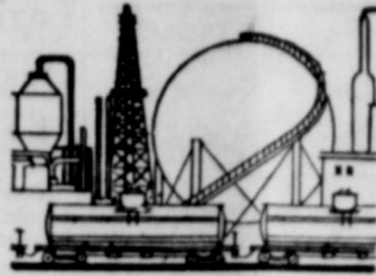

A milk substitute I picked up recently contained these ingredients, according to the label: A pasteurized blend of water, hydrogenated vegetable oil, corn syrup solids, sodium caseinate, carrageenan, sodium citrate, disodium phosphate, salt, mono and diglycerides of the fat forming acids except lauric, poly-sorbitan 60, glybitan monostearate, lecithin, artificial color and flavor.

Now consider that the lowly cow can produce milk without all that trouble simply by eating grass — and without any particular instruction in chemistry and manufacturing techniques.

Not only does she provide milk but shoe leather and a hamburger and she reproduces her species so that there will be others to take up where she leaves off.

There's nothing quite like a cow!

MR. CREIGHTON HOSTS CHORUS



AUSTIN — Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells and Fort Worth was host last Friday to the Warrant Officer Candidate Winged Soldiers Chorus of Fort Wolters Army Primary Helicopter Training School/Center at Mineral Wells. The chorus, under the direction of WC John Hamrick, sang several songs in the rotunda and later presented their program in the Senate chamber. For the second time in history, cameras were allowed in the chamber and the program was televised. The chorus was organized in September 1966 to promote good will between Fort Wolters and the surrounding area and to provide a military atmosphere at functions on Fort Wolters. Since the formation of the chorus, the group has participated in many municipal events around the state and has won several honors, including first place in the 4th United States Army Choral Contests in 1966 and 1967. The 35 to 60 members of the chorus are under the sponsorship of Major Purvis J. Parker, Commanding Officer of the 8th Warrant Officer Company School Brigade of USAPHS and CW2 Roger Alons. The accompanist is SP/4 Joe Thomas. A resolution expressing the appreciation of the Senate for the chorus's appearance was adopted.

2 Men Sought For Information In Attack Here

Two young men are being sought for information by the Eastland County Sheriff's Department and the District Attorney's office in connection with a rape which reportedly happened east of Ranger on IH 20 Wednesday evening.

Assistant DA Emory Walton and Sheriff L. E. Sublett know only that the two men were dressed in western clothing and are believed to be local residents. The two, assisted by a large man and a young woman who had car trouble, and are asked to contact the local officials to offer more information about the pair and their car.

The 30-year-old Minnesota girl reported that the large man attacked her, after the two men, she thought to be local, helped him get his car fixed. The woman had gotten into the car with the man in Fort Worth, she told authorities, and after the attack, rode with a couple to San Angelo, where she reported it. Walton and Highway Patrolman Bob Rivers went to San Angelo Thursday to take a statement from the girl.

The man accused is a white male, about 40, about 5 feet, 10 inches, between 200 and 250 pounds, and was driving a cream over wine Super Sport two-door.

Two IH-20 Projects Seen In Area Soon With 1970 Finish Expected

A. B. Halbert Leaves for Univ. Of Washington

A. B. Halbert, teacher of Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics at Ranger Junior College, has been selected to participate in a summer institute in Physics and Applied Mathematics for Junior College Physics teachers, June 17-Aug. 16.

This institute is sponsored by the Pacific Northwest Association for College Physics, is supported by the National Science Foundation and lists both Seattle College and the University of Washington as cooperating institutions offering advanced college credit for summer work. The summer program will be conducted in the Pacific Science Center in Seattle, the area used for the World's Fair a few years ago and since developed into a core of activity centered around scientific research.

Mr. Halbert left Ranger on Tuesday June 11, and expected to be in Seattle in time for the introductory reception being held on June 16 in the home of Dr. Wilbur V. Johnson, Dept. of Physics, University of Washington.

If participants so desire, this program may be continued for several summers.

Mr. Halbert's family will remain in Ranger during June while Mrs. Halbert continues to work with the summer Homemaking Program of Ranger High School. In July all the family—Robert, Janet, Mary Evelyn and Mrs. Halbert—hope to join Mr. Halbert for the remainder of the summer program and the return trip to Ranger in August.

Funeral Pending For Mr. Garrett, Gun-Shot Victim

Funeral services for Coe D. Garrett, 55, are pending and will be announced by Arrington Hammer Funeral Home.

Mr. Garrett died Friday as the result of a gunshot wound. Authorities expected to file murder charges against a 60-year-old man Saturday. The shooting happened about 3:30 p.m. at a residence in the 1300 block of West Main St. Mr. Garrett was struck in the lower right chest by a bullet from a .22-caliber pistol, it was reported.

Sheriff L. E. Sublett and Assistant District Attorney Emory Walton were continuing the investigation.

Born Aug. 28, 1912, in Comanche, he married Pearl Dolbrige Oct. 1, 1949, in Breckenridge. He was a veteran of World War II and a mechanic. Survivors include his wife, Pearl; one son, Monte J. Garrett of Eastland, one daughter, Mrs. Pete Lomell of Colorado City; one sister, Mrs. Cerna Robinson of Brownwood; four brothers, Pat Garrett of Big Lake, Elias of Ranger, John and Lee, both of Eastland, and three grandchildren.

Progress Report Made by District

Two contracts are expected to be let on Interstate 20 (Highway 80) in Eastland County within a few months to assure completion of the super road across the county by 1970, according to word from the Brownwood District office of the State Highway Department.

Plans call for the contracts to be let between Cisco and a point one mile west of Eastland where much of the roadbed has been prepared in contracts during the past two years, the report said.

Contract already has been let for IH 20 work in Eastland County from the east county line to near Ranger. A short distance of the present Highway 80 between the east edge of Eastland to approximately the west city limits of Ranger will be utilized in the super highway and it will be the last stretch to be modernized.

The two projects are expected to require about two years to complete and to cost several million dollars because twin bridges (each about 800 feet long) will have to be built across the Leon River as part of the work now on the planning boards.

Since one phase of the work on IH 20 from Cisco to 0.6 mile east of SH 6 will have been completed by the time the State Highway Department is ready to let new contracts on IH 20 in Eastland County, the new road district office plans to look for a completion of the work in one project and at the same time take for a sum key projection the section from SH 6 to a point east of Eastland.

In the meantime, Ruby International, Inc. and W. D. York are at work on a project on IH 20 that extends 3.705 miles from a point 0.8 miles southwest of Ranger to a point 1.5 miles east of Ranger. That project is the freeway that goes to the south of the City of Ranger and which will be completed long before the freeway around Eastland, and the stretch of highway between Cisco and Ranger, are completed.

The contractors are nearly 20 per cent complete on the Ranger freeway. The free-way project is a "turn key" job—which means the entire project will be done rather than doing the work by units. That job was bid in at \$3,292,978.19.
