

Bulldogs Gun For Second 10-A Win Here Friday Against Invading Clyde

Coach Gerald Cumpton's Ranger High Bulldogs, fired up after their 46-26 District 10-A conference win over Baird last week, are hoping to make it two straight at Bulldog Stadium when they host the Clyde High Bulldogs Friday night.

Opening kickoff of the 10-A tilt is set for 7:30 p. m. and a capacity crowd is expected to be on hand for the contest.

It will be Clyde's first conference battle of the season. They have a season record of three wins and one loss — identical with Ranger. In their last outing the CHS Bulldogs whipped 7-AA Cisco Lobos, 14-12 — same margin of vic-

tory the Rangerites defeated the same 7-AA foe in their opening duel of the 1965 campaign. The score in that one was Ranger 15, Cisco 13.

After last week's opening action Albany, DeLeon and Ranger are atop the District 10-A heap with perfect single victory records. Baird, Cross Plains and Eastland suffered losses. Clyde is untested.

Ranger will outweigh Clyde Friday night. Otherwise, they're about even in other departments.

averaging five yards per carry.

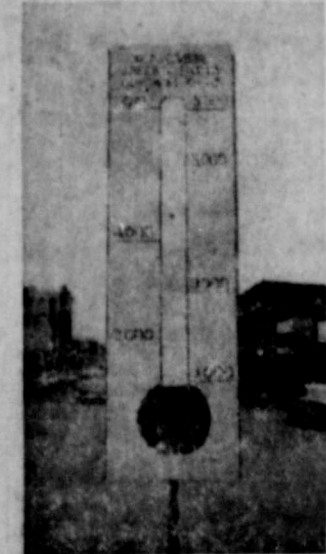
The Pioneers scored their TDs in the last half — one on a series of plays shortly after the opening kickoff after the halftime intermission and the other late in the final quarter.

ing and his ability are admired by his squad members. "The guy is great," said one senior squadman enthusiastically. "I sure believe he can help us really go places."

Cumpton, who is married and has one son, was hired to his first head coaching job last spring after Jack Duvall resigned the high school mentorship to become athletic director and head football coach at Ranger Junior College.

At Olney, where he was an assistant, OHS had a record of six wins and four losses. The big, quiet fellow — and mighty modest, too — began paying football in the seventh grade at Graham.

During his high school career as a center for the Graham High School, he made all-district, all-area, honorable mention for all-state, and was named one of the top ten line-men of North Central Texas.

Then he went on to TCU where he lettered one year as a freshman and two years in the varsity. In 1959 he played with the Horned Frogs against the Air Force in the Cotton Bowl and a year later saw action in the Blue Bonnet Bowl against Clemson.

He then was drafted by the Chicago Cardinals in the National Football League. "But I wanted to coach," he explained, "so I got started at Mexia." After a year there he went to Olney where he was first assistant mentor for four years prior to coming to Ranger a few months ago.

Five years after his debut in the coaching profession, Coach Gerald Cumpton, in his first year as a top high school grid boss in a tough Double A circuit, may pull some surprises.

And so may his battling Bulldogs!

dirt. The kick for the point was good and the Pioneers went out front 7-0.

In the dying minutes of the contest, Kandy Jones capped a Wharton drive from the RJC one-yard line. Another point was added with a perfect kick from placement to wind up Wharton's 14-point total for the night.

Biggest threat of the Rangers came in the first half when they were stopped on the six-inch line.

The big effort was triggered with a 32-yard aerial from Quarterback Jarrell Kelly to End Roger Edge which put the Purple & Whites on the Wharton 2-yard line with a first down and goal to go. Kelly handed off to Fullback Johnny Sarabia for a hard-earned yard. On a repeat, the fullback was nailed at the line of scrimmage, then on third down Kelly — on a keeper — dove through to the six-inch mark.

A Ranger fumble was recovered by the alert Wharton defense and that chilled the Rangers' big scoring opportunity of the night.

With time running out in the final period, the Purple & White offense began to move and rolled 43 yards. But the drive died when Wharton's Amick intercepted a Ranger pass.

Joe Fitzgerald, who handles the RJC kicking chores, also sparkled. His punting average was 42.5 yards per boot.

TWO PEANUT TOURS PLANNED NEXT WEEK

Two peanut tours in Eastland County have been scheduled for next Monday and Tuesday afternoons in the Gorman and Rising Star areas, according to an announcement released here.

Annual Hereford Tour Is Planned For October 14

The annual fall tour of the Eastland County Hereford Breeders Association will be held on October 14th with stop at six different ranches in the southeast part of the county.

The first stop will be at the J. H. Tidwell ranch, northeast of Desdemona. Other places to be visited in that area include the Ed Harrison and the Opal Fuqua ranches.

The Keith Whit, the Ross Wilson and the Dr. D. V. Rodgers herds in the Gorman area will complete the tour stops.

A similar tour was held in that part of the county last fall. A tour to see registered Hereford cattle in the north part of the county was held last spring and another one somewhere in the county next spring is anticipated also.

The group will assemble and leave from the Brown Jug Cafe in Gorman, on Highway 6, promptly at 9 a.m. on the above date.

Anyone interested in seeing good breeding animals of the Hereford breed are cordially invited and urged to attend. Both men and women are welcome for the tour.

The Gorman area tour scheduled to leave from the Brown Jug Cafe, in that city, on Monday at 1 p.m. will have four irrigated farms on the itinerary for the afternoon. Crops will be inspected on the Charley Underwood, Jr. Jackson, Norman Park and Wayne Eaves places.

Five farms are on the agenda for the Tuesday afternoon tour in the Rising Star peanut belt with stops at the Ben Cook, Pat Shirley, J. R. Reitor, Jr., Cowan Hutton and Ed Schaefer places. Two of the have dryland crops with three of them having received irrigation during the growing season. The tour will leave from the Elite Cafe in that city at 1 p.m.

Use of dusting sulphur to control leaf spot fungus, results from using pre-emergence herbicide to control weeds and grass in the drill as well as other practices are to be observed, it was said.

B. C. Langley, Stephenville, agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and developer of the Starr variety of peanuts, will be in attendance on both tours.

Harvest of the 32,000 acre crop is expected to get underway in the next two or three weeks depending upon the weather.
