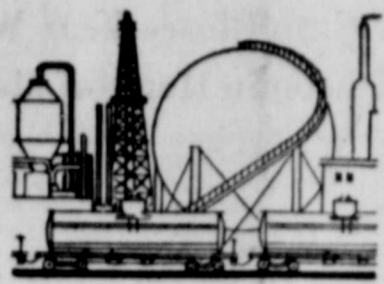

Memorial Day Services To Begin 3:00 p.m. Sunday

Residents of Ranger have been invited to attend Memorial Day services on Sunday, May 26, under the sponsorship of the Carl Barnes Post 69 of the American Legion, according to announcement by Post Commander O. M. Franklin.

The traditional rites have been scheduled to begin at 3 p. m. at the Evergreen Cemetery with County Judge Scott Bailey delivering the Memorial Day address.

The first order for the observance of Memorial Day was issued in May of 1868 by Gen. John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic "For the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in the defense of their country. . . . For many years after the Civil War the GAR in the north and the Confederate Veterans in the South took charge of Memorial Day in their respective communities.

When these founding organizations became unable to carry on actively these rites, The American Legion pledged to help perpetuate the annual observance of Memorial Day. Although it began as a day to commemorate the dead of all wars, Memorial Day has become an appropriate occasion for the decoration of graves of family and friends.

In urging the widest possible participation by Ranger residents in the Memorial Day rites, Commander Franklin re-

ferred to the following excerpt from Gen. Logan's original order: "Let not avarice or neglect, nor ravages of time, testify to the present and coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic." These words of Gen. Logan, although uttered 100 years ago, take on an even deeper meaning when applied to the quest of free men in today's world. In 1868 or 1968, they emphasize the fact that "Freedom Is Not Free!"

The safety record for Southwest Section improved during 1967. The accident-frequency rate dropped from 35.3 accidents per million man-hours worked in 1966 to 31.9 accidents per million man-hours worked during 1967. It is believed that this improvement will continue during 1968, said M. C. Binney, chairman of the Safety Committee.

Pecan Growers Plan Field Day At Cisco Friday

Eastland County Pecan Growers Association members and others interested will attend a spring Field Day program at the First National Bank in Cisco on Friday, May 24. The affair will be held at the bank's community room.

The program will feature talks and discussions on pecan orchard management and production by Tom Denman, Jerald Johnson and Dr. J. W. Worthington, all prominent in extension service experiment station and horticultural programs.

Anton White of Cisco, president of the association, and County Agent De Gordon were in charge of arrangements for the program and meeting. The meeting will start at 9:30 a. m. In the afternoon, the pecan men will meet at the Earl Walker orchard just south of Cisco to observe pecan grafting and to check on insects.

It's Spraying Time For Your Pecan Orchard

It's pecan spraying time! That's the advice of County Agent De Gordon and pecan experts who have been observing the life cycle of the pecan nut casebearer, the most destructive of all pecan insects.

Spray between May 23 and May 28 to control the casebearer, Mr. Gordon said. The small worms must be sprayed at the right time as they are hatching and will be entering the tiny pecans.

It will be necessary to spray twice to get a good control job. The second application should be made June 3-5, Mr. Gordon added.

Various chemicals are recommended, and they may be obtained at most stores dealing in supplies for the farm and ranch.

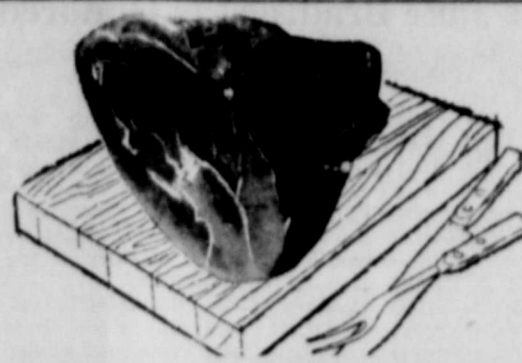

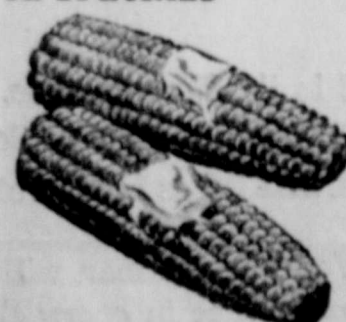


