Luis Trejo, 26, a resident of DeLeon for the past eight years, is dead as a result of an incident in Srawn early Sunday morning.

Trejo was pronounced dead at 12:30 a. m. Sunday by a doctor at Ranger General Hospital who stated that the man had been shot and stabbed.

Another man, Pedro Leal, was treated for injuries and released from the hospital the same day.

A .22 pistol, a .22 rifle and a 16-inch butcher knife were found after the incident, on the lawn of a Ranger housing project. The Palo Pinto County Sheriff's Department requested that two men who accompanied Trejo to the hospital be held pending investigation by Erath County District Attorney Sam Cleveland.

Funeral for the slain man was held at 4 p. m. Monday at Moody Cemetery in Moody.

## Highly Decorated Paratrooper Is Planning Cisco Retirement Years

One of this region's most decorated military men — Command Sergeant Major A. B. Cannon, Sr., of Cisco — is a busy man in Viet Nam these days. During duty hours, he is busy with the problems of war. And at other times, he is working on plans for his retirement.

CSM Cannon, who concludes his second tour in Viet Nam in December, is scheduled for official retirement Feb. 1, 1969, and he has already bought a home in Cisco for many years of relaxation and enjoying life in a small town. At least 30 ribbons that denote medals, including numerous coveted honors, fill up the left breast of CSM Cannon's dress uniform. These decorations include:

The Silver Star, which is awarded for bravery under fire.  
The Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster and "V" Device.  
The Air Medal with "V" Device.  
The Purple Heart with Oak Leaf Cluster, denoting wounds in action.  
Combat Infantry Badge with two stars (awarded three times).  
European Theater of Operations Ribbon with four bronze battle stars.  
Korean Service Ribbon with four bronze battle stars.  
Good Conduct Medal with one silver loop and three bronze loops.  
Viet Nam Service Ribbon with two bronze battle stars.  
Master Parachutist Badge with Arrowhead and four bronze stars, signifying five combat jumps.  
Army Commendation Ribbon with "V".  
Viet Nam Master Parachutist Wings.  
Republic of China Parachutist Wings.  
Orange Lanyard of Holland, French and Belgium Fourragers.  
Distinguished Unit Citation with Bronze Clusters.  
Presidential Unit Citation.  
Korean Presidential Unit Citation.  
Eight other theater ribbons.  
The last award, not listed above, was the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry that CSM Cannon's 2nd Brigade, 101st Airborne Unit, has just received.

CSM Cannon expects to arrive home around December 16 — in time for Christmas with his family. He was born in San Angelo and moved with his parents, Faye and the late Chuck Cannon, to Cisco at three months of age. He attended the Cisco schools and enlisted in the Paratroops during WWII.

CSM Cannon was one of the first nine enlisted men in the Army to be awarded the master parachutist wings in 1948. He was on the first promotion list when the rate of Command Sergeant Major was created a few months ago.

His service record includes duty in Europe with the 82nd Airborne Unit during WWII (1943-45), served in Korea with the 187th Airborne in 1950-51, in Viet Nam with the 173rd Airborne in 1965, in Saudi Arabia, Japan and Okinawa at other times.

CSM Cannon will retire with 26 years service. Soldiering has long been in the family. His great grandfather was a member of the Texas Army that captured Santa Anna, and his mother's great grandfather fought in the American Revolution.

Mrs. Cannon, who lives now with two of their children at their home, 1019 West 5th, recently returned from a week's visit in Hawaii where she met her husband during a rest leave from the battlefield. His mother, Mrs. Faye Cannon, lives at 504 E. 7th Street in Cisco.

The Cannons have five children. A son, Terry Cannon, is with the Army in Germany, and two older daughters are Diane, 20, and Jenny, 19. At home are Tina, 6, and A. B., Jr., 14 months.

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# Coastal Raisers Produce Near Maximum on Fertilization

Recently some interest in data has been received from several of our local farmers and ranchers on hay production from fertilized Coastal bermudagrass. Several levels of production can be obtained from Coastal depending on the rate of fertilization and whether or not irrigation is used. These boys reached the near level of expected maximum tonnage in accordance with their rate of fertilization.

On the Jessie Hathcock farm between Ranger and Morton Valley, 1200 bales were cut off of 23 acres. Jessie fertilized with 200 lbs. of 18-46-0 last September and 200 lbs. of straight Nitrogen on May 1st of this year. He cut his hay on May 20. At present, Jessie is grazing this 25 acres and the pasture has made such a "comeback" it has the appearance of never having been cut.

R. L. Lewis of Desdemona used 333 lbs. per acre of straight Nitrogen on six acres in March of this year and cut 534 good heavy bales off of this six acres. That is around 89 bales per acre. His Coastal is ready to cut again at the present time.

A. D. Crawford, whose ranch lies between Strawn and Desdemona, put 200 lbs. of straight Nitrogen per acre on his 24 acre bottomland pasture and harvested 2024 bales that weighed near 100 lbs. per bale. This is around 96 bales per acre. As the others, this was an outstanding yield.

Mr. P. E. Fox of Desdemona irrigated his Coastal, and cut 1477 bales off of five acres in three cuttings. He cut 631 bales in one cutting. Mr. Fox used 700 lbs. of fertilizer per acre. He used 300 lbs. of 10-20-10 in March and then, used around 130 lbs. per acre straight Nitrogen three more times. Some grazing was also done and Mr. Fox said he could possibly have cut the Coastal one more time. These impressive yields produced by a few of the outstanding farmers and ranchers of our community should be a good indication of what can be done with Coastal if fertilized and or irrigated.

As mentioned before, the rate of production usually is in proportion to the rate of fertilization depending on which level of production the farmer is seeking. Without fertilization, Coastal is noted

to be low in forage production, slow to spread, and produces a low quality of hay. However, when fertilized, with weeds controlled, cut at a minimum of four inches, and cut from boot to bloom or 28 to 32 days, Coastal bermudagrass should fill your barn with hay, or produce a good quality of grazing forage to handle one animal unit (cow & calf), to two acres for a six month period.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — In 1970 a new census of an estimated 205 million people will be taken in the United States. Pre-test questions are now being tried out in South Carolina and Wisconsin. A certain number of people in the State of Connecticut have already had all or part of the approximately 100 questions submitted to them to test reaction and response.

Some of the questions proposed for the 1970 census are too embarrassing to put in public print. Some of them compare to Dr. Kinsey's Report of a few years ago and definitely invade the privacy of the individual.

Test questions going into the states on a trial basis include: Do you share your bathtub or shower?

What is your telephone number?

How much rent do you pay? How many hours did your husband work last week?

How many babies has your wife had?

Do you walk to work or take a taxicab?

How much money did you make last year?

Over the last several years some in Congress and others outside Government have proposed that there be established a National Data Center which would use the Census Reports as a basis for a dossier file on every American.

No one argues that there should not be a census and, in fact, there are good and substantial reasons why the right kind of Census should be taken every five years instead of ten. There is a vast difference, however, in accounting for the number of people, their age, sex and occupation, and those which invade privacy, and to which people should not be subjected.

The U. S. Census is authorized by the Constitution and must be conducted for certain necessary purposes. We, of course, must know what our population is and, in fact, this is what the Constitution originally provided. Originally, it was intended for the purpose of apportioning the U. S. House of Representatives. To quote the authority contained in the Constitution: "The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such a manner as they shall by law direct." Of course, this leaves room for an expansion of information in accordance with the times, but the times never require people to reveal intimate data about themselves which is not the Government's business. In addition, they want to impose on those who refuse to answer for any reason, a fine of \$100 and a jail term of up to 90 days. The vast majority of people would probably not object to some form of compulsory requirement to respond to essential questions.

For the purpose of identifying the citizens of our Country and to serve the interest of information, it is suggested that seven questions on a simple form, mailed to each household, should meet the requirements. These are: Name and address; relation to head of household; sex; date of birth; race or color; marital status; and visitors in home at the time of Census. Instead of this simple requirement, the pre-test forms and those which may be submitted unless legislative action prohibits it, will contain more than 100 questions.

A bill now before the Congress would require this basic information on each individual but would permit the answer

to numerous other questions on a voluntary basis.

One after another who have studied this question in depth feel that much more accurate and useful data would be obtained if given on a voluntary basis. Market research firms have found that any element of coercion tends to invalidate the results of survey research. Certainly, the same thing would apply to the Government's effort to pry into the private lives of every citizen.
