Farmers Should File Returns By Jan. 15

Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their 1968 gross income from farming operations should file their declarations of estimated Federal income tax, including self-employment, for 1968 with the Southwest Service Center, 3651 S. Interregional Highway, Austin, Texas 78740, on or before Wednesday, January 15, 1969. Form 1040-ES should be used for this purpose.

However, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said that farmers do not have to file an estimate if they file their 1968 Federal income tax return and pay all the tax due by February 17, 1969.

"Farmer's Tax Guide", (Publication 225), which furnishes information on this subject, may be obtained by dropping a post card to Supply, Internal Revenue Service P.O. Box 1738, Dallas, Texas 75221, or from your county farm agent.

Fishermen who expect to receive at least two-thirds of their gross income from fishing may file estimates or Form 1040 in lieu of an estimate, on the same dates prescribed for farmers.

State Vehicle Registration Swell In 1968

Motor vehicle registrations in Texas will climb to 6,029,000 by the end of 1968, reports the American Automobile Association.

Estimates predict that there will be 4,695,000 automobiles, a 2.2% increase over 1967, and 1,334,000 trucks and buses, a 2.8% increase, in the state. The total represents a 2.3% increase over 1967, when 5,893,582 vehicles were registered.

Nationally, motor vehicle registrations will jump close to the 100 million mark by December 31, the AAA said, citing reports of the Federal Highway Administration. The government agency predicts an increase to 99,950,000 — or 3,013,124 vehicles more than were registered in 1967.

The 1968 national total breaks down to 82,821,000 automobiles, a 3.0 percent increase, and 17,137,000 trucks and buses, a 3.7 percent increase. This represents a 3.1 percent total vehicle increase over 1967.

California's 11.2 million vehicle registrations are followed by 6.2 million in New York and 6 million in Texas. Ohio and Pennsylvania each will have nearly 5.5 million vehicles by the end of 1968. Illinois and Michigan will have between 4 and 5 million, and Florida and New Jersey between 3 and 4 million. These nine leading states account for 50.4 percent of the national total.

Thirty-two states will have registrations of more than one million. Motorcycle registrations nationally are expected to total 2,127,859, an increase of 174,837 over 1967. Texas registration 88,409 motorcycles in 1967, and is expected to have 100,143 registered by the end of 1968.

2 4-H'ers Do Well in Odessa Show

Eastland County 4-H Club boys Gary Wheat and Joe Heyser tied the lead so far as placings went at the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show in Odessa. Their calves were the only ones out of six Eastland County 4-H calves that placed.

Gary's medium weight steer placed 15th and Joe Heyser's medium heavy weight steer placed 22nd.

According to Ass. Co. Agent, Bob Cohen, these individuals did a good job of exhibiting their calves. The Odessa Show is the only all Hereford major stock show in the state, and since it comes at a time when there are no other major shows going on, everyone who feeds hereford steers goes to Odessa.

There were some 350 hereford steers competing for 80 ribbons and 40 premium sale slots. The competition is keen, but the rewards are high for those who get to sell.

Ranger Is Eligible To Apply for Funds Toward Hospital

On Friday, January 3, 1969, a meeting was held at the Texas State Health Department in Austin, Texas to discuss the need for a new hospital in Ranger. Ranger was represented at this meeting by Bill Marslander, Felton Brasher and Wayne Mathews. Mr.

Earl Koeppe who has been retained as architect for the proposed new hospital, was also present. It was determined at this meeting that Ranger is eligible to apply for Hill Burton funds to cover 50% of the cost of the new hospital. This

would be a grant from the Federal Government. The remaining cost would be borne by Ranger through donations, tax bonds or revenue bonds.

Mr. Collier, of the Texas State Health Department said that Ranger could apply for funds to build a hospital of up to, but not more than, 36 beds and based on cost of similar hospitals presently being constructed in Texas the cost would run close to one million dollars. Further, that in order for an application to be processed in 1970, it would have to be submitted by May 1969 together with evidence of Ranger's 50% of the cost.

Marslander, Chairman of the Hospital Committee, stated that a full report will be presented to the City Commission and the Hospital Board.
