My wardrobe is silkless, My cow has gone milkless, My appetite is that of a bear.

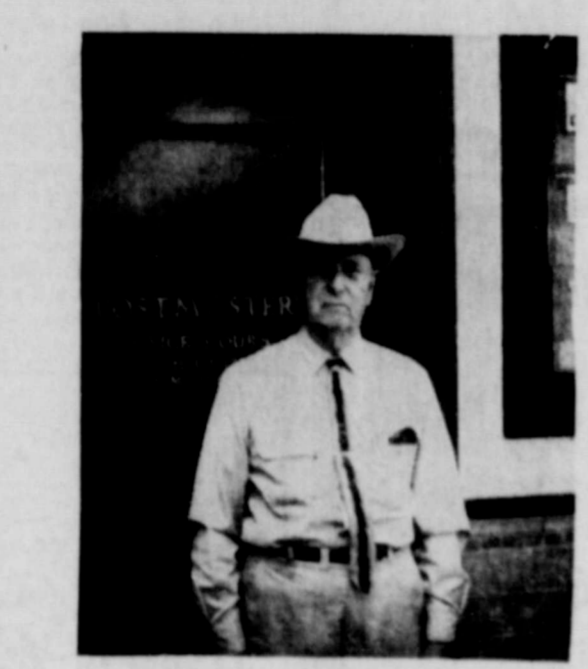
My litness is tireless, My heater is fireless—Future prospects have gone up in air.

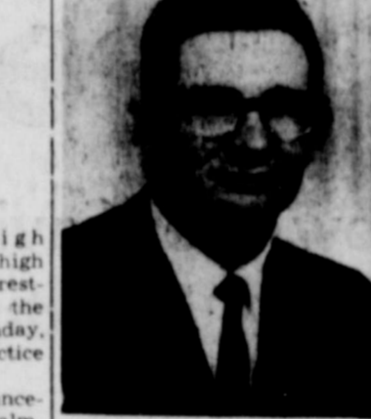
Three others suffered lesser burns when the mishap occurred, but were not hospitalized.

Lone Star Gas Has Increased 1st Half Earnings

Lone Star Gas Company earnings for the first half of 1968 were \$18,908,386 up \$1,164,048 over the year before level, Louis G. James, president, reported. Earnings for the 12-month period ended June 30, 1968, were \$23,227,699 is equivalent to \$1.58 per share.

James said total operating revenues for the Company, and its subsidiaries were \$126.3 million for the first half of 1968, up 12.7 million from last year. Operating expenses in the same period were \$102.8 million, up \$10.3 million.

Gas purchased expenses increased due to the greater volume of gas sold. Federal income taxes increased as a result of the 10 per cent surcharge tax enacted in June, 1968 retroactive to Jan. 1, 1968, and higher taxable income in the first half than one year ago.

The president reported that Lone Star Producing Company, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Lone Star Gas Company, is participating in offshore Texas oil and gas exploration. Producing Company owns basically a 10 percent interest in the "Alamos" Combine which recently acquired 152,694 acres of Federal leases.

Exploratory drilling on certain of the leases is scheduled to commence in the fourth quarter, 1968.

Two Teachers Still Needed For Ranger Schools, Supt. Clark Says

After having completed the Ranger Public School faculty three times this summer Supt. James R. Clark returned from vacation to find that he needed five teachers and two custodians and two bus drivers.

Clark reports that he has persons lined up for all of the teaching positions but does lack a junior high math teacher and a teacher for Hodges Oak Primary. The staff is completed at Young, The Junior-Senior High lacks only the junior high math teacher.

the first place Barton entry. R. W. Merket's entry of Merket Special won first in the "other ins'hell" class. Mr. Merket lives in Cisco. Another ribbon was won by Earl Walker of Cisco. His Success entry won a third place ribbon.

I would like to remind all livestock owners to be on the alert for screwworms in livestock wounds. There have been more screwworms in Texas this year than any time since the Screwworm Eradication Program began. Be sure to treat all wounds in animals, spray to control flies, and inspect animals regularly. Any time worms are found in animal wounds be sure to send a sample to the mailing vials in my office. Vials can also be found at other places throughout the county.

Eastland County 4-H boys are looking forward to the annual Cisco Boys 4-H Camp to be held July 22 and 23. Other 4-H boys from Callahan, Palo Pinto and Brown Counties will attend the camp. The camp has been held at the Lake Cisco park for more than 20 years.
