## Thomas Elwood On Duty At Saigon, Vietnam

**SAIGON** — Thomas Elwood of Ranger, has arrived here for a tour of duty with the Viet Nam Regional Exchange (VRE).

VRE is a \$30-million-a-month business serving over 600,000 Free World troops with its 121 food facilities and 320 retail outlets. Profits generated by these outlets are used to provide libraries, day-rooms, recreation equipment and other projects for the troops welfare.

Elwood takes on the post of supervisory terminal representative at the Saigon Exchange Depot, the largest store facility in the Army and Air Force Exchange Service. He thus becomes a part of an operation which moves about 38 million tons of Exchange merchandise each month.

Born in Ranger, Elwood attended the high school there. He went on to Arlington State College, Arlington, and graduated with an associate in science degree in industrial aeronautical engineering. He earned a bachelor of science degree in industrial science from Letourneau Technical Institute in Longview, Tex.

A retired Air Force major, he volunteered for Viet Nam Exchange assignment and arrived here in June. His wife Lucille Lorei and children: Peggy Ann, 19, and John Calvin, 17 live at 502 Travis in Ranger.

## THE GORDON SPOT

The Lake Cisco Boy's 4-H Camp wouldn't be the same without Mr. and Mrs. Fred McBees who live near Carbon. They have been cooking for the boy's camp for the last 12 or 15 years. Boys who have attended the camp in the past look forward to seeing the McBees at the camp the next year.

Boys from four counties participate in this camp. These counties are Palo Pinto, Callahan, Brown and Eastland counties. Other counties have participated in the past. The county agents from the other counties have the same feeling for the McBees that we have.

I had a good visit with the McBees about two weeks ago when I asked if they would be able to cook for the camp again this year, July 22-23. I soon learned they enjoyed the boy's camp as much as we enjoyed having them at our camp.

Mr. McBees said he first started attending the 4-H camp with his son, George, when George was a 4-H member. This was over 20 years ago. Dr. George McBees is now Assistant Professor of Agronomy at Texas A&M University.

July 21-27 is National Farm Safety week. Farming is in full swing again. Because of disrupted schedules and loss of field time due to weather conditions, the tendency is to rush and speed every job. This can lead to trouble, especially when machinery is involved. Farm tractor accidents are a major cause of death and records show that many of the accidents could have been prevented.

Here are some suggestions for safer tractor operation. Read and heed instruction manuals. Do each tractor job at the most efficient speed, but slow down if work conditions are bad — slick or muddy ground or poor visibility.

Cut tractor speeds when cornering, turning at end of the row and near ditches and fixed objects. Be sure loads are properly hitched to the drawbar. Keep children off and away from machinery. Train older boys to operate it safely. Have all shields and guards in place. Re fuel only cool engines and never smoke while refueling.

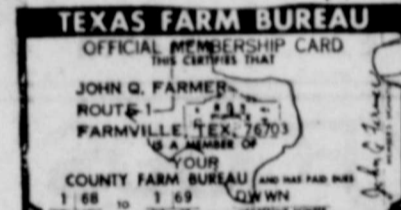
Don't forget the new change in the ASCS peanut, cotton and feed grain program this year. Gilbert Meredith, ASCS office manager, says Aug. 1 is the deadline to file your acreage report and certification in the ASCS office. This means the ASCS men will not go to your place and measure your peanuts, cotton and feed grain. You must go to the office and tell them how many acres you have planted. Farmers who have had acreage premeasured or measured after planting must also go to the ASCS office and report the acres planted.

If you do not report the acres planted in these crops by Aug. 1, you may lose the price support and other program benefits.

I appreciate all the effort that is being made to prevent screwworm outbreaks in Eastland County. A number of livestock owners have told me they are observing their livestock more closely and encouraging their neighbors to do the same. The Screwworm Eradication Program has been too valuable to lose the fight now.

Bobby Williams, a 4-H member who graduated from Gorman High School last spring, has received many honors this summer. He attended state 4-H council in Houston. July 23-27 he attends a conservation camp on Lake O' The Pines in East Texas. Bobby will attend the American Youth Foundation Leadership Training Camp at Stony Lake, Michigan, Aug. 12-25. All these trips are expense paid trips and will not cost Bobby anything.

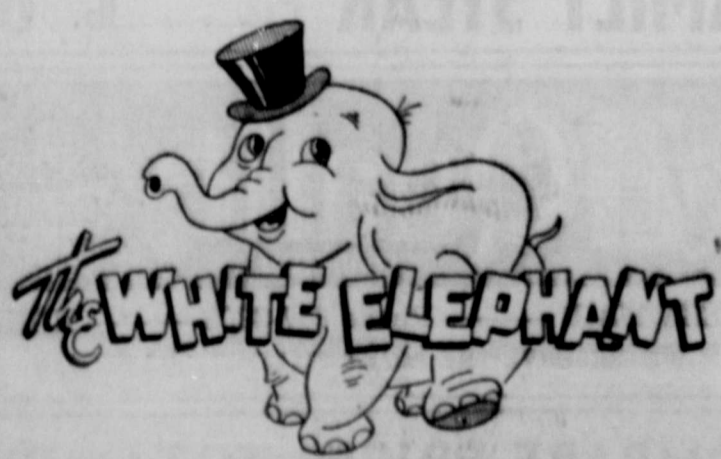

### Travel Trails Folders Issued By State Agency

AUSTIN — Governor John Connally has announced the publication of detailed folders for two of the Statewide system of Texas Travel Trails.

The folders, published by the Texas Highway Department, will serve as guides and detail numerous points of interest along the Texas Mountain Trail in far West Texas, and the Texas Forest Trail in deep East Texas.

The folders will lead travelers through picturesque landscapes, by historic sites and to colorful cities and towns on the two official State trails.

Connally announced the new Statewide system of trails last January. Each county erected special Travel Trail signs along the 10 official trail routes.

The Mountain Trail folder guides travelers through the tallest region of Texas, where 90 peaks thrust above a mile high. The route goes past the nation's newest national park, so be developed in the Guadalupe Mountains, and to Davis Mountains State Park.

Those following the Mountain Trail will visit Big Bend National Park, the scenic El Camino del Rio from Big Bend to Presidio, and through the cities of Van Horn, Fort Davis, Marfa, Alpine and El Paso.

The Texas Forest Trail explores a 790-mile loop through the vast Piney Woods region. It goes through four national forests and past scores of federal, State and county recreational areas.

Other spots of interest include the East Texas oil field, the State's only Indian reservation, the Big Thicket and such popular water sport areas as Lake O' the Pines, Caddo Lake and Sam Rayburn Reservoir.

Travel Trail literature is available from the Texas Highway Department tourist bureaus and district offices, and at chambers of commerce along the Travel Trail routes.

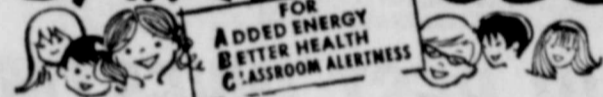

# Unique Pinnell - Royall Family Holds 48th Reunion In Cisco

Lake Cisco over the years has been the scene of many reunions, some of which have been unusual.

The 48th annual Pinnell-Royall Reunion, held there this past weekend is perhaps one of the most unique.

No stranger to the Lake Cisco shores, members of these two families (who claim to be among the world's oldest) began their gatherings at Lake Cisco back in 1920, but have been meeting at other sites for the past few years. Over 100 had signed in by Saturday afternoon and some 300 were expected at the Camp Inspiration headquarters by Sunday.

Seven other regional reunions are held by scattered members of the family around the country, but the one held in Eastland County was the senior, three-day event. Record number of attendees was in Brownwood in 1960 when 561 kith and kin signed in.

Senior patriarch Royal E. Pennell, 72, of Dallas, and formerly of this county (Rising Star, Cisco and Moran), and A. B. Pinnell of Tucson of Arizona, both here for the get-together, are cousins and

grandsons of Pioneer Willey E. Pinnell who settled in this area in 1800, one of members reports.

An even dozen states was represented at the reunion, including relatives from North Carolina, Florida, California, Arizona, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, Kansas, Illinois, New Mexico and Washington.

During a business session Sunday, following the family all-together devotional, Gene Mathews of Graham was sworn in as Junior President of the family for the coming year, to serve under Jackie Royall of Mansfield, who will be senior president. Mrs. Bedford Works of Dallas was re-elected secretary.

A Family Queen, always a senior matron of the family, was to have been revealed at the Sunday closing celebration.

The Pinnell-Royall (50 spellings of Pinnell and nine spellings of Royall accepted) historians claim that the families originated in Normandy, France over 2,000 years ago and family records extend back to the time of Christ. Members were prominent lead-

ers of William the Conqueror in his conquest of England in 1066 A.D.; the chief lieutenants of the First Holy Crusade, under Geoffrey, in 1098; in the American Revolutionary War and each of the wars since.

The combined families, closely allied by inter-marriage, has a national board of directors, fosters genealogical research; maintains a national record department with the names of over 10,000 members and issues a monthly, 12-page mimeographed newspaper. Few families can boast such esprit-de-corps or such a planned program of activities.

The reunion was highlighted by organized games (tables and active), exhibits of family made objects (al a country fairs, a religious service, and a family auction of white elephants).

The family even offers a 97-page cookbook containing the favorites, old and new, from its good-cooking members.

An entire building of the camp site housed the family exhibits (all of amateur standing, but professional beauty)

## Junior College Grid Picture Given In New Football Book

Dave Campbell's popular 1968 edition of TEXAS FOOTBALL says this of Texas Junior College teams:

Over the past three seasons, Henderson County has lost just enough games (four) to appreciate the delightful sensation of winning—28 times. And even with the high rate of turnover among junior college players, the Cardinals still don't appear ready to relinquish their championship perch. "We have as good — or better — chance to win the championship as any other team," admits coach Bob Bacarini.

HENDERSON COUNTY, just as last year has no proven-out QB in sight, but a look at some of the other football folks in camp provides an impressive nucleus. Among 5 offensive and 5 defensive regulars from an 8-2 are All America nose guard Ricky Gunnels (220), defensive tackle Tom Newton (220) and offensive tackle Ed Pusick (245). And the running game could be overwhelming with such names as halfbacks John Monk and Louis Scott. Split end Steve Chatman, guard James Jenkins, tackle Danny Lewis and linebacker James Marcus (225) are other solid talents.

CISCO was a dandy second last year, hewing out a 7-2-1 record, and now it returns Texas' highest scoring backfield intact. Alas, it also is shopping for defensive linemen. Halfbacks Calvin Hinderman and Clarence Jackson, QB Ronnie Bell and fullback Jim Frazier (215) are unadulterated class, as is offensive guard Gary Swan (225). But halfbacks A. D. Burton and Joe Eggins and linebacker Lennie Givens are the only defensive veterans.

KILGORE made 1967 a sort of building year, producing a 5-5 with a freshman-studded assemblage. Now 10 offensive and 5 defensive veterans return, including people of all-star potential in guard Allen Wilkenfeld (201), tackle Glenn Tucker (226), end Jimmy Malone and defensive back Jackie Miller. Charles Austin, a broken field wizard, is the offensive hub, with QB Wes Sketers, fullback David Crow and wingback Danny Dorsey leading scoring class. Jim Sartain, Pat Murphy, Bill Snider, Jerry Gibson and Jimmy Kempf are other tested linemen.

TYLER managed a 7-4 year ago but all the losses were in league competition. With fine line potential and good QB

prospects among the 6 offensive and 6 defensive returnees, circuit rivals should be on guard for the Apaches this time around. Three QB possibilities are Mike Keveryn, Gay Ramm and Rick Nabors, who is also a class defensive back; tackle Steve McCoy (240), guards George Leigh-Page (225) and Ronnie Smith, and centers Sid Goff (235) and John Jackson (250) are the line behemoths. Glenn Section and Raymond Fontenot, one of the leagues top linebackers last year, are the top running backs.

BLINN will have 18 lettermen (8 offensive and 7 defensive starters) from a 4-4-1, plus an outstanding freshman fullback in Earl Marion (212). So the team could be a fine one. Halfbacks Josh Ashton (205) and Carl Hayes provide more offensive punch behind QB Allan Smith and a fine linebacking corps is present in Glenn Tegeler (215), Robert Young, Desi Elizondo and Charles Wilson. Fine line names include George Pachucha (240), Steve Burleson (230), Darryl Craft (225) and tackle Russell Harry (6-6, 250) who is gifted with fine agility.

WHARTON got a 3-7 initiation for a young team last year, now returns 20 lettermen, (8 offensive and 10 defensive regulars) and counts all that experience, plus overall size, as hopeful factors. Linebacker Ronnie Herman (230) is class in any league, and he has a fine running mate in Mike Yanowski (225).

## Tornado Preparedness Plan Now Under Development

AUSTIN — C. O. Layne, State Coordinator of Defense and Disaster Relief for the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the Weather Bureau and the State of Texas have jointly initiated a program of improved public preparedness against tornadoes.

The action is part of a major national program designed to reduce the toll taken by tornadoes, considered by the Weather Bureau to be the most vicious of all natural hazards.

Last year was the worst in recorded history for tornado incidence in the United States. There were 912 tornadoes reported, causing 116 deaths, approximately 2,000 injuries and untold millions of dollars in damage.

A new tornado preparedness plan for community protection has been developed by the Weather Bureau, and is expected to be placed in operation during the next few years at all locations subject to tornadoes and severe thunderstorms.

"Vigorous programs of community action have been shown to increase substantially the degree of protection possible against the effects of tornadoes," Layne said. "In such programs, the Weather Bureau, Department of Public Safety, news media, and local officials all play major roles," he added.

A recent example of the benefits of community preparedness was exhibited in the Miami, Texas tornado of May 6. By the coordinated actions of the Weather Bureau, DPS, local television and radio stations, and local agencies and citizens, effective warning was given the city. The warning was then acted upon by local officials knowledgeable in tornado safety precautions and was directly attributable to the saving of lives.

A recent effort of the Weather Bureau program to keep the nation as safe as possible from tornadoes was the production of the film "TORNADO." This film has been viewed by millions, and is currently one of the most popular films in the libraries of the DPS and Weather Bureau.

"Additional meetings with city and community officials, state and local law officers, disaster agencies, and others will be held throughout the state in the future to work out the details necessary for the best possible protection of life and property," Layne said.

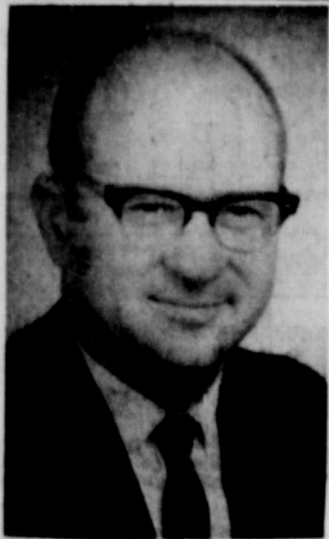

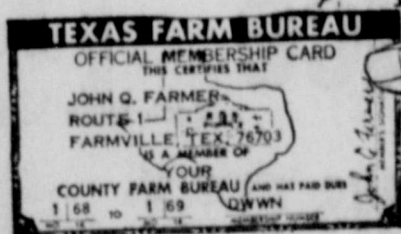
