Bulldogs, Mavs To Clash For 46th Time Friday

The Ranger Bulldogs will be playing the tough rival team of the Eastland Mavericks here in the second non-conference game of the year at 8 p. m. Friday in the Bulldog Stadium.

In last years encounter with the Mavericks, the Bulldogs won by a close margin of 14-6. The Mavericks won their first game of the season last week by defeating the Cross Plains Buffaloes 57-12.

The records show the Bulldogs have defeated the Mavericks 33 times in the last 46 years that the teams have met. The last time the Mavs defeated the Bulldogs was in 1965 when the Mavs held the Bulldogs to an 18-0 ballgame.

Parade And Grid Battle Features Of Saturday Peanut Bowl Program

She is a junior at Stephen F. Austin College, Nacogdoches, where she is drum major of the band. She has won numerous honors as a twirler, is a fine musician and is an education major.

Miss Texas Accepts Invitation To Appear For Parade and Bowl Game

Plans for the 9th annual Eastland County Peanut Bowl program were nearing completion today as Jaycees and civic leaders were busy with the finishing touches. Tuesday night's queen contest was the first official event.

The Bowl program will begin with a street parade in downtown Eastland at 3 p.m. Saturday followed by the football bowl battle between the junior colleges of Cisco and Ranger at Maverick Stadium in Eastland. A capacity crowd was expected. Tickets were reported to be selling well in Eastland, Ranger and Cisco.

The parade promised to be unusually interesting this year with the appearance of Diane Huggins of Nacogdoches — Miss Texas of 1968 — in the Saturday parade and at the football game. She won her title in the recent Miss Texas Pageant. She is a graduate of Troup High School and is a junior at Stephen F. Austin College in Nacogdoches. She

is a musician, a featured twirler and drum major in high school, and is the first girl drum major at SFA since World War II.

Miss Texas' appearance was arranged by Eastland Jaycees, sponsors of the annual Peanut Bowl program.

The parade will include the Peanut Bowl Queen along with the Cisco Junior College Band and Belles, the Cisco High School band; the Ranger High School and Ranger College bands; the Eastland High School band and others. Numerous floats and club entries are expected.

The Peanut Bowl Queen and Miss Texas will be presented at half-time Saturday night at the football game.

The football game will open the new season for both Cisco and Ranger college teams. Cisco has a 7-1 advantage over Ranger in the Bowl programs. Ranger having won the first game and Cisco the last (Continued on Page Six)

Rangers Are Ready For Kickoff In Bowl Contest at Eastland Saturday

Although they are an underdog again this year, the Ranger Junior College Rangers expect to give a good account of themselves in the annual Peanut Bowl football battle at 8 p.m. Saturday at Eastland.

Coach Ken Pair who is new to the team reported that his squad was in good condition with only a few injuries. His team will be a little lighter than Cisco's and will depend on speed. A squad roster appears elsewhere in this edition. The team lists 21 sophomores.

The Rangers will use the pro set and wing "T" formations on offense. Gary Chandler, 195-pound sophomore from Stephenville, will be the field general and handle the passing and the punting. Tackle Joe Slaton will help with the punting if needed. Kickoffs and PATs will be handled by End Robert Jackson and HB Harry Mathis.

Coach Pair, who played football at Stephen F. Austin Col-

lege, is assisted by Brodie Campbell. They have a 33-man squad.

Probable starters were listed as follows: Chandler at quarterback; Bill Cherry and Jack Martin at halfbacks and Greg McCoy at fullback; ends, Search Anderson and Robert Jackson; tackles, Bill Payne and Joe Slaton; guards, Bob Thacker and James Pillar; and center, Joe Sandejar.

The defensive team will be composed of Danny Vara, Harry Mathis, Larry Quast, Larry Cook, Jerry Cook, George Brakefield, Edd Hooker, Harold Jones, Jay Thibodeaux, Randy Faris and Ronnie Smith. The 40-piece Ranger band, directed by Joel Lamkin, will be ready to go and plans a half-time show.

Cheer leaders were chosen for the season as follows: Karen Mince Judy Townsend, Carol PriByle, Diana Ewing, Rhonda Talley and Dot Seaton. They will head a big delegation of RJC students at the Bowl game.

CJC Band, Belles and Grid Team Are Ready For Saturday Contest

Cisco Junior College expects to have a large delegation of fans and students at Eastland for the annual Peanut Bowl football game between their Wranglers and the Rangers of Ranger Junior College, according to President Leand Willis.

This will be the 9th annual meeting of the two teams in the Eastland County Bowl, and Cisco has a 7-to-1 advantage as Ranger won the first game and Cisco has won ever since. The game will start at 8 p. m. Saturday at Maverick Stadium.

Coach Jim Puryear of CJC, who has been the winning coach in all of the Peanut Bowl games (He was at Ranger the first year and has been at Cisco ever since), reported that his Wranglers will be at top speed for the game. His 33-man squad is made up of 14 sophomores and 19 freshmen, and five first-year men are probable starters.

Director Eris Ritchie reported that his 45-man Wrangler Band was ready for the season's opener and expected to wear their brand new uniforms (if they arrived as expected). Drum majors will be Randy Haynes of Burleson and Pat Jenkins of Hamlin. This will be the band's first year as a marching outfit.

The 40-girl drill team — the Wrangler Belles — also are ready to go, according to Mrs. George Owens, director. The

Belles are headed by Norene Blanchard of Grand Saline and Jann Cook of Breckenridge as co-captains, and Janice Allison of Bridgeport, Lynn Glover of Breckenridge and Susie Morgan of Cisco as lieutenants.

The CJC cheer leaders for the new season are Shirley Reed of Eastland, the leader, and Diana Brzowski of Wylie, Sandra Page of Cisco, Brenda Foster of Tahoka, and Melinda Wilson of Rule with Norma Dodson of Albany as the alternate.

The first CJC pep rally of the new year was held at 10:45 a. m. Thursday at Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium. The program included music by the band, routines by a group of Belles and a talk by Coach Puryear.

The 1968 Wrangler squad is listed elsewhere in this edition with probable starters for the opening game. Mike Hays, Fort Worth, will be the team's punter, and Suidara will handle field goals and kickoffs.

The probable defensive team was listed as follows: Floyd Campbell, Marion Kuykendall, A. D. Burton, Gary Morris, Lennie Givins, Jim Suidara, Guy Arsemere, Monte Kreis, Curtis Barnes, Greg Weber, and Mike Scribner.

Team managers are Phillip Dodson and Jerry Grange, and the trainer is Carl Moore. Cisco will be the host team in the Peanut Bowl this year.

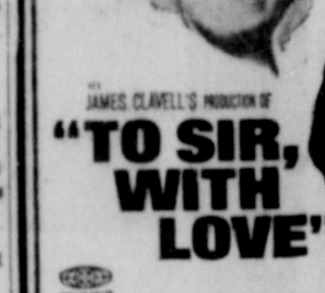
