TAXPAYERS in Ranger will be entitled to deduct the city sales tax that became effective last October 1 if they itemize their deductions on Page 2 of the Form 1040 this year, according to a release of the U.S. Treasury Department. District officials have prepared tables showing the exact amount deductible for the city sales tax, in addition to the Texas state sales tax.

According to Ellis Campbell, Jr., Dallas District Director, these tables have been posted in the local post office and provided to the banks, as well as being available at all Internal Revenue Service offices in Texas.

### Members Of Electric Co-op Get Refunds

The Comanche County Electric Cooperative has recently sent Capital Refunds to 5750 members who were receiving service in 1956, in the amount of \$36,500. This brings to \$185,791.00 the amount which has been refunded to date and represents all the margin (or profit) which the Co-op made from its operations from 1939 through 1956. It is in this manner that the co-op lives up to its obligation of non-profit operation.

The cooperative way of business is still a vital part of the overall American way of life, as it has been from the beginning of this nation. On the frontier neighbors helped each other gather their crops, build homes, schools, and churches. All through our history various groups have found it necessary to band together in order to accomplish jobs collectively which no individual could do by himself.

The formation of Electric Co-ops, some 30 years ago, started a revitalization of rural living which has made a tremendous contribution to the economy of the nation. The 1,000 Electric Co-ops in the nation have spent about 6 billion dollars for lines and equipment to serve nearly 6,000,000 consumers. These consumers in turn have spent more than 30 billion dollars for electrical appliances and equipment, thus making jobs in industry from the factory on through wholesaler to retailer. Also sharing in the cycle, are transportation, other utilities, the professions and nearly all other segments of American industry.

## To Vote, You Must Register --Regardless of Your Age

"You're never too old to register," is the announcement concerning voter registration now underway for 1969 elections.

County Tax Collector Edgar Alton said, "You must register to be able to vote. The age limit is '21 and up'. Last year, we registered some people past the age of 90. Please do not fail to register because you believe your age exempts you from registration.

Registration is moving slowly, Alton said, and deadline is January 31. Thursday only 353 voters had registered at the tax office in the County Courthouse. No figures had been released by the sub-stations, the Chamber of Commerce offices in Cisco and Ranger; Jenkins Insurance Agency in Rising Star; and Todd's Variety Store in Gorman.

Anyone registering may also register a husband or wife, parent, or son or daughter.

The County had 8,416 registered voters in 1968.

## Dr. Caton Honored On 90th Birthday Friday

Dr. J. H. Caton was honored on his 90th birthday with a reception held from 2 to 4 p. m. Friday at his home in Eastland.

The reception was hosted by members of the First Christian Church. The Rev. Eugene Williams is pastor of the church.

Dr. Caton was born December 27, 1878 in a log cabin in Red River County, the son of James H. Caton and Mary Sue Chambers Caton. The Caton Community near Clarksville was named for his family. He attended a rural school in Caton and then high school at Detroit, Texas.

He worked after school for his father, who had a farm and a cotton gin. He first practiced medicine in Caton Community. In 1898, fifteen years before he got his first car, Dr. Caton often made long trips horseback to visit the sick.

The doctor moved to Breckenridge and then to Detroit. He left Detroit to enter the army in World War I and served as a first lieutenant in the medical corps.

Mrs. Belle Langston, 89, longtime resident of Ranger, died early Monday morning in a Houston rest home.

Austin — Bone dry areas of West and South Texas got a monumental Christmas present unwrapped before Dec. 25. It was in the form of a \$10 billion master plan for development of Texas water resources as revealed by the Texas Water Development Board.

Its long-sighted recommendation, which proposes moving water westward and southward through an elaborate network of canals and pipelines from Louisiana and East Texas, may leave the suppliers wondering whether it is indeed more blessed to give than to receive. Highlights of the massive plan, compiled over a period of four years, includes the following proposals:

Importation of 12 to 13 million acre feet of surplus water annually from Mississippi and transportation uphill through canals from Sulphur and Sabine River reservoirs to the Lubbock area and the Rio Grande Valley respectively. Pipelines would move it along to many Texas cities and irrigated farming areas of West Texas and on to New Mexico. Other waters from rain-rich East Texas basins would move through the same major facilities to the South and as far as El Paso on the western edge of the state.

Construction of 67 major new dams and reservoirs and two salt water barriers at a cost of \$2.4 billion. They would contain a total of 33.6 million acre feet of conservation storage and 10.1 million acre feet of flood control capacity.

Transfer of water from the North Texas westward and down the Texas coast to the South. Major pipeline would move through another canal pass.

Rio Grande waters would be moved through another canal from Amistad Dam at Del Rio to Maverick and Webb Counties and to the vegetable-growing Winter Garden area around Carrizo Springs.

Some 220,000 acre feet of supplemental surface water needed for San Antonio would be pipelined from Cuero, Cibola and Goliad reservoirs in Guadalupe and San Antonio River basins. A longer-range

possibility is diversion from the Colorado River.

Power would have to be generated to pump water through the Trans-Texas canal and the pipeline to El Paso.

Costal division would provide 2.5 million acre feet of fresh water inflows to bays and estuaries and costal wildlife refuges.

**Certified Tree Seedling Stock Ready for Farms**

COLLEGE STATION—Texas planters can look forward to planting certified nursery-grown forest tree seedlings as the result of a recent expansion of the Texas Department of Agriculture's seed certification program.

The State Seed and Plant Board, seed and seedling certifying division of the Texas Department of Agriculture, and the Texas Forest Service, a part of The Texas A&M University System, collaborated in announcing the new certification standards. Operating on the new program, Mason Boyd, head of the Texas Forest Service Replantation Section said, "the certification of forest tree seed and seedlings is a major step toward the Service's long-range goal of providing Texas tree farmers with seed and seedlings of known and identifiable genetic properties."

The certification program will aid tree farmers by providing forest tree seed and seedlings that are specifically fitted to individual forest management needs. If a timber grower wants to produce trees that have wood of high specific gravity suitable for lumber and plywood, he will be able to buy seedlings of that type from the Texas Forest Service nursery near Alto.

If the landowner wants to plant seed or seedlings that have several known genetic qualities such as known fiber properties, drought-hardiness, and good growth rate and form, he is assured of getting seedlings of this type under the new certification program.

Certified seed and seedlings may be available to Texas tree farmers as early as the 1970-71 planting season, according to Cloud.

So until another appeal can get to the court, stores in such cities as Midland, Corpus Christi, San Antonio, Abilene and Fort Worth are staying open seven days a week, while stores in other cities — like Austin, Waco and Dallas — must stay closed.

Constitutional question is whether the list of items in the statute is too vague and indefinite for the average consumer — or merchant — to understand.

Texas Fine Arts Commission plans to produce a mobile theatrical company to perform bilingual versions of popular plays in areas of the state which are predominately Latin-American.

Commission is getting a \$6,700 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to finance the plan.

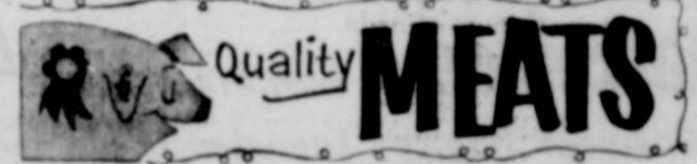

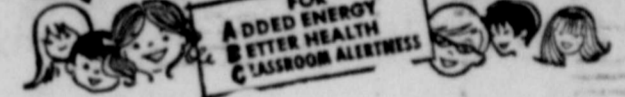
