Nephew of Mr. Mrs. Freeman Fatally Injured



Honors for the Ranger Gridmen and a talk by the All-Pro center, Dave Manders, of the Dallas Cowboys, were the highlights of the evening.

Tom Golemon was master of ceremonies and head Coach Claude Smith made the presentation of certificates.

Season highlights of the 12-1 record of the 1967 Bulldog football games were shown on film.

Glyn Gilliam, president of the Ranger Lions Club presented the Tommy Ford memorial award to Tom Golemon for being the "Most Outstanding Player of the Year."

Ronny Stroud was presented a certificate for "Outstanding

Squadman of the Year" by Coach Smith.

Certificates were also presented to Floyd Marks for receiving the most fumbles during the year Tom Fox, 111, most pass interceptions Ricky Squires, leading scorer, with 60 points; Ivory Mendoza, leading pass receiver with 662 yards; leading tackler, Andy Hamilton, with 166 tackles; leading passer, Tom Golemon, 1217 yards; and Ricky Squires, leading rusher with 1141 yards rushing.

Registration at Ranger College Will Be Held January 22 and 23

Receives Grant

Ranger Junior College has been awarded federal funds totaling \$57,631 to continue participation in the College Work-Study Program through June 30, 1968.

Announcement of the grant was made by Congressman Omar Burleson in a telegram from Washington.

The funds will enable an estimated 170 students to attend college and help pay their tuition and fees by performing various on-campus tasks while they are studying.

RJC President E. W. Mince said the money represents 100 percent of the total requested by the college. He noted that the \$57,631 is 85 percent of the total amount which will be available for the program at RJC. The remaining 15 percent will be provided by the college.

Registration for the spring semester at Ranger Junior College in Ranger will be held on Jan. 22 and 23, according to an announcement by RJC Registrar, Mrs. Linda Allen.

Registration on the 22nd will be by an alphabetical schedule and will run from 8:30 a. m. to 4 p. m. Students should report to the RJC Science Hall to begin registration.

On the 23rd, any student who has not registered earlier may do so by reporting to the registrar's office.

More than 200 students have already signed up for the spring semester during pre-registration which ended last Saturday. College officials predict that the enrollment figure will more than double during the regular registration period.

Students who have not attended RJC before should bring with them a transcript of their high school or college grades and be prepared to pay their fees when they come to register.

The Rangers are ranked fourth in the nation in junior college basketball.

The Sales Tax Is the Answer

(AN EDITORIAL)

No matter what method is used, there is no painless way to raise tax money. If it were possible, every citizen would prefer to pay no taxes at all. But if he paid no taxes, then he would receive virtually no government services and that would be worse than paying taxes.

Mayor Morris Newnam has made the right choice. The Times believes, in his decision to put the question of a one-percent city sales tax on the ballot.

It has been apparent for months that the city of Ranger must have a major new source of revenue in which to operate. This city is undergoing growing pains, and if more money isn't forthcoming, there will have to be cutbacks in essential city services and possibly a slowdown in the extension of city improvements.

More important, without more revenue, the critical problems of police and fire protection cannot be adequately solved.

Mayor Newnam, along with the Texas Municipal League, has consistently argued that a penny city sales tax is the most practical way to solve the financial problem of this state's growing cities.

A variety of new taxes have been proposed as an alternative, yet the only one which has received serious attention is another increase in ad valorem tax. Here we have a case of placing far too much of the tax load on the overburdened property owner.

A too high property tax not only is unfair to property owners, it is a deterrent to economic and commercial expansion.

It is true, too, that the sales tax has proved to be relatively popular around the country. It is as painless as any tax can be. Moreover, state exemptions on such essential goods as food and drugs remove a major argument against the sales tax concept.

DWI Case Is Transferred To 91st Dist. Court

A DWI suit, naming District Judge William Jackson Oxford of Stephenville, has been transferred on a change of venue from Palo Pinto County Court to Eastland County's 91st District Court.

Judge Oxford of the 29th District Court, Palo Pinto, pleaded "not guilty" in a pre-trial arraignment in Palo Pinto Jan. 11, to the July 30, 1967, driving while intoxicated charge.

Motion for the change of venue stated that a relocation for the trial would be advisable because of the "prominence and position of the defendant."

The charge resulted after a 2 a. m. one-car accident at the intersection of FM1195 and Highway 180 near Palo Pinto.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

To the duly qualified resident electors of the City of Ranger, Texas and to all other interested persons:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Ranger, Texas, on the 13th day of February, 1968, on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City of Ranger in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Commission of the City of Ranger, as follows: to-wit:

NO. — "An Ordinance ordering a Special Election to be held in the City of Ranger, Tex., on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within the City; designating the day of the Election and the polling place; appointing Election Officials; providing that all duly qualified resident electors shall be qualified to vote; prescribing form of ballot; providing for notice of election; containing other provisions relating to said election; providing for severability; and declaring an emergency."

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Annotated Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas, to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RANGER

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Ranger, Texas, on the 13th day of February, 1968, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said city, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST the adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held within the City of Ranger, at the City Hall of said city. The presiding judge shall be A. E. Crawley.

There shall be four clerks at such election, to be appointed by the presiding judge.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Ranger, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection 6, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT — INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

() FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

() AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, words, or word of this Act or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or applications, and to this end the provisions of this Act are declared to be severable.

Section 7. The fact that the rapid rise in urban population has created an urgent need for expanded municipal services, and that the City of Ranger is in dire need of additional funds to provide needed services, and that the existing taxing authority of the City of Ranger is extremely limited resulting in a very heavy tax burden on the home owners of said city; and that the cherished ideal of local self-government demands that local problems be met and solved by local action create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the charter provisions that the ordinance be read on more than one occasion be suspended, and this charter provision is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so ordained.

PASSED AND APPROVED this 8th day of January, 1968.

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Voter Registration Certificates Are Free, But You've Got To Ask for Them

Texas voters are again reminded that they must apply for a voter registration certificate by the end of this month if they want to participate in this year's elections.

Application may be made either by mail or by personal appearance at the county tax assessor-collector's office or a local registration substation.

Texas Secretary of State L. Hill, who is sponsoring a statewide voter registration drive, has predicted that this year's registrations will show a very substantial increase over former years.

The total registration in 1966 was slightly under 2,000,000, including registrations under the poll tax system and registrations during the 1966 election year.

Registration drives are being conducted in many areas of the state, and voters are urged to register now.

a supplemental registration period in March 1966 after a federal court decision invalidated poll tax payment as a condition for voting. Registrations for 1967, an "off year" for elections, normally could have been expected to drop from the previous year's total, but exceeded the 1966 figure by about thirteen thousand.

Hill attributes the expected increase in registrations to several factors. In addition to population growth, he has pointed out that this is the first presidential election year under the new system of free registration, and registrations for a presidential election year normally exceed those for any year in each four-year period.

This is also the first year in which all voters will be required to register. Another important factor, Hill said, is that this registration period marks a high in the activities of groups conducting organized registration drives.

Voters who have not already applied for registration are urged to do so immediately. Cut out the application from which all the blanks, and mail it to the county tax assessor-collector without delay.



Mayor Answers Questions On Proposed 1% City Sales Tax

Q—How much is the proposed Municipal Sales Tax?
A—A penny on a dollar's worth of certain purchases. It is a 1 per cent limited sales and use tax on certain sales and transactions which are subject to the present State Sales and Use Tax. The same exemption allowed by the State Sales Tax would also apply to the City Sales Tax. Excluded from the tax are certain essential items such as groceries, drugs, automobiles, and gasoline. All State and City sales taxes are deductible on your Federal Income Tax return.

Q—Why does Cisco need this revenue?
A—As a growing city, Cisco needs substantially increased revenue for improving and strengthening services, and to finance much needed improvements. Our entire water system is getting in a deplorable condition. An extensive leak in the main line from the Lake will require replacing the pipe under the highway and involve several thousand dollars. The city employees are in a continuous project of just repairing leaks all over town as funds are not available to replace worn out water mains. We need a street paving program in order to reduce present maintenance costs, that will exceed the cost of paving over a period of time.

Q—How much revenue would the penny tax produce each year?
A—A most conservative estimate, based on data from the State Comptroller's Office, is that this penny tax would produce in Cisco approximately \$22,500.00 a year.

Q—Can the City of Cisco increase the Sales Tax percentage?
A—NO, the 1 per cent set by the Texas law, cannot be increased and cannot be presented to the voters again for a period of two years.

Q—Do other cities have a Municipal Sales Tax?
A—YES. Over 7,000 municipalities and some 700 counties in the nation have turned to the municipal sales tax as the best and fairest answer to their money problems. Cities in our local area and in all our neighboring states have municipal sales tax. Experience with the local sales tax

Q—What is the advantage of the penny sales tax over increased property taxes?
A—The penny City Sales Tax is the fairest of all. Every one who benefits from City services helps pay for them. The tax will be paid by visitors to Cisco as well as by the people of Cisco. Whereas property taxes are paid entirely by people who live within the City. This includes renters, of course, because the level of rents necessarily reflects property taxes.

Four Charged With 'Contributing' In Eastland Missing Girls Case

Two 13-year-old Eastland girls are in Eastland County Jail awaiting Juvenile Court action and four Scranton - Rising Star area young men are charged with contributing to their delinquency.

The four men are free on bond, according to Jailor John Shook. The girls were first reported missing on Thursday, Jan. 4. They reportedly were taken to an unoccupied, but furnished house in Scranton by two 23-year-old Scranton men, where they allegedly

stayed three or four days. Later the girls were taken to Rising Star where they were left at a pool hall, and picked up by two 17-year-olds who were working in Rising Star and maintaining an apartment. The Eastland County Sheriff's Department officers spent much of last week in Rising Star on burglary cases and on a tip, learned where the girls were probably staying. A warrant was issued and County Sheriff L. E. Sublett and Deputy Loy Williams, Rising Star Police Chief Charles Thomas and Constable W. H. Kornegay went to the residence and found the girls hiding between two mattresses.





**'6c-Stamp Is Best Bargain'
Local Postmaster Reports**

"It's still one of the best bargains in the world." That's what the local postmaster said today about the six-cent stamp, and recounted some interesting facts and figures from postal history to back up the claim.

Even though the five-cent letter rate has suffered the same fate as the nickel cigar, first-class postage is cheaper today than it was in many bygone eras when a few pennies meant much more than they do today, the postmaster said.

In 1816, for instance, a single sheet letter cost six cents for delivery up to 30 miles. More sheets and more miles cost more money. A letter going 400 miles cost 25 cents per sheet.

In those days the recipient had to pay the postage, not the sender. And if the letter was actually delivered to the recipient, rather than picked up at the Post Office, there was an extra charge that was kept by the carrier.

Uniform rates regardless of distance and fee city delivery were written into the postal law books in 1863. When distance was dropped by a factor in computing rates, so was the practice of charging per sheet. The basic unit for letter postage became a half ounce in 1863. The basic unit of one ounce that still prevails today went into effect in 1885.

Turning to more recent history, the postmaster pointed out that the 100 per cent increase — from 3 to 6 cents — in first-class postal rates since 1932 compares very favorably

Lots of Chicken On Plenty Food List for Month

What's for January? Lots of chicken, says the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Broilers top the foods plentiful list this first month of 1968. Adding to the bounty are potatoes, grape juice, fresh oranges and grapefruit, dry split peas and eggs.

Although broiler - fryer supplies are not expected to equal that of this time last year, you can expect an abundance. Offerings have been running extremely high.

Potato production is also heavy — slightly above last year's crop and 16 per cent above average, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Although size of this season's orange and grapefruit crops is down from year-ago production, supplies will be plentiful all month, says USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Volume of dry split peas during 1967 ran about 11 per cent above the previous year. Smaller exports are expected to increase the available domestic supply.

January is National Egg Month. So it's a fine time to consider all the many uses for eggs — and use them! Eggs add taste and nutrition to mealtime.

November estimates on Concord grape production indicate a crop 3 per cent above last season and 7 per cent above average. Storage stocks are unusually heavy, so you will find unusually good amounts of this tasty beverage available now.

14,000 License Plates Going On Sale Feb. 1

More than 14,000 1968 Texas license plates will go on sale in Eastland County Feb. 1. Tax Assessor - Collector Edgar Azon said the number includes 9,210 passenger car licenses. Other categories are trucks, 2,700; farm trucks, 1,450; and truck trailers, 100. Trailers are divided into three groups according to weight, with 900 for trailers up to 10,000 pounds; 60 for trailers 10 to 18 thousand; and 100 for trailers 18 to 32 thousand. Some 125 motorcycle licenses complete the number.

Passenger car numbers for the county will begin with DLP350 and run through DMB649. The license plates are black with white lettering and carry the word "Hemifair" to commemorate and advertise the fair set to open April 1 in San Antonio.

During the 1967 session the Texas Legislature amended

with general increases in prices and wages.

General consumer prices have gone up about 200 per cent since 1932 and the average hourly earnings of manufacturing workers have risen by about 550 per cent.

"Back in 1947 the letter rate was still three cents and everyone agreed that was a really good deal. Since then family income has gone up about 175 per cent while the cost of mailing a letter has increased 100 per cent. If letter postage was worth three cents in the 1940s, in terms of today's dollar its worth more than six cents."

Estimates are that the increase in postal charges that went into effect Jan. 7 will add only \$2.25 a year to the \$16 the average household spent on postal services under the old rates.

Despite the great distances many letters must travel in the United States, our postal rates are lower than in most other major countries, particularly when based on ability to pay the postmaster declared. The average American worker earns the price of a six-cent stamp in 1.3 minutes. It takes the average British worker 2.5 minutes to earn letter postage, the West German worker 2.7 minutes and the French worker 5.6 minutes.

The postmaster said the higher postal rates mean that a greater share of the cost of running the Postal Service will be borne by the users of the mails rather than the taxpayer.

"The costs of running the Postal Service must be paid," it was explained. "What isn't paid by mail users in postage is paid from general tax revenues. The approximately \$900 million in additional revenue the new rates will bring in will shift that much of the burden of paying for the Postal Service from the taxpayer to the mail users."

"Certainly it's only fair that the people who use the Postal Service pay the lion's share of its operating costs."

"Actually, with the six-cent stamp we are returning to the postal rate changed when New York was called New Amsterdam and was a Dutch colony. Then the postage rate there was 'three stivers of wampum' — the equivalent of about 6 cents.

Tree Surgery Is Job for Trained Orchard 'Doctor'

Do-it-yourself tree surgery should be limited to repair work on small trees and damaged limbs near the ground.

Everett E. Janne, Texas A&M University Extension landscape horticulturist, warns that it is best to hire a trained arborist to do the job if the ice damaged tree is large or the breakage has occurred high in the branches.

Recent ice storms have broken and splintered shade trees as a result of the heavy coating of ice. This was true of many of the evergreen types, especially the Live Oak. An extremely heavy coating of ice on the dense foliage broke many of the larger branches, Janne said.

Prompt attention and proper treatment of the damaged

trees will aid materially in preventing permanent disfigurement and possible premature death. While the tree wounds are still fresh, much of the repair work can be done with a sharp pruning saw and an asphalt tree wound paint. An excellent temporary tree wound dressing, available at most nurseries and garden centers, is orange shellac. But the wound should be recast with a more permanent material within four to six weeks, he pointed out.

Janne said fledgling tree surgeons should follow these simple guidelines. The damaged branches should be removed flush with the trunk or nearest large branch. Stubs will only lead to a proliferation or sucker growth later on, always cut back to a side branch.

To prevent tearing the bark and causing additional damage to the tree in removing heavy limbs, make the first cut with the saw from the bottom side of the limb about 12 inches from the main branch. When the saw starts to bind make the second cut from above about eight inches from the main branch. After the branch splits off remove the remaining stub with a saw cut flush with and parallel to the main branch. Lastly, apply a tree wound dressing to the exposed surface to prevent the entrance of disease and insects.

Major tree surgery is dangerous work best left to the experts who have the proper equipment for the job. But, concluded Janne, a copy of B-977, "Modern Pruning Methods," available from the county Extension office, will provide detailed information on doing the pruning job.
