

Trustees of Ranger IDS Vote For Better Athletic Insurance

In their regular July meeting Tuesday night the board of trustees of Ranger Independent School district voted to get out of the insurance business by contracting for a better athletic insurance policy in which the football program will pay \$11 and the parent will be asked to pay \$10. Parents will not be required to buy the policy but will be asked to sign a release.

For senior high football players the policy will pay \$3 for the first office call and \$3 for other visits. It will pay 100 percent of surgical treatment in the office and 100 percent of the cost of physiotherapy, diathermy and similar treatment while hospital confined.

X-rays will pay \$7.50 for a negative one and up to \$30 where positive.

Dental fees are \$50 for each injury to a sound tooth. Ambulance fee is \$25 for any one injury. The policy pays 75 percent of the hospital expenses including lab fees, medications, dressings, and a registered nurse providing the hospital care begins within 90 days of the date of injury.

Emergency room charges

allowed are \$5 per accident. Accidental death pays \$1,000 and dismemberment pays \$7,500.

Football players may purchase 24 hour coverage for 12 months for \$12 more.

Students not in senior athletics may purchase a policy similar to the one now in force for only \$1 for single coverage and \$2 for double coverage. 24 hour coverage costs \$6 for single benefits and \$10 for double coverage.

A bus mileage rate of 25 cents a mile for use of school buses for other than transporting pupils to and from school was agreed on. This includes outside groups when approved as well as the band, football and student buses.

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Completion of FM 3101 Set in 1968 Program

Completion of FM 3101 between US 80 in Eastland and US 183 north of Cisco has been set as part of the 1968 Texas Farm to Market Road Program, the Texas Highway resident engineer, who will be in charge of the work, said that 5.4 miles will be built to finish the road. The first two miles have been completed. The new road will cross Lake Eastland and go toward Yellow Mound, intersecting US 183 north of Cisco.

The contract has not been let and no starting date has been set. Work is expected to run some 150 days from starting date. The road will include a new bridge across Lake Eastland.

District Engineer E.M. Pritchard of Brownwood said the estimated cost of the work is \$64,000 and includes only the grading and structures.

AUSTIN — With his veto power Gov. John Connally has the last word on the free spending works of the special legislative session.

He has until July 23 to exercise this privilege. Speculation is high that he will strike from the 1969 budget several million dollars worth of items and a number of controversial riders.

Lawmakers wrote into the appropriations bill several things which Connally already had publicly disapproved of in previous veto messages.

There is speculation that he may knock out of the appropriations bill as much as \$10 million worth of spending that has been programmed by the Legislature... much of it in conference committee.

Connally also is being urged to veto appropriation riders restricting the Air Control Board from using state funds to investigate pollution caused by cotton gins. He probably will do so, since he axed the same provisions last year.

Governor Connally chopped \$3.2 million from the Legislature's spending plans after the 1967 regular session.

Another rider likely to feel Connally's hatchet would deny salary funds to any state employee who took a leave of absence to work in a political campaign. This proviso was

not in either House or Senate bill originally. How it showed up in the conference committee report is a mystery of the special session.

Some legislators contend that the governor cannot veto riders. But Connally has done it effectively in the past, and nobody has yet to challenge his authority in court. It's a good bet he plans to do it again.

Aubrey R. Cartridge, chief of the Liquor Control Board's enforcement division and target of criticism in Attorney General Crawford Martin's report on that Board, plans to retire. He's a 33-year-veteran of the Board.

Cartridge is expected to ask the Board later this month to let him retire Aug. 31 two weeks after he reaches 65 years of age.

In Martin's investigative report, he claimed that Cartridge failed to demonstrate any supervisory control over agents, and added, "It is our feeling that as long as he remains chief of the enforcement division this situation is no longer likely to show improvement."

Fort Worth Lawyer Garrett Morris has been sworn in as a new member of the Texas Highway Commission. He re-

places Hal Woodard of Cole man who has been appointed federal judge for the Northern District of Texas.

Morris is the head of a Fort Worth insurance company and has been practicing law there for 20 years.

Up to the point where the bill by Rep. Don Cavness of Austin to require blood and/or breath tests for intoxication in drivers was killed by the State Senate, it was the subject of an added debate: Cavness said Texas would lose Federal highway aid if the bill failed. Some lawmakers insisted that this was not so.

Weldon Hart of the Texas Good Roads Association says the Federal government has the legal right to withhold 10 per cent of Texas' Federal highway funds until such a bill is passed.

Hart predicts that the Cavness bill will make better progress in the 1969 session.

State Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said the School Land Board's next oil, gas and sulphur lease will be held at 10 a.m., Dec. 3 in the General Land Office, but bids must be received by Oct. 10, 1968.

Texas nimrods can start making those fall hunting plans. Parks and Wildlife Commission has set the new hunting regulations.

Deer season will open on Nov. 9 in most areas of the state. General limit is three, no more than two bucks (there are exceptions in some areas). An extended, experimental deer season was established for Nov. 9-Jan. 7 in Frio Co.

Mourning Dove season starts Oct. 1 and extends until Oct. 30 in the north zone. Dates for the southern zone are Sept. 21-Nov. 19.

A small section of Lower Rio Grande Valley will become a non-season sanctuary for white wing and mourning doves. Regular white wing season is Sept. 1-2 and 7-8.
