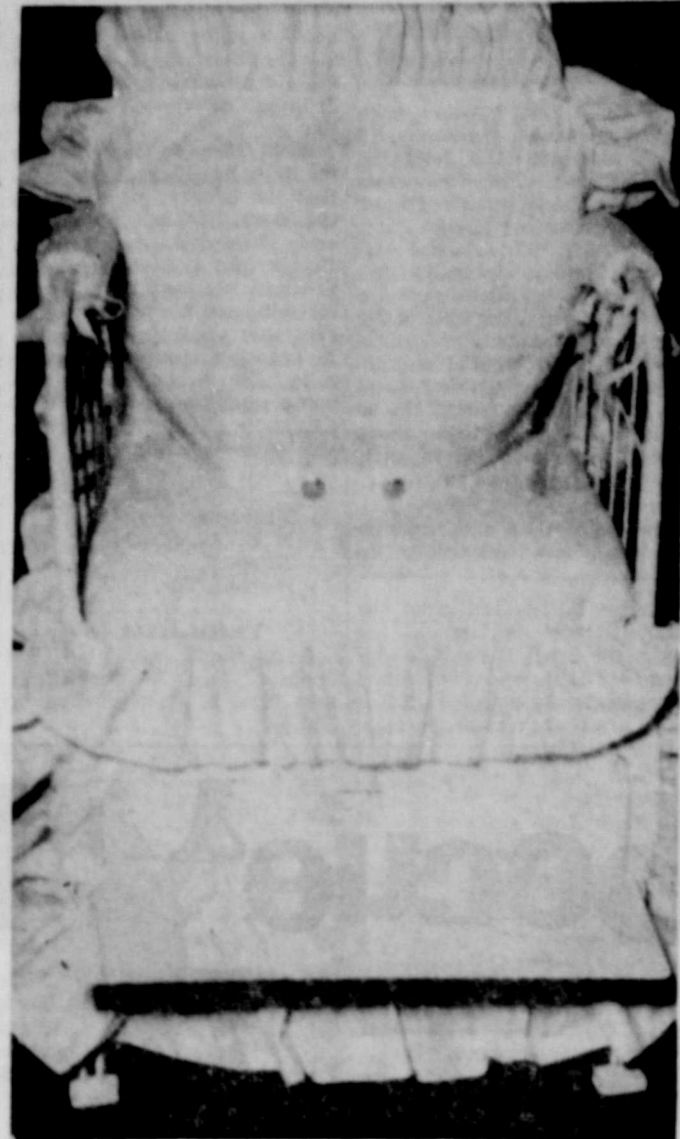
Aside from the invention which she has designed, Mrs. Hubbard is very talented with making things from copper coated wire.

She has a number of lamps, centerpieces, buffet sets, and candy and nut dishes which she has constructed from the wire. Mrs. Hubbard said "I do these things with the wire as a hobby. When you work for 12 to 14 hours a day, 7 days a week like I do in the store, you have to have some thing else to think about and I find that the wire, I can lay it down without having to worry about losing count of my stitches or having my hands entangled in thread as I would if I did needlework, whenever I have to stop to wait on my customers."

Mrs. Hubbard has recently completed a small patio in her back yard using old black and white license plates to form a checkerboard for the covering of the roof. She stated that she had been saving the old license plates, with the help of her friends, for the past two years. She said, "I always thought that old license plates should be put to some use."

Mrs. Hubbard has owned and operated Martha's Grocery, on N. Daugherty since 1944. She sold the establishment this week to Mr. and Mrs. L. T. Rushing of Wichita Falls. They will take over the management of the store in the next week or so, according to Mrs. Hubbard.
