13 precincts (including absentee) who worked 799 hours, counting the total 3,915, for the \$869 total. And averaged across the county, cost per vote for counting was some 22 cents.

Election workers Saturday night during the returns observed once again that "absentees tell the tale" or "as goes the absentee vote, goes the election." Take the sheriff's race for example: Sublett got 63 absentee votes, Williams, 37. Add them together and you get an even 100 votes, and that makes the percentage easy to figure — Sublett got 63 per cent of the absentee and Williams, 37 per cent. And when the returns were in from all boxes, that same percentage ratio was reflected. Elections are interesting, aren't they?
