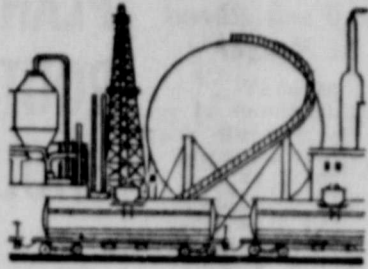

Poll taxes paid by Jan. 31 entitle the payer voting privileges from Feb. 1, 1966 through Jan. 31, 1967.

Jack Allen Is Appointed City Water Commissioner

Jack Allen was appointed to serve as water commissioner by the Ranger City Commission during the body's regular meeting at City Hall Thursday night.

Allen will fill the unexpired term of his father, the late Bob Allen, who passed away several weeks ago. The elder Allen was elected to the office in the city election last spring.

Mayor Morris L. Newnham presided during the Thursday night session. Only other business transacted was approval of routine bills.

Allen, a native of Ranger and graduate of Ranger High School and Ranger Junior College, is business manager of the college. He has held that position for three years and also teaches economics.

The new water commissioner also attended Texas Western, El Paso, and is a graduate of Sam Houston State College, Huntsville.

In addition to serving as business manager of Ranger Junior College, Allen also is coach of the Rangers' baseball team. He took over 4-h-h diamond coaching assignment last year.

Allen Murder Trial Gets Underway Monday

Chances for an early jury selection in the Ivan J. Allen murder trial which gets underway Monday in 91st District Court is considered slight.

Approximately 25 persons have already been excused from the 150-name special venire list, Presiding Judge J. Frank Sparks reports, and it was expected that several others would ask to be excused before Monday morning.

District Attorney Perry T. Brown has filed a notice of qualifying jurors, which will further reduce the number of prospects, it is reported. (The death penalty provision automatically permits both defense and prosecution to increase their number of challenges from ten to 15.)

Mr. Allen, 70, is under grand jury indictment for murder with malice in the Nov. 7 slaying of his nephew, Dr. Albert F. Reidel Jr., 37, on the Allen ranch south of Ranger.

Shirley Sue Harvick, 30, who is also under indictment for murder with malice in the Nov. 14 fatal shooting of her husband, was originally scheduled to go on trial Monday, Jan. 24, but the trial has been postponed until Feb. 21, it is reported, indicating that another special venire list will be necessary.

Eastland Attorney's Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. and Bill B. Hart have reported that they are ready to go to trial. They represent Mr. Allen. Mrs. Harvick is represented by Eastland Attorney Earl Conner Jr.

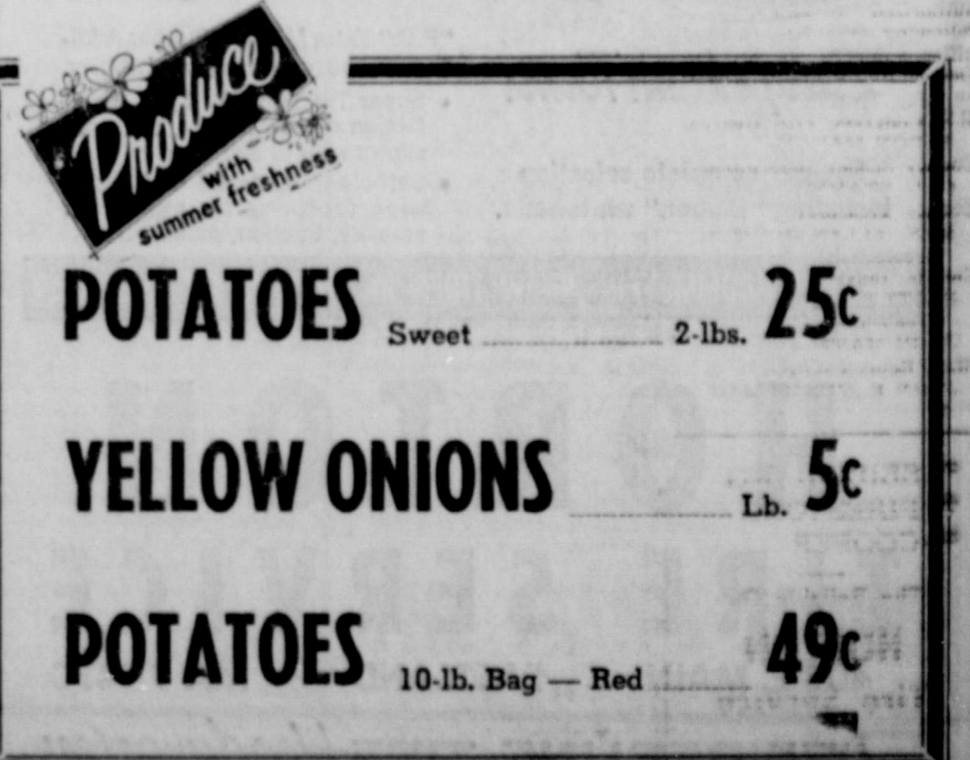

No Poll Tax Means No Influence On Decision

(Reprinted from the January issue of THE TEXAS OUTLOOK, official publication of the Texas State Teachers Association.)

NEITHER the law man nor the bad man of the early West felt safe without his gun. Even with his "shooting iron," he could not fight with his gun hand tied behind him.

Citizens are in a similar position if they don't qualify to vote in 1966—or any year. Times have changed. We've substituted ballots for bullets. The vote is our weapon. But unless a citizen uses his vote, he is in the position either of being without a gun or of tying his gun hand behind him, or both.

In our form of government, a citizen who doesn't vote is almost helpless to fight for or against anything which affects him—and that includes just about everything.

Some folks don't like the poll tax. At this point, however, it is not a question of whether we like the poll tax. This is simply the only avenue to the voting booth in all except federal elections.

Congress has instructed the U. S. Department of Justice to file lawsuits against Texas and other states which have the poll tax, in an attempt to abolish it as a qualification for voting. Whether they succeed is problematical. But the three federal judges trying the Texas case have made it clear that no decision will be made before January 31, the deadline for poll tax payment. They have urged Texans to go ahead and qualify to vote in the usual way for 1966.

To neglect (a) to qualify to vote, or (b) to vote, is to commit ourselves to second-class citizenship. It means that we are willing to let

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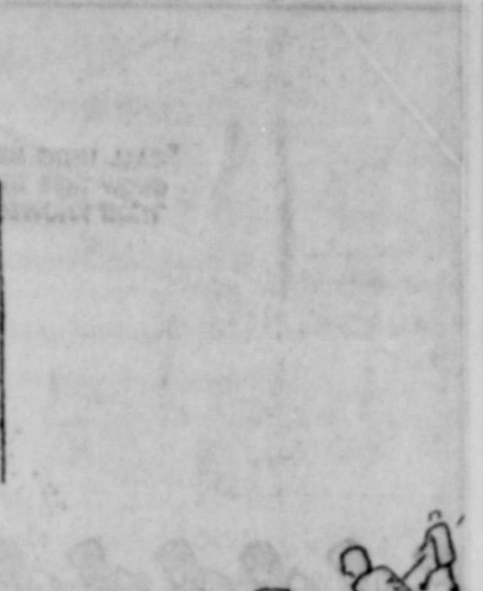

Accent on Health

Bad eyesight plagues one out of every five children in the United States.

And one child in every 25 has hearing trouble. Either of these difficulties could interfere with your child's success at school or with his social adjustment, says a new leaflet from the American Medical Association.

If you recognize the clues, defective vision is easy to spot. Your child may blink frequently, rub his eyes, squint, frown or balk at doing.

Hearing troubles, too, show up in habits. Your child may cock his head to one side, misunderstand or ignore instructions, speak to a softly or too loudly, or act inattentive and restless—all because he cannot understand the sounds around him.

If you are concerned about your child's vision or hearing, check with your family physician. After an examination, he may refer you to a physician who specializes in vision or hearing problems.

An ophthalmologist is a physician who specializes in the diagnosis and treatment of eye disease. He may use drugs, prescribe glasses and perform eye surgery. An ophthalmologist can tell when failing eyesight is related just to the lens system of the eye and when it has been caused by injury, disease or possible poisoning.

An otologist is also a medical doctor. He is trained to detect the type and extent of hearing loss and to decide if medical or surgical treatment is needed. The otologist can determine by a variety of tests whether loss of hearing is due to nerve damage or to an interference with the transmission of sound waves to the hearing organ. He may find that a child who is hard of hearing can be helped by something as simple as removing wax from the ears. In more serious conditions, hearing aid or one of several operations may be recommended by the otologist.

It is highly important to your child's growth and development to be constantly alert to signs of defective vision or hearing, and to seek medical attention promptly.

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
