

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



There is a væst differ-ence however, in accounting for the number of people, their age, sex and occupation, and se which invade privacy and to which people should ot be subjected.

The U.S. Cenesus is authorized by the Constitution and must be conducted for certain necessary purposes. We, of course, must know what our population is and, in fact, this what the Constitution origi nally provided. Originally, it was intended for the purpose of apportion in g the U.S House of Representatives. To quote the authority contained contained in the Constitution suggests he simplicity intended: 'The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such a manner as they shall by law direct." Of course, by law direct. Of course this leaves room for an expansion of information in accordance with the times, but the times never require people to reveal intimate data about themselves which is not the Government's business. In addition, they want to impose on those who refuse to answer for any reason, a fine of \$100 and a jail term of up to 60 days. The vast majority of people would probably not object to some form of compulsory requirement to respond to essential questions.

For the purpose of identifying the citizens of our Country and to serve the interest of business which needs certain information, it is suggested that seven questions on a simple form, mailed to each household, should meet the requirements. These are: Name and address; relation to head of household; sex; date of birth; race or color; marital status; and visitors in

home at the time of Census. Instead of this simple requirement, the pre-test forms and those which may be submitted unless legislative action prohibits it, will contain
